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
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President's Report Brian Uerling, President

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
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Office Notes Don Gerheart, Executive Director



Wow the first semester of this school year is coming to a conclusion. The days seem to go by very quickly and before we know it our 72nd All-State Music Festival and In-Service will be taking place.

Now that auditions are over I would like to give you a brief update. The number of students that were registered for vocal auditions this year increased by 70 from last year and increased by 35 for the strings. The number of guitar students remained the same as last year and the wind and percussion registrations were up by 76. Three sections having increased participation this fall is very good news. Thank you all.

I would be remiss if I didn't thank the people who helped with the auditions. This includes the audition team, schedulers, site coordinators, and the many students and adults that helped at the audition sites. Speaking for the NMMEA Board of Directors I thank you one and all! Without your willingness to devote your time and energy we would not be able to hold the auditions. The ensembles have been chosen and students are preparing their respective parts for our eight All-State performing ensembles. If you haven't done so please be sure

that all students have received their music and that they are prepared to sing or play their parts. It is especially important that the wind and percussion students get their music as soon as possible after they find out that they have been assigned a part in one of our bands and orchestras. Music Mart is again preparing folders for all ensembles and has the music you need ready for you to purchase. Thank you Joe and your staff for all of the time and effort you devote to getting the music ready for us.

Our website has been up and running for over a year now and we continue to provide more information and services to you. I want to acknowledge Neil Swapp our Past President for all of the time and effort he continues to devote of our website. He does this on a volunteer basis and receives no compensation for his efforts. Thank you Neil for being so dedicated and doing a great job. I would like to also thank our President Brian Uerling and our current Vice Presidents for their service to NMMEA. These individuals are in their first year of their two-year term of office so it has taken a lot of their time getting up to speed in representing their sections. Be sure to thank them the next time vou see them or send them a nice email for their service to NMMEA. It will only take a minute or two of your time to do so.

Numbers of Students Participating in Last Year's NMMEA Events

I would like to share with you information that was compiled with the help of our district presidents to determine the number of students that participated in NMMEA sponsored events. We had 28,457 students participate in our district events – MPA's. Solo & Ensemble, Honor Ensembles, etc. Also over 2600 students were registered for All-State auditions

with 950 students chosen to be in our eight All-State ensembles. Almost 200 more students were members of our All-State Honor Ensembles. The total was 32,197. In addition there were just over 3000 students that participated in the NMAA State Contests. These are impressive numbers. Just imagine how many more people we reach through our individual school performances.

NMMEA In-Service Conference Information

It is hard to believe but in just a few weeks we will be holding our 72nd NMMEA All-State and In-Service Conference. If you haven't already done so please make arrangements to attend. Check our website for the All-State In-Service Registration Form. Remember if you Pre Register before December 15th the conference fees are a few dollars cheaper than if you wait to register from December 16th through All-State. There are at least 30 workshops and clinics to attend for general music, middle school, and high school teachers. For those of you in elementary and middle school please encourage your administration to let you attend. This is a great opportunity for you to receive some professional development by attending the workshops that will be offered. This is also a special time to see your colleagues from all over New Mexico and to make new acquaintances. I know from experience that we can learn new things by also visiting with our colleagues. The Honor Concerts will again be held in the afternoon on both Thursday and Friday. The students and their directors have spent a lot of hours preparing their concerts for us to enjoy. There will be no evening events scheduled on either of those days so you can plan activities for your students. Or All-State concert sponsors will have a booth in the area outside

of Keller Hall as well as booths offered to our state universities. Please stop by and say hello and thank our concert sponsors for their support.

The registration desk and the Business/Awards Luncheon will again be located in the ballroom area of the Student Union. Please check our new website for updated information as to the process you are to use for registering for All-State. The All-State Music Educators Schedule will be posted in early December so you can plan the clinics you might attend. The student schedule will be posted on the "Student/Parent" Link also in early December.

Your NMMEA Board of Directors has approved using the NAfME Convention software and computers for participants to print out their badges and to register on site. There is a lot of upfront work that needs to be put in place and hopefully we can get that done so we can implement it for All-State in January. If we hit some snags or run out of time we will continue with registration as we have done in the past. Our NMMEA office will continue to produce the student badges regardless of what system we use. Keep checking our website for the latest information regarding the registration process we will use as well as to get the latest news for All-State.

We are pleased to announce that Kathy Espinoza is our new All-State site coordinator. She comes to us with a lot of expertise and is a great person. Hopefully you will have a change to meet her in January.

The NMMEA Business/Awards Luncheon will take place on Friday, January 8, 2015 starting at 11:45 AM in Ballroom B in the Student Union. Your Board of Directors made a hard decision regarding the cost of the luncheon. Due to a significant increase in cost per meal by the SUB the board has had to raise the price of

the luncheon ticket to \$22. Last year we were not informed of the price increase and we had to absorb a significant loss. The menu will be similar to the menu we have had over the past few years. You can reserve your ticket by including it on your All-State Registration Form. Do plan to attend the Business/Awards Luncheon to honor our awards recipients and to have some time to socialize with your colleagues. We will also have a short business meeting as required by our by-laws prior to the awards presentations.

Conference Hotel

Our conference hotel for the 2016 All-State will again be the Sheraton Albuquerque Uptown Hotel located at the corner of Menaul and Louisiana NE. Albuquerque, NM 87110. Your Board of Directors has heard nothing but positive comments regarding last year's stay. Reservations can be made by contacting the Sheraton at 505-830-5786 and ask for Rebecca in sales. The rate will be \$90 per room plus taxes of \$11.87 = \$101.87 for up to four students per room. This rate is a very good deal for a room with breakfast and free Wi-Fi. Breakfast will be served in one of their ballrooms Thursday through Saturday. There is ample parking (buses included) at the hotel. The Coronado Mall is located across the street and ABQ Uptown is relatively close. Your Board of Directors encourages directors and members to support the Sheraton Uptown even though it is the your choice as to where to stay.

Recordings

Shhh Productions will again be the recording company who will produce and sell CD's and DVD's of all of the All-State concerts. Their ordering form will be posted on our website prior to our conference for pre orders as well as following All-State. We will also be able to order recordings in the lobby area of Popejoy Hall the entire day of the All-State concerts.

All-State Parking/ Bus Unloading/Loading/Parking

As of now I am not aware of any changes to these arrangements for 2016. Parking and bus arrangements will probably be very much the same as they were last year. Please check our website as we get closer to our in-service conference for the most up to date information.

