

Make sure to register students accurately. Each year a number of members register students with first and last names reversed. Make sure to enter them correctly and always double check spelling.

3.

If a student is auditioning for multiple ensembles, a preference must

be declared at registration. Directors, please communicate with your colleagues to ensure that the same information is entered for each entry. This may seem like a small issue, but at the time of results it is a huge issue. Thank you for making this a priority.

4.

Make sure your students understand the audition process and have audition details in a timely manner.

5.

Watch the audition deadlines as once the late deadline passes no students will be added!

6

All homeschool students must register directly through me.

7.

In order for you to register a student,

they must be members of your ensemble. Do not register students for a colleague – they need to register their own students.

8.

Once you have completed the registration process, please check your email for a conformation and make sure all were entered correctly. Once the deadline passes it is impossible to add students left off the original registration.

9

And finally please make sure I receive payment (check, credit card or PO) immediately after you register.

One important feature on our website if the job board. Please encourage administrators to post open positions as this area of our website gets quite a bit of traffic.



- New option of utilizing retired high school New Mexico choral educators as all-state adjudicators passed. Directors who are adjudicators must have been retired a minimum of four years to participate.



Jazz – Honor ensemble preference will be on a 3-year rotation: small school (middle school, mid high, or junior high and high schools with school enrollment of 1200 students or lower); high schools with school enrollment of 1201 students and higher; non big band ensemble. As a point of reference 2019 is a small school year.

Preference for the 2020 Honor Jazz Band will go to "high schools with school enrollment of 1201 students and higher." The application deadline is May 15, 2018. Go to nmmea. com for information and materials. As usual, audition dates and locations for the 2020 Jazz All-State will be the same as for NMMEA All-State Bands: Nov. 4-8, 2019. Jazz Ensemble under the direction of Dr. Schwartz and featured ENMU faculty members Dr. Pamela Shuler (clarinet), Mr. Neil Rutland (drums set), Dr. Gregory Gallagher (tenor), Dr. Stephanie Beinlich (soprano), Dr. Bruce Keeling (trombone), Dr. Sidney Shuler (trumpet), Dr. Mark DalPorto (keyboard), Mr. Spencer Hartman (flute) and Dr. Richard A. Schwartz (saxophone). Upcoming endeavors by Dr. Schwartz include performances and masterclasses at the University of Oklahoma, the University of Central Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University and a performance of "Duets for Clarinet and Piano" (adapted for E-flat Alto Saxophone) by Dr. Gwyneth Walker at the 2019 North American Saxophone Alliance Region 2 Conference.

UNM Music News

March 25-31 was the scene of the 48th Annual John Donald Robb Composers' Symposium at UNM. The Symposium also hosted the Society of Composers, Inc. (SCI) Annual Conference as part of the weeklong activities. A series of free concerts, panel discussions and other events were held every day. This year's featured guest artists included the Arditti Ouartet, Sound Icon, Emanuele Arciuli, Ingela Onstad, Chatter, and the New Mexico Contemporary Ensemble. The Arditti Ouartet is one of the world's foremost chamber ensembles dedicated to contemporary music performance. Hundreds of string quartets and other chamber works have been written for the ensemble since its founding by first violinist Irvine Arditti in 1974, and over the past thirty years, the ensemble has received many prizes for its work. As part of its March 27th program, the quartet performed six quartets by UNM composition students, as well the world premiere of Ten Thousand Suns by Dr. José-Luis Hurtado, Associate Professor of Theory and Composition.

Dr. Kristina Jacobsen, Assistant Professor of Ethnomusicology, has been awarded the 2018 Woody Guthrie Book Award for the most outstanding book in popular music by the International Association for the Study of Popular Music (IASPM-U.S.). The 2019 Prize Committee wrote, "Jacobsen's study of the ways in which Diné, or Navajo, country music musicians and fans articulate their sense of belonging and identity through country music, a genre deemed incongruous with and even antagonistic to Navajo sensibilities, is a remarkable example of popular music scholarship. Jacobsen's work is particularly timely as the racialization of indigeneity continues to erase indigenous presence from popular music and cultural production writ large. Jacobsen's reflexive positioning as a non-Diné (white) scholar as well as a performing country musician in bands with Navajo musicians, Jacobsen provides a strong model for ethical and sensitive ethnographic work."

Dr. David Schepps, Associate Professor of Cello, has been invited to a new cello festival in Montenegro, and will be working at five festivals this summer—the UNM Summer Music Institute, the Montenegro Cello Festival, Hot Springs (Arkansas) Music Festival, Montecito (California) International Music Festival, and the Grand Teton Music Festival in Wyoming, for his 27th year.

UNM Music students and faculty were recently treated to an exclusive screening in Keller Hall of R.A.W. Tuba, the inspirational story of Dr. Richard A. White, UNM Department of Music Associate Professor of Tuba. The documentary chronicles Dr. White's struggle to overcome the difficulties of growing up homeless in Baltimore, and tells of his perseverance, eventually earning his doctorate from Indiana and becoming the tubist with the New Mexico Philharmonic.