NAfME Membership Link – The Easy Way to Join, Renew, or Update Information

Remember that when you join NAfME that membership fee includes your NMMEA membership. You cannot just join one organization or the other. NAfME would like that we all process memberships online if at all possible. I will continue to accept new memberships and membership renewals ONLY if they are apart of the conference registration fees or included on the same PO as your conference fees. No hard copy membership forms are available any longer. Your anniversary date will be used as he renewal date of your membership. If your membership expires in July and you don't renew it until September your membership renewal date will be July not September. You can join NAfME/NMMEA by going to our website. In the upper right hand corner click on the appropriate box log in, and follow the steps. Please note that you will need your NAfME ID number. You will need a total of 9 digits to log in. Whatever your ID number is add zeros at the beginning to total 9 digits. You can also find the same information on the NAfME website (www.nafme.org). You can update your personal information by clicking on "Login". After you log in click on any of the areas that you need to update and make your changes. Follow the instructions until you have updated all of your information as needed and you have completed the renewal process. Remember the roster information that is posted on our website is taken directly form NAfME's database. We do not en-

U.S. Marine Band Offers Plethora of Educational Resources in DC and Nationwide

When the musicians of "The President's Own" U.S. Marine Band aren't hailing the chief at the White House, honoring fallen heroes at Arlington National Cemetery, performing concerts in the DC metro area and across the country on tour, or in a practice room honing their craft, they can be found in schools, both live and virtually. The following educational resources are available for free from the Marine Band:

Marine Band Concerto Competition for High School Students

"The President's Own" U.S. Marine Band, in conjunction with the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation, hosts an annual Concerto Competition for high school students. The winner will appear as a guest soloist with the U.S. Marine Band and receive a \$2,500 cash prize from the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation. The runner up will receive a \$500 cash prize. Complete Marches of JPS

This year, "The President's Own" United States Marine Band released its first volume of "The Complete Marches of John Philip Sousa." This multi-year recording project, initiated by Director Lt. Col. Jason K. Fettig, is the Marine Band's first comprehensive collection of Sousa's marches since the 1970s. The collection is in chronological order, and Volume 1 contains his first 17 marches, covering the years 1873 to 1882. Volume 1 is available for free download exclusively on the Marine Band website, along with scrolling videos and PDFs of the full scores that include historical and editorial notes about each piece. Each march has been carefully edited and corrected by Lt. Col. Fettig and Music Production Chief Master Sgt. Donald Patterson using some of the earliest known publications and incorporate performance practices employed by the Marine Band that are modeled on those of "The March King" himself. Sousa's March Mania

When it comes to the historical knowledge and performance of marches, especially for those written by John Philip Sousa, the United States Marine Band is considered a prime resource. That's why during the month of March, "The President's Own" will be hosting "Sousa's March Mania," a tournament pitting 32 marches against each other for the Marine Band online community to determine which one is the favorite. Each day, marches will compete head to head while fans vote which ones advance in the tournament. Participants can listen to the competing marches, download and print a tournament bracket, and vote for favorites on the Marine Band Facebook page. The winners of "Sousa's March Mania" will be named "The March King" for a day! Please visit www.marineband. marines.mil in December for more information.

Educational Discography

The Marine Band produces an annual CD recording, which is made available to schools, radio stations, and libraries. The recordings are distributed free of charge to educational institutions, public libraries, and radio stations. This year's CD is "Elements," a recording that Director Lt. Col. Jason K. Fettig built around the four classical elements: fire, water, earth, and air. Music is often the representation and inspiration of the world both around and within us and this concert explores the classical elements in classical music, from fire in Igor Stravinsky's Fireworks to water in Leonard Bernstein's Symphonic Suite from On the Waterfront, and earth with Darius Milhaud's depiction of the genesis of the planet itself in La Création du monde. These elements are all tied together by the very wind that powers this grand acoustic ensemble called the concert band. While the ancient Greeks first presented the concept of the four elements, the Eastern Asian cultures transformed the idea into a belief in the transmission of energy between elements, to include wood and metal. These elements are represented in grand fashion in Jennifer Higdon's virtuosic

Young People's Concert

Each spring, the Marine Band or Marine Chamber Orchestra presents the Young People's Concert. Director Lt. Col. Jason K. Fettig initiated this interactive and theatrical series in 2006 and has authored, hosted, and conducted the popular annual event since its inception. The band's 2016 performance will take place on Sunday, April 24 and the band will be conducted by Assistant Director 1st Lt. Ryan J. Nowlin. Each #MusicMonday the Marine Band releases streaming albums and recordings of live performances on its YouTube channel, as well as interviews with band members and historical vignettes. The online collection includes many out-of-print educational recordings, which have

previously only been available to schools

and libraries. Future releases include The Bicentennial Collection, a 10-disc set which traces the recorded history of "The President's Own" from rare wax cylinders and early radio broadcasts to recent performances captured with the latest digital technology. Music in the Schools (MITS)

Each October, ensembles from the Marine Band present programs designed to introduce musical instruments and concepts to elementary school students throughout the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area. Designed for grades 3-5, the 45-minute interactive presentations feature instrument demonstrations, explanations about how instruments produce sounds, instruction on musical terms, and a question and answer session. The musicians also perform a wide range of music geared specifically toward elementary school students. Demand for this program is high and bookings are made on a first come, first served basis starting in September. Schools must be within a 15mile radius of Washington, D.C. Music in the High School s (MITHS) From February-March, musicians and vocalists from the Marine Band visit high school music programs throughout the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area for sessions designed to entertain and challenge music students. The Marine Band ensembles and vocalists perform varied selections geared specifically toward high school level musicians participating in band, orchestra, or choral programs, and are not suitable for general assembly type audiences. The presentations include instruction and concepts, in addition to receiving valuable guidance on chamber music performance. Demand for this program is high and bookings are made on a first come, first served basis starting in December. Schools must be within a 30-mile radius of Washington, D.C.

Thank you to all clinicians and clinic sponsors. Everyone I approached was excited and willing to share his or her



General Music Section Jan Delgado, Vice President



Once again, the 2016 All-State Conference looks really interesting for General Music teachers. I am pleased with the variety of clinics we will have to offer. Below are descriptions of the Thursday events.