A highlight of the film is Dr. White's return to Baltimore and the reaction of his friends and family to his extraordinary success, including a raptuba duet with his brother. The film is part of Invisible Thread, a venture of documentary films envisioned as a series of people-driven stories relating to the city of Baltimore. Darren Durlach, the director of the film, was present and talked to students about making the film with Dr. White.

Dr. Karl Hinterbichler spent time this summer in Austria doing research on Gustav Mahler. This included a visit to Steinbach am Attersee, a small village where Mahler spent summers composing. The tiny one-room composition hut he had built still stands today and contains interesting Mahler memorabilia. Dr. Hinterbichler also recently had forewords published to reissued orchestral scores by German publisher Musikproduktion Höflich in Munich. They are by composers Henry Hadley (Symphony No. 4), Leevi Madetoja (Symphony No. 3), and Frederick Converse (The Mystic Trumpeter). He also recently completed an arrangement for trombone quartet of Isaac Albéniz's Asturias/ Leyenda. It will be premiered by TrombQuartet, a professional ensemble in Poland. He will also be presenting a lecture for OASIS on Humor in Music on April 16. He continues as assistant editor of the International Trombone Association Journal and is responsible for Literature Anouncements, Premieres and Programs.

Dr. Patrice Repar announces that the Healing Arts II course Intersecting Creativity, Communition and Collaboration, will be offered this coming Fall semester. The course will explore how creative collaborations come together and the essential role communication plays in the process. Students will learn a variety of communication strategies that support different models of collaboration. In addition, students will gain handson experience by collaborating on

a creative community engagement project of their choice. Students from many different backgrounds and majors can benefit from taking this course, including healthcare workers, artists (musicians, dancers, actors, visual artists, writers), educators, for-profit and nonprofit business leaders, and community activists.

News from New Mexico State University

Winds and Percussion

The spring Southwest Honor International Band and Orchestra Festival (SWIHBO) took place on February 8-10, 2019, coordinated by Dr. Michael Mapp, Director of Bands. This year's festival featured clinicians from around the country, including guest conductor William Owens, Dr. Ricky Brooks (University of Central Arkansas), and Dr. Paul Popiel (University of Kansas).

The NMSU ensembles performed on February 9th, in a concert featuring the NMSU Philharmonic, under the batons of conductors Simón Gollo, Dr. Mapp, directing the NMSU Wind Symphony, and Dr. Steven Smyth (NMSU Associate Director of Bands) conducting the newly formed NMSU Desert Winds. Featured on the program were works by Mendelssohn, Rob Smith, Frank Ticheli (Sanctuary) and John Mackey (The Frozen Cathedral). The NMSU Trumpet and Jazz Ensembles, under the direction of Dr. Pancho Romero and graduate student David Torres, also performed.

The Honor Ensembles concerts, which took place throughout the day on February 10th, featured a wide range of exciting compositions. The Honor Concert Band, conducted by Dr. Owens, conductor and educator of over 30 years, featured works

composed by Owens himself. The Honor Orchestra, conducted by Maestro Gollo, featured northern European works by Sibelius, Prokofiev and Smetana. The Honor Symphonic Band was led by Dr. Ricky Brooks, with works by Standridge, McBeth, Stalter and a final polka by Johann Straus, arranged by Alfred Reed. The final concert of the day, featuring the Honor Wind Symphony and led by guest conductor Paul Popiel, included a Sousa march, In the Open Air, in the Silent Lines by Aaron Perrine, and finally, James Barnes' Sixth Symphony, op. 130.

On March 8th, the Wind Symphony, led by Dr. Michael Mapp, performed its second concert of the spring semester featuring works by Copland, Perrine, Hearshen, Wagner, and Daugherty. This concert served as the graduate conducting recital for Karen Padilla and David Torres. On April 26th, the Wind Symphony presented its last concert of the semester. The performance, entitled Pasión con Fuego, featured Latin composers, including works by Revueltas, Rodrigo, Chavez, and Surinach.

The NMSU Symphonic Band performed together with the Mesilla Valley Concert Band in a Sousa style concert on the Plaza de Mesilla in Las Cruces on March 3rd. This concert explored both the music and programing style of the late-19th century band era. The program featured soloists James Shearer (professor of tuba), and graduate student Ida Holguin in Gershwin's "Summertime" from Porgy and Bess.

2019 marks the inaugural year of the Desert Winds Indoor Ensemble, founded by Associate Director of Bands, Dr. Steven Smyth. This is a group of wind, percussion, and dance students who perform both music and a visual show on a covered gym floor. This group will serve as a recruitment and outreach tool for NMSU to perform in the area high

schools, as well as a great opportunity for the students to have a creative outlet similar to many of their Drum Corps or competitive high school experiences. Desert Winds also performed at an Aggie Men's Basketball game this fall. The group has proven to be a huge success and will remain a part of NMSU's band program.