"Expanding the Village: Drumming for K-2," presented by Christine Strickland, Mike Anaya, and Paul Palmer. Expand your musical village by offering drumming experiences that are sure to engage and inspire your youngest students. You will be given the tools, techniques, and activities needed to help your students achieve success. Come ready to play drums! The presenters are APS Music Specialists and all certified in World Drumming.

"NMMMEEAAA - New Mexico Male Music Elementary Educators Advocacy and Advisory," facilitated by Rick Wild. Come participate in a roundtable discussion on the issues of male elementary music teachers in New Mexico who face their own set of challenges: from singing in falsetto, to stereotyping, to working as one of the few males in a primarily all-female elementary school setting. Bring your thoughts and ideas, and be ready to share your stories.

"On With the Show!" presented by Kim Letellier. Sometimes, the hardest part is just deciding on the theme. This is a session on putting together programs - full-blown to simple, long to short. There will be discussion about ideas/themes, resources, costuming, planning, logistics, programs and everything in between.

"Yes Uke Can! Teaching ukulele with a song based curriculum," presented by Robin Giebelhausen. Ukuleles can be used as an accompanying instrument that is both portable and suitable for very young children's voice. In addition, they are great for little hands, easy to play, and are an excellent tool for teaching harmonic function and accompaniment. This session will help you learn some ukulele skills for yourself as a musician as well as acquiring teaching techniques that can be used with your students. The suggested repertoire can be used to gradually introduce ukulele skills and be applied to arranging, improvisation, and composition with the ukulele. General music educators can integrate this information easily into their normal classroom setting. There will also be a discussion of ukulele clubs. These and other participatory culture music groups in middle and high school offer musical connections to those who might not find their identity in the normal secondary music course offerings such as band, choir, or orchestra. Protocol to establish a ukulele club will be outlined. Bring a uke! Bring a friend!

"The Paperless Music Classroom," presented by Robin Giebelhausen. Various devices and software have moved many of us forward in our personal lives towards an increasingly paperless world. However, the music classroom is still utilizing paper in a way that is both inefficient and unsustainable. This session is designed to discuss the various pieces of technological hardware that music teachers can use to increase productivity, improve musical understanding, and connect to the rest the outside world in new and exciting ways. After discussing hardware, we will talk about the existing software that can help music teachers adapt their curriculum into this new model. Finally, this session will explore the ways music teachers can become content creators and share their ideas with the larger music teacher education world through e-book author programs, audio editing software, and video editing software.

"Teaching General Music in Isolation in New Mexico," panel discussion. This fall, a group of teachers from all over New Mexico have been discussing this topic via the internet. Findings will be presented and more members can be added to this ongoing discussion.

"Multicultural Dances and Games," facilitated by Rebecca Ortega and Clois Bell. A major aspect of General Music teaching is movement. Come and participate in student-tested dances and games from around the world.

The General Music Honor Group is the Tucumcari Elementary Rattlers Orff Ensemble, under the direction of Andrew Kesten and Paul Gibson. They will be performing Thursday afternoon in Popejoy Hall.

On Friday, our Headliner Clinician is Brian Burnett, from Ohio. He will fill the day with assessment and improvisation structures, integrating math and science vocabulary into the mix. Mr. Burnett currently serves as the National Conference Director for AOSA, teaches level two in the summer and presents Orff workshops across the country. He gave an exceptionally good workshop for NMAOSA in October 2013 and we are very glad to have him back.

Also on Friday, at the NMMEA Awards luncheon, Christine Strickland will receive this year's John Batchellor award. There are bios and information elsewhere in this magazine on the above clinicians and awards. Please read and enjoy.

We have many exciting clinics and clinicians slated for our January 2016 conference. Our collegiate headliner is Dr. Timothy Gerber, Professor of Music Education at The Ohio State University. Dr. Gerber earned his undergraduate degree at Oberlin College and his graduate degrees at Temple University. He is a co-author of the high school text, Music! Its Role and Importance in Our Lives, to be published in its fourth edition by

Glencoe/McGraw-Hill in 2015. For 18 years, Dr. Gerber served as the principal author of educational materials for the Columbus Symphony Orchestra. His current research focuses on music teacher education, musical development in adolescents. and arts policy in secondary schools. Gerber has long championed the notion of music study for all students in middle and high schools, and has volunteered some of his research time as a general music teacher in the Columbus Public Schools. Dr. Gerber receives frequent invitations to deliver lectures and keynote addresses in this country and abroad. He was a keynote speaker for the international conference on Integrated Arts Education at National Taiwan Normal University, and served as the Steinecker Lecturer in Music at the University of Regina, Canada. In 1995, he was chosen as the Roy Acuff Chair of Excellence in the Creative Arts at Austin Peay State University. Dr. Gerber also was selected by students to receive the Distinguished Teaching Award in The Ohio State University School of Music. In 2007, he was awarded the Distinguished Music Education Alumnus Award at Oberlin College. Dr. Gerber chaired the university's Ad Hoc Committee on Semesters in 2008-09, and in 2009-10 he was elected as Chair of the Ohio State Faculty Council. In 2013, Dr. Gerber was named the Distinguished Scholar in the School of Music. He has been appointed by both Presidents Gee and Alutto to serve as Secretary of the University Senate, most recently beginning a second term in 2014.

Dr. Gerber has three dynamic interest sessions planned for January. They are:

"The Importance of Teaching Off the Podium" - This session will address the imperative to reach students who love music by stretching beyond the traditional and elective ensem-

bles – what is typically offered in the curriculum.

"Bringing Out the Best in Today's Adolescents" - This session will provide a lively discussion of trends, troubles, and timely topics in learning to work effectively with middle and high school students as they navigate the rapids of identity and independence.

"How a Strong Philosophy Can Shape a Strong Career" - This session will examine a variety of approaches to thinking about the role of music in schools and the relationship of a philosophy of music education to career success.

Although these sessions are designed with the pre-service (college) teacher in mind, everyone is welcome and encouraged to attend.

In addition to Dr. Gerber's sessions. Ms. Ingrid Larragoity will present an interactive session entitled, "NAfME Collegiate: Exploring the Power of New Mexico Collegiate Music Educators." In this session, Ms. Larragoity will focus on discovering and harnessing the strengths within the 3 state universities and their collegiate music education programs towards creating a stronger presence in the state of New Mexico. This will be a fantastic opportunity to hear from representatives from each of our state universities and participate in a dialogue with them about how we can strengthen our collegiate music education presence in our great state.

Finally, the Collegiate Section will host a roundtable discussion with all of our honor ensemble conductors, as well as our general music and collegiate headliner, on Thursday evening, January 9, at 8:30 p.m., in the

Baldwin Ballroom at the Sheraton Hotel. Dr. Andrew Boysen, Jr. is presently a professor in the music department at the University of New Hampshire, where he conducts the wind symphony and teaches conducting and composition. Under his leadership, the UNH wind symphony has released six recordings and been invited to perform at regional conventions of the College Band Directors National Association and National Association for Music Education. Previously, Boysen taught at Indiana State University and Cary-Grove (IL) High School, and was the music director and conductor of the Deerfield Community Concert Band. He remains active as a guest conductor and clinician, appearing with high school, university and festival ensembles across the United States, Great Britain, and Australia.

Boysen earned his Doctor of Musical Arts degree in wind conducting at the Eastman School of Music, where he served as conductor of the Eastman Wind Orchestra and assistant conductor of the Eastman Wind Ensemble. He received his Master of Music degree in wind conducting from Northwestern University in 1993 and his Bachelor of Music degree in music education and music composition from the University of Iowa in 1991.

He maintains an active schedule as a composer, receiving commissions from festival, university, and high school concert bands across the United States. Company, Wingert-Jones Music, Alfred Music, Masters Music, and C. Alan Publications, including pieces for band, orchestra, clarinet and piano, and brass choir. Recordings of his music appear on the Sony, R-Kal, Mark, St. Olaf and Elf labels.



Most recently his involvement was in Colombia, South America where he has been involved the development

of the music programs for the youth throughout the country. Dr. Romero presented various workshops during these trips that included ensemble conducting, jazz improvisation, music education, trumpet performance, and instrument repair.

During 12 years of his career, Pancho was in the music retail industry. He has owned and operated the Romero

Family Music Center in Albuquerque and was General Manager for the Bob Farley Music Centers in Albuquerque and El Paso. Dr. William (Bill) Clark is currently



Professor Emeritus of Music at New Mexico State University. At NMSU, he served as Director of Bands

from 1985 to 1993 and as Music Department Head from 1991 to 2000. Prior to coming to NMSU, Dr. Clark was Director of Bands at Delta State University in Cleveland, Mississippi for 14 years and Director of Bands at Arkadelphia, Arkansas High School for 11 years. During Dr. Clark's time at NMSU the Music Department grew significantly in size, quality, and reputation due in most part to Dr. Clark's high standards and expectations, his professionalism and leadership, and of course his charismatic nature. Formally, Dr. Clark's career has spanned a total of forty years. Fifteen of his formal forty years have been in New Mexico. However, Dr. Clark has continued to work supporting and positively impacting music education in New Mexico well past his formal retirement. Thus, Dr. Clark's service to music education in New Mexico has been for a total of thirty years and counting.

During his career and after his retirement Dr. Clark has received many honors: Las Cruces Citizen of the Year in

1988, NMMEA Music Educator of the Year in 1992, Election to the American Bandmaster's Association in 1993, Julie Papen Arts Patron Award in 1996, Henderson State University Outstanding Alumnus Award in 2003, NMMEA Hall of Fame in 2007, and New Mexico Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts in 2015. Even after his formal retirement, Dr. Clark continues to be recognized as a superior educator and works in high demand as a private low brass studio teacher, school ensemble guest clinician/ consultant, adjudicator, and honor band & All- State ensemble guest conductor (AL, AR, AZ, CA, CO, GA, KY, LA, MA, MO, MS, OK, OR, TE, TX, WA). The quality of Dr. Clark's reputation and work clearly reaches far outside our state and region, but as many know, Dr. Clark has always prioritized his focus in help and volunteerism to music education here in New Mexico. Notably, beyond the above mentioned efforts, Dr. Clark has served NMMEA in the following ways during his formal career and after his retirement: service many, many times as an MPA adjudicator in all of our NMMEA districts, multiple years as NMSU site host for the SWNMMEA MPA, multiple years as NMSU site host of wind & percussion All-State auditions, service many times as a district and state in-service conference clinician, service many times as All-State low brass adjudicator, and service two times as an NMMEA All-State guest conductor.

In addition to his work at NMSU, Dr. Clark co-founded the Mesilla Valley Concert Band (MVCB) in 1986 with Mr. John Schutz. The MVCB was founded with the intent to provide quality music making opportunities for professional and non-professional musicians alike and to provide additional band performances to the greater community of Las Cruces. The group has grown from 30 performers in the inaugural year, to now over 100 performers who range in age from 16 to 90. Performers in the group are made up of people from all walks of life from the greater Las Cruces area with some members driving from El Paso, Alamogordo, Deming, Silver City, and Lordsburg. Since year one, Dr. Clark has served as the group's conductor and director. Under his supervision, Dr. Clark has grown the MVCB into a highly successful band and non-profit organization. The group presents an annual series of free concerts. One concert of the series is a youth concert for all 5 th graders of the

Las Cruces Public Schools district, where the costs of student bussing are paid for by MVCB. The MVCB non-profit also provides music scholarships to deserving college students at NMSU. Lastly, concerts regularly feature local and area guest artists, guest conductors, and composer/arrangers. Through Dr. Clark's vision and efforts with the MVCB he has provided a vehicle to culture and further support music in Las Cruces and the surrounding areas. Later in 1994, Dr. Clark also established the Las Cruces New Horizons Band (NHB). New Horizons is a national program that was conceived in Rochester New York in 1990 for seniors who wish to resume or begin playing music after retirement. Under his direction and supervision, the Las Cruces New Horizons program has now expanded to include not only the concert band, but also a symphony orchestra, jazz ensemble, and chamber ensembles. The Las Cruces NHB, and its affiliate ensembles, have and continue to provide an invaluable music making opportunity for seniors in our community.

Jim Young is a graduate of Hot Springs



High School and received his Bachelor and Master degrees from Eastern New Mexico University. He also received his Adminis-

tration License from New Mexico State University. Jim taught band in Los Alamos for, 9 years, in Alamogordo he was director of Bands for 18 years and Department Chairman for 9 years. He retired (the first time in 1993) then taught in Durango for 3 years and was Director of Bands at Western New Mexico University for 2 years and then taught in the Las Cruces School system for 2 years. Since moving to Las Cruces he has also taught numerous class at NMSU and is currently supervising music student teachers for NMSU. Jim has been adjudicator and clinician in New Mexico, Texas, Arizona, Nevada, Colorado, Utah and Kentucky. While in Alamogordo bands under his direction was names outstanding band from New Mexico 7 times at the Zia Marching Fiesta and was selected as the NMMEA Honor Ban in 1981. They also received outstanding 5A concert bands at numerous festivals throughout the Southwest.

Jim's bands received a first division rating every year that he taught in public schools. Mr. Young has served in many positions of leadership in NMMEA, North Central District President, Southwest District President, Band Vice-President and President. He has been inducted into the NMMEA Hall of Fame, the only public school director to conduct the Small School All-State Band twice, and the first person to receive the Emeritus Teacher Award. Jim also served as the Music Specialist on the North Central Accreditation team for 11 years. In his letter of recommendation for the Emeritus Award, Chris Gerheart wrote "Mr. Young continues to show a commitment and dedication to music education after retiring from teaching... At times some of the schools in the Southwest District have struggled with personnel issues. Mr. Young has volunteered his time to fill positions until a permanent director could be found. In addition to personnel issues, these programs were in severe distress. Mr. Young has stepped into unfavorable situations and salvaged programs. These are only a few of the qualities that make Jim Young an outstanding educator in our state".

Dr. Timothy Gerber, Professor of Music Education at The Ohio State University, is the Collegiate Headliner for the 2016 NMMEA All-State Music Festival and In-Service Conference. Dr. Gerber earned his undergraduate degree at Oberlin College and his graduate degrees at Temple University. He is a co-author of the high school text, Music! Its Role and Importance in Our Lives, to be published in its fourth edition by Glencoe/McGraw-Hill in 2015. For 18 years, Dr. Gerber served as the principal author of educational materials for the Columbus Symphony Orchestra. His current research focuses on music teacher education, musical development in adolescents, and arts policy in secondary schools. Gerber has long championed the notion of music study for all students in middle and high schools, and has volunteered some of his research time as a general music teacher in the Columbus Public Schools. Dr. Gerber receives frequent invitations to deliver lectures and keynote addresses in this country and abroad. He was a keynote speaker for the international conference on Integrated Arts Education at National Taiwan Normal University, and served as the Steinecker Lecturer in Music at the University of Regina, Canada. In 1995, he was chosen as the Roy Acuff Chair of Excellence in the Creative Arts at Austin Peav State University. Dr. Gerber also was selected by students to receive the Distinguished Teaching Award in The Ohio State University School of Music. In 2007, he was awarded the Distinguished Music Education Alumnus Award at Oberlin College. Dr. Gerber chaired the university's Ad Hoc Committee on Semesters in 2008-09, and in 2009-10 he was elected as Chair of the Ohio State Faculty Council. In 2013, Dr. Gerber was named the Distinguished Scholar in the School of Music. He has been appointed by both Presidents Gee and Alutto to serve as Secretary of the University Senate, most recently beginning a second term in 2014.



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TURNING THE SCALES UPSIDE DOWN DEVELOPING RANGE FOR BRASS PLAYERS

Mentoring can at times be quite illuminating while sitting back watching talented and hopeful young educators deciding on methods to assure in their students development of skills enabling musical performance. Add to that adjudicating assignments during which one can observe experienced teachers persevering for those results. As a lifetime brass specialist I have pondered a simple, hardly revolutionary, solution to a problem that

almost every band director, whether new or experienced has; the development of range and intonation for young brass players. TURN THAT Bb SCALE UPSIDE DOWN!

With rare exception band classes are led in the daily warm-up with a scale starting on the traditional low Bb. This establishes, reinforces, and sets in concrete that the proper embouchure setting for all the brass players is that setting for one of the lowest notes on their instrument. As the ensemble works up that scale ladder the top note is set in the embouchure as a "high note." The embouchure is already pinched for many players as that is the top of the daily warm-up routine. Now the band attempts to tune comfortably on this "high" note, which, in reality, is just the middle or lower middle of the practical playing range. Endless repetition of this routine establishes in the mind of the brass student that any note above that level is, indeed, a high note and difficult to achieve. My contention is that to improve brass range and intonation for brass players their ¬first note of the day should be the upper Bb thus establishing the embouchure in the middle of the range rather than on the low 'open' tone. Once that note is ingrained as the "normal" beginning pitch the players may build upward and downward. HOW TO DO THIS? SIMPLY TURN THE DAILY Bb WARMUP SCALE UP-SIDE DOWN! Why not? Thus the subsequent tuning note of Bb will lie in the comfortable range of each brass player and becomes much less susceptible to pinching and thin tone quality. Once the descending Bb scale is established the band can work chromatically downward as well. I have heard bands play through the highly recommended "Remington Studies" laboriously working upward from that low Bb so that the higher pitches are the end goal. However, Remington himself had his trombone students begin on middle Bb (third space C for the trumpets). "First, I have the student establish a concert tuning-pitch middle Bb then base his practice on a descending chromatic pattern. By returning to the first position between each chromatic descent, he is able to doublecheck the tuning of each position in relation to the 'fixed' Bb." To further building range, the brass section may subsequently be led to descending scales from B, C, Db, etc. always emphasizing working down from the top pitch.

For the advancing and advanced musician practicing upside-down scales is a great way to exercise the mind and ear as it breaks the somnolent pattern of everyday scale repetition. Check out "Upside-Down Scale Studies for Improvisation" by Rich Willey at boptism.com.

Don't fear thinking outside that Bb scale box.

The three guest directors are:

All-State Jazz Ensemble III • Mr.

•All-State Jazz Ensemble III • Mr. Sam Nesbitt (Eisenhower Middle School).

Our 2015-2016 honor jazz band will be the La Cueva High School Jazz Ensemble under the direction of Mr. John D. Converse, II. Our guest lecturer at the NMME All-State conference will be Donna Schmidt of the Desert Ridge Middle School. She will offer an holistic approach into directing the middle school jazz ensemble.

Please allow me to take a moment and thank our new acting treasurer, Dr. Frank "Pancho" Romero, for his service. We could not function without him. This year we lost two major jazz artists: Ornette Coleman and Phil Woods. While Coleman was seen as a saxophonist, he also composed and performed on violin and trumpet. An innovator of the free jazz movement of the 1960's, Coleman was awarded a 1994 MacArthur Fellowship. His album entitled "Sound Grammar" received the 2007 Pulitzer Prize for music.

Phil Woods was an acclaimed saxophonist, clarinetist, composer, band leader and educator. While Woods studied classical clarinet by day at Julliard, he performed be-bop on saxophone at night in the jazz clubs of New York City. Perhaps most widely recognized in the pop idiom as the saxophonist who recorded the saxophone solo in Billy Joel's "Just the Way You Are," Woods received a 2007 "Jazz Master" award from the National Endowment of the Arts. He has been nominated for seven Grammy® awards and won four. On a personal note, I own over 10 albums by Phil Woods and listened to his music non-stop for years. I also attended a summer workshop with Phil Woods at the Manhattan School of Music. I found him to be an incredibly enlightening educator and performer.

A third major figure in the jazz world lost this year is Gunther Schuller. Schuller was a composer, conductor, educator, author, performer (horn), historian and jazz musician. Known for recording on Miles Davis' Birth of the Cool, Schuller received the 1994 Pulitzer Prize, the 1991 MacArthur "Genius" Award, the 1987 Friedheim Award, the 1988 William Schumann Award, and ten honorary degrees. Personally, I have read two of his renowned texts on jazz: Early Jazz and The Swing Era. I highly recommend them.

If you have the time, please consider sharing the contribution of these artists with your students. As always, I am humbled and honored to serve you and your students as president of the New Mexico Jazz Educators. I look forward to seeing you at the New Mexico Jazz Educators convention in January 2016!

Faculty News:

Dr. Tracy Carr performed Romance for Oboe and Piano, with pianist and composer, Dr. Mark Dal Porto at the College Music Society Rocky Mountain Chapter Conference, Littleton CO (March 21) and also at the University of Manchester's New Music Festival, North Manchester, IN (March 27). She then performed in recital at Chicago State University with former Chicago Symphony contrabassoonist, Sue Nigro (March 31). Their chamber recital featured Sue performing on bassoon and contrabassoon and Tracy performing on both oboe and English horn. Their repertoire consisted of the Milde Concertino for Oboe and Bassoon. the Poulenc Trio for Oboe, Bassoon, and Piano and the professional premier of Jay Vosk's Kontradances for Oboe, English horn, Bassoon, and Contrabassoon.

Carr's chapter, Music as Part of the General Education Humanities Curriculum was included in The Humanities in 2015; Why We Need Them and How They Contribute to Being Human, published by Nova, November 2014, Dr. Mike Shaughnessy, editor. Her chapter titled, A Look at the Possible Inspirations for Ben-

jamin Britten's Temporal Variations for Oboe and Piano, will be included in the Benjamin Britten Symposium, expected publication winter 2015, by Cambridge Scholars. Lastly, Carr is currently President of the College Music Society, Rocky Mountain Chapter.

Dr. Mark Dal Porto had 14 performances of his orchestral work Song of Eternity this past academic year. Some of the orchestras that performed it were the University of California at Riverside, Humboldt State University, Florida State University, Messiah College, University of Minnesota at Duluth, University of Northern Iowa, Franklin & Marshall College, Southern Utah University, Skidmore College, Cornell University, and The College of Saint Rose. Dal Porto also completed two commissions during the 2014-2015 academic year. One was a work for oboe and piano (titled Romance) commissioned by Dr. Tracy Carr, ENMU oboe and music history professor. The other was a saxophone quartet (titled Yin & Yang) commissioned by Dr. Richard Schwartz, ENMU professor of saxophone and jazz studies.

Other performances of Dal Porto's music were his Romance for Oboe and Piano which was performed at ENMU (November 10th), the College Music Society Rocky Mountain Chapter Conference in Littleton, CO (March 21st), and at the University of Manchester's New Music Festival. North Manchester. IN (March 27th). These three performances featured Carr and Dal Porto as the performers. Another performance of Romance was at the North American Saxophone Alliance Region 2 Conference at Northern Arizona University in Flagstaff (March 12th) in an arrangement for soprano saxophone and piano featuring saxophonist Dr. Richard Schwartz and Dal Porto as the performers.

Dal Porto's choral work I Seek Rest for My Lonely Heart was performed twice during the month of March by the Henderson State University Chamber Chorale of Arkadelphia, AR. On April 28th, Dal Porto performed his 40-minute song cycle Song of the Night at ENMU with Dr. Jean Ornellas, lyric soprano and Dr. Tracy Carr, oboe.

In July, Dal Porto had an article published in the CODA (College Orchestra Director's Association) Journal titled Song of Eternity: an Insider's Look.

Dr. Anna Hersey, Assistant Professor of Voice at ENMU, was awarded the 2015 Vocal Pedagogy Award from the National Association of Teachers of Singing. This award, along with a professional development grant from Sigma Alpha Iota and a research grant from ENMU, funded Dr. Hersey's attendance at Johan Sundberg's vocal acoustics seminar at the Royal College of Technology in Sweden this summer. Dr. Hersey was named a Finlandia Foundation grantee for a Scandinavian song tour to Alabama and Washington state, along with pianists Kayla Paulk (ENMU) and Matti Hirvonen (Norwegian Academy of Music).

Dr. Jennifer Laubenthal, Associate Professor of Clarinet, hosted the Fourth Annual Eastern Plains Clarinet Celebration on March 7, 2015 featuring guest artist Anthony Costa, Penn. State University. The event was very successful with twenty clarinetists gathering for masterclasses, a bass clarinet clinic, clarinet choir and a recital. Dr. Laubenthal also performed a solo recital at ENMU's Buchanan Hall on April 15, 2015 with Mrs. Kayla Paulk and Dr. Richard Schwartz. Her repertoire included works by Schumann, Szalowski, Sculthorpe and Resanovic.

Eastern New Mexico University Assistant Professor of Saxophone Dr. Richard Schwartz will be looking to perform works from his latest Centaur compact disc at New Mexico

State University, Texas Tech University, the University of New Mexico, Santa Fe Preparatory High School and Eastern New Mexico University in the first week of September 2015. Saxophone artists invited to perform and offer masterclasses at Eastern New Mexico University during the 2015 academic year include the Iridium Quartet, Mr. Eric Hewitt (Boston Conservatory) and the Texas Saxophone Quartet featuring former ENMU saxophone professor Dr. Chris Beaty. A select quartet of the finest ENMU saxophone students has been invited to perform at Temple University (PA), Concordia University (NY) and Boston University (MA). ENMU Jazzfest 2016 headlining artist Ellen Rowe (University of Michigan) will be performing with the ENMU Jazz Ensemble (April 9, 2016) and Jazz Combos (April 8, 2016). She will also offer masterclasses with university and high school students through the Second Annual ENMU High School Jazz Ensemble Competition on Saturday, April 9, 2016.

Susanna Self, Flute instructor at Eastern New Mexico University, played principal Flute with The Peninsula Music Festival Orchestra in Door County, Wisconsin. During this three week festival in August, the orchestra plays nine concerts of classical repertoire. The orchestra is conducted by Maestro Victor Yampolsky.

We are pleased to announce that Dr. Michael Walker is the new Assistant Professor of Horn at UNM. In addition to his teaching duties, he will perform with the New Mexico Winds and the UNM Brass Quintet. Dr. Walker was a visiting instructor at UNM last year, and prior to that appointment he served as the second Horn in the Columbus Indiana Philharmonic and as Associate Instructor of Horn at Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music. He is also the

founder of the Bloomington-based, community-centered organization Studio Forza, and is the hornist with the Fiati 5 Woodwind Quintet. He has performed with the New Mexico Philharmonic, Santa Fe Symphony, Performance Santa Fe, Utah Festival Opera, Bel Canto Institute, Palo Alto Chamber Orchestra, San Jose Wind Symphony, and as a featured soloist with Musica Nova at the Eastman School of Music. He also serves as a performing artist with Melos Music and he regularly collaborates with his wife Katie Dukes, soprano and cofounder of Studio Forza. Dr. Walker holds a BM from San José State University, an MM from the University of Northern Colorado, and a Doctor of Music in horn, with a minor in music history from Indiana University, where he studied horn with Jeff Nelsen and Dale Clevenger, and natural horn with Rick Seraphinoff.

Dr. Steven Block's past year was a fruitful one for composition. The UNM Opera Theatre performed his operetta Elisha and the Bears (An Obnoxious Operetta in One Swift Act) as part of its Fall 2014 production. The work was written especially for faculty instrumentalists and student singers, and you can find the performance on the UNM Opera Theatre web page or on YouTube. In March, two of Dr. Block's works for solo instruments received New York City premieres. These included his oldest solo instrument composition, eveningspun/black (1972) for piano, as well as his latest solo composition, 5 Plainchants for Clarinet (2009). UNM faculty member Keith Lemmons premiered the clarinet solo and also recorded the work in a New York studio prior to the concert. The recording is scheduled for release in January, 2016 by Navona Records on a CD entitled Pinnacle. A portion of Professor Lemmons' performance at the John Donald Robb Composers' Symposium can be heard on Dr. Block's website at stevendblock. com/5plainchants.

Falko Steinbach, Professor of Piano, recently recorded his new composition New Mexico Pianoscapes, Chopin's Polonaise Fantasy and Beethoven's Moonlight Sonata for his new CD, which is scheduled for an internet portal production. He also performed the Pianoscapes on the UNM Composers' Symposium last spring, together with Chinese composer Zhou Long's piano piece Wu Kui. Prof. Steinbach performed C.P.E. Bach's trio "Sanguineus und Melancholicus," works by Schubert and Williams, and his own trio "If that helps" together with fellow faculty members Kevin Vigneau and Kim Fredenburgh in Keller Hall last spring. The program was repeated as part of the Lindlar International Piano Festival this summer and also in Kürten (Germany). The Lindlar festival is a two-week annual event that has been occurring since 2009; it was founded by Prof. Steinbach and he serves as its artistic director. This year the festival featured 28 students and professors from different countries and renowned institutions, a master course, two master classes and eighteen concerts.

David Schepps, Professor of Cello, has had many performance activities this past year. In June, he was in Mérida, Yucatán, Mexico for a concert with the International String Quartet of the Yucatán. He was also on the faculty at the Fairbanks Summer Arts Festival in Alaska, which included teaching, chamber and orchestra concerts and community outreach, including a concert in Denali National Park. Dr. Schepps played under Donald Runnicles and Osmo Vänskä at the Grand Teton Music Festival in Jackson, Wyoming, was also a substitute cellist with the Colorado Symphony and performed chamber concerts with Chamber Music Amarillo, the Albuquerque Chamber Soloists, and the Albuquerque Chatter series. Last December he was in Havana, Cuba, for two weeks, giving masterclasses, lessons to high school and college students and observing student orchestra rehearsals and concerts. Among his other activities this last year, he spent time observing El Sistema string programs throughout the Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego metropolitan areas, and did cello study and observations of lessons and performances of students of Alan Harris at the Eastman School of Music. He also gave recitals at New Mexico Tech and Epiphany Episcopal Church in Socorro, and The Anderson Museum of Contemporary Art in Roswell, and continues as principal cellist of Opera Southwest, principal and section cellist of the Santa Fe Pro Musica and member of the New Mexico Philharmonic and Performance Santa Fe Orchestra.

Highlights of the concert included the premiere of a new symphony by Serbian composer Nebojsa Macura, commissioned by a consortium of universities, Boysen's Kirkpatrick Fanfare, as well as Jabberwacky and the Titanium Blues composed by Hollywood composer and orchestrator Gordon Goodwin, based on the poem by Lewis Carroll. The final concert of the series, a "Musical Mosaic," presented collaborative faculty chamber performances, including the premier of a new work by Lon W. Chaffin, Department Chair, for bassoon and vibraphone, Rondo Para Mañana. The concert concluded with Copland's Appalachian Spring Suite for 13 instruments conducted by Dr. Hughes. The "Partners for Musical Excellence" campaign encourages donors to contribute to scholarship funds that will serve to enhance the education of future music educators and performers studying at NMSU.

Winds and Percussion

The American Southwest Honor Band & Orchestra Festival will be held on the NMSU Campus February 5 - 7th, 2016. Guest clinicians include Tom Lee, Emeritus Director of Bands from UCLA, Ed Canneva, Emeritus Director of Bands from Arapahoe High School in Littleton, CO and NMSU Alumni Andy Moran, conductor of the Albuquerque Youth Symphony and the El Paso Youth Symphony. Composer Carter Pann, Associate Professor of Composition at the University of Colorado, Boulder, will be the composer in residence during the festival weekend. Audition information will be released during October for the event.

The NMSU "PRIDE" Band, led by Ms. Ingrid Larragoity-Martin, Assoc. Director of Bands, had a busy fall participating in several festivals and performances around the state. Highlights include two performances in Albuquerque, at the Aggies vs. Lobos game on October 3rd and the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta. The PRIDE Band performed at the Las Cruces Schools' Field of Dreams for the LCPS Showcase exhibition in late September, and toured to several high schools throughout the area during the fall.

The 38th annual Tournament of Bands was held in Aggie Memorial Stadium on November 7th, and hosted 30 bands from around the region, including Texas and Arizona. The competition is coordinated by Ms. Larragoity-Martin.

On November 18-19, the Jazz Jump Start Clinics and workshops were hosted on the NMSU campus by Dr. Pancho Romero, Director of Jazz Ensembles and Professor of Trumpet. These clinics are designed to help prepare middle school and high school jazz ensembles for the fall and spring jazz season. Workshops throughout the day included Basic Jazz Improvisation, Jazz Ensemble Section Playing, The Role of the Rhythm Section and a New Music Sight Reading Session, levels 2-6. The activities culminated with a free concert presented by the NMSU Jazz Ensemble I.

The Wind Symphony presented a November concert with a diverse program of Mozart, Mahler and Colgrass. Mozart's beautiful Serenade No. 10 for Winds, the "Gran Partita" was performed, as well as the stirring final movement of Mahler's orchestral cycle Rückert Lieder, "Um Mitternacht," which featured Coordinator of Vocal Studies Dr. Sarah Daughtrey as mezzo-soprano soloist. Colgrass's 1985 programmatic work

Winds of Nagual is inspired by the writing of Carlos Castaneda, who studied and practiced native Mexican shamanism.

The NMSU Wind & Percussion area presented an All-State Audition Etude Prep Session for the SWN-MEA District students on August 29th. Additionally, Horn Professor Nancy Joy presented All-State Audition Clinics for horn in Clovis and Albuquerque, October 7-10.

Strings and Orchestra

The La Catrina string quartet is pleased to announce the appointment of Swiss-Venezuelan violinist Simón Gollo as second violin. Mr. Gollo earned degrees from the Conservatoire de Musique de Genève, Switzerland and the Conservatoire Supérieur et Académie de Musique Tibor Varga in Sion, Switzerland. A gifted and committed pedagogue, Gollo served as a professor with the Sistema Nacional de Orquestas Juveniles e Infantiles de Venezuela and at the Escuela de Música Mozarteum de Caracas. He also served as a professor of graduate studies at the Universidad Simón Bolívar in Caracas from 2007-2009. He is a frequently invited masterclass teacher at the pre-college department of Juilliard School of Music in New York, and has also taught and performed often at important festivals in South America such as the Virtuosi de Brasil and the Aruba Piano Festival.

Mr. Gollo has a recognized career as a violinist in several prestigious ensembles and venues including the Chamber Society of Philadelphia, 92Y- Kaufmann Concert Hall (NY), Chamber Music Society of Detroit, National Gallery of Art (Washington, DC), Bolívar Hall (London), Teatro Teresa Carreño (Caracas, Venezuela), and has appeared as soloist with several Venezuelan and South American orchestras. Gollo is also the founder

and Artistic Director of the Nuevo Mundo Festival and Academy held on the island of Aruba, as well as the founder of the Festival de Música de Mérida in Venezuela

During the summer, La Catrina performed in both Mexico and Florida, and traveled to Chicago for the 10th Latino Music Festival in September, performing works by Piazzolla and Ginastera, followed by several performances in Colorado the following month. Future projects include collaborating on a recording with fellow faculty member Jim Shearer on works for tuba and string quartet, plus their own second album of Latin American music.

Choral and Opera

Director of Choral Studies Dr. John Flanery began the year with a series of exciting events to kick off the fall semester. The annual All State Prep clinic was held on September 11th and attended by nearly 300 students from 12 area high schools. The clinic included performances by NMSU students, faculty and the University Singers. The 2nd annual "Real Men Sing" event was held on September 19th, with over 100 area men of all ages participating. The men presented a brief concert in the afternoon, with the day capped off by a performance of the national anthem at the NMSU vs. UTEP football game at Aggie Stadium.

The NMSU choral department toured El Paso high schools in mid-October followed by the fall "Beginnings" concert. The choirs will finish the semester with a "Holiday Spectacular" on Friday, December 4 at 7:30 p.m. at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Las Cruces.

The Doña Ana Lyric Opera, under the direction of Dr. John Carlo Pierce, presented a double bill of Halloween-themed chamber op-

eras on October 30 & 31 at the Rio Grande Theater in Las Cruces. Daniel Pinkham's The Cask of Amontillado was followed by the world premiere of a new opera by Department Chair & composer Lon W. Chaffin, entitled The Verloren Opera: A Tale of Lost Love. Ms. Ingrid Larragoity-Martin, Assoc. Director of Bands, directed the NMSU student ensemble.

Faculty News and Campus Performances

Dr. Lon Chaffin, Department Chair, has written a new work that was premiered by violinist Vanessa Porter on October 27th. The piece, titled Carlsbad, is part of Porter's recital at the Branigan Cultural Center in Las Cruces. Carlsbad was presented as part of her Green Dot Journey, which is a national tour of concerts in connection with national parks. Additionally, Porter presented a music entrepreneurship workshop for NMSU students.

Professor of Tuba Dr. James Shearer was busy this fall promoting and performing his recent CD, Haunted America Suite, featuring works by Raines, Gulino, Raum and NMSU's Lon W. Chaffin. Performing with Shearer were Celeste Shearer, horn and Dena Kay Jones, piano, with guest Steve Haddad on tuba. The ensemble gave several performances in October around the region, including El Paso and Albuquerque, and the re-

cording was featured in the October issue of New Mexico magazine.

Dr. Laroy Borchert, Professor of Clarinet, was an invited lecturer at the Music Analysis Creative Music Research Organization (MACRO) National Workshop in Madison, WI, where he presented a poster session on Wagenseil's Symphony in D, in honor of the 300th Anniversary of the composer's birth.

The Clarion Duo, Dr. Lisa Van Winkle, Asst. Professor of Flute, and pianist Dr. Ezequiel Mesa, presented a recital of works by Prokofiev, Sancan, Roussel, Clarke and Bach on September 27th in Atkinson Recital Hall.

This fall, the Music Department hosted several professional performers as guest artists and clinicians. Dr. Rhonda Taylor, Asst. Professor of Saxophone, hosted Richard Schwartz, in works for saxophone with piano and electronics. Taylor's latest recording, Necropolis, was released in August. Also performing on campus in October was the Piazzolla da Camera Trio, which for the past decade has been dedicated to the exclusive performance of the works of modern tango master Astor Piazzolla.