The NMSU Trumpet Ensemble advanced to the semi-finals in the National Trumpet Competition held March 13-17 in Lexington, Ken-The ensemble competed against some of the nation's finest trumpet studios including Eastman School of Music, University of North Texas, Cincinnati Conservatory and 37 others. The ensemble is directed by graduate assistant David Torres and consists of applied students of Dr. Pancho Romero. The ensemble has also been invited to perform at the International Trumpet Guild conference in Miami, Florida in July.

The NMSU Jazz Festival has been awarded a \$4000 grant by the Devasthali Foundation to help toward clinician expenses for the 51st Annual NMSU Jazz Festival and Jump Start. The Festival is presented in November to encourage and assist high school and middle school jazz programs. Past festival clinician/artist participants have included Tia Fuller (saxophone), Wayne Bergeron(trumpet), Christian Howes (violin), and Hillary Smith (vocals). The 51st Annual Jazz festival will be held November 14-16, 2019.

On February 25, Dr. Steven Schaughency presented a master class on playing jazz for classical musicians. As a performer, he has worked with internationally recognized jazz artists such as Quincy Jones, J. J. Johnson, Clark Terry, Paul Winter, Dave Brubeck, Marvin Stamm, and Rob McConnell. For 20 years, Dr. Schaughency was a member of the United States Air Force Band, performing all styles of music, from

classical to pop, for audiences on four continents. He has also been a Yamaha-sponsored jazz festival adjudicator and clinician. Most recently, he has worked as a clinician for horn workshops in Germany, Switzerland, Sweden and the U.S., teaching jazz styles/performance practice to classically trained musicians. He has also worked as a jazz concert promoter, working directly with artists such as Arturo Sandoval, the New York Voices, the Duke Ellington Orchestra, and Mike Stern.

The Brass Area hosted Dr. Andrew Pelletier, who gave a concert and master class for horn students the week of March 18th. Dr. Pelletier is a soloist, Grammy-award winning chamber musician, sought-after teacher/mentor, and President of the International Horn Society. He is a first-prize winner of the American Horn Competition, and has appeared as a soloist at many of the International Horn Society Annual Symposia. As an orchestral performer, he has appeared with the Michigan Opera Theatre and has performed as guest principal horn for the Los Angeles Philharmonic (under Music Director Gustavo Dudamel), the Detroit Symphony, the Toledo Symphony and Toledo Opera, and many others. He also spent almost a decade as an active free-lance performer in Los Angeles and can be heard on many film soundtracks.

Strings and Orchestra

The NMSU Philharmonic and the Orquesta Sinfónica Esperanza Azteca Cd Juárez came together on March 1st to present a concert in Atkinson Recital Hall entitled "Music Beyond Borders," an initiative led by the Mexican consulate in El Paso, Maestro Simón Gollo of NMSU, Maestro Jové García of OSEA, and the "Amigos de la Orquesta Sinfónica Esperanza Azteca Cd. Juárez" association. The purpose of the event was to strengthen the cultural relation-

ship between both countries and the academic exchange between NMSU and one of the most relevant social-musical projects in Mexico: The Youth Orchestra of Ciudad Juárez, one of 83 orchestras which are part of the Esperanza Azteca program managed by the Salinas foundation. With more than 100 musicians performing, the concert featured the "New World" Symphony by Dvořák, Danzón No. 2 by Márquez, Summertime by Gershwin, among other works, led by both conductors.

The NMSU Philharmonic Orchestra, conducted by Simón Gollo, presented a concert on April 26th featuring Dr. Sarah Daughtrey (Voice Area Coordinator) and Maestro Gollo as soloists for "Erbarme dich" from Bach's St. Matthew Passion.

La Catrina String Quartet played several concerts this March, including the Placitas Artist Series, New Mexico Tech Performing Arts Series in Socorro, and also at Western New Mexico University in Silver City. In late April, the members of La Catrina and professor of tuba Jim Shearer presented a fundraiser concert for the Roswell Symphony featuring works for tuba and string quartet.

Choral & Vocal

The NMSU Choral Area presented a combined choirs concert on March 12th, featuring the University Chamber Singers and Statesmen, led by Dr. Randi Bolding, and the Women's Choir, led by graduate student Ida Holguin. MasterWorks presented the spring portion of Handel's Messiah on April 12th, and the combined choirs performed again on April 23rd.

The NMSU Opera Workshop presented an evening of Gilbert & Sullivan, featuring numbers from Cox & Box, along with scenes and arias from a selection of operettas, in April. Student and community singers performed, and the performance

was directed by Sarah Daughtrey (staging) and Eike Gunnarson (music), accompanied by Ji Young Han.

The Vocal Area was very pleased to host two guest artists this spring, Tara Khozein and George Hogan, for master classes and a recital. Ms. Khozein, who had recently performed with professor of saxophone Rhonda Taylor, worked with the vocal students on presence and body awareness. She is a graduate of NMSU in vocal performance, and spent several years studying mime and acting in Paris, and has performed both abroad and in the U.S., most recently in Santa Fe with such organizations as Theater Grottesco, q-Staff Theatre, Meow Wolf, and Strangers Collective.

Mr. Hogan, bass, also gave a master class with NMSU vocal students, and presented a recital on April 3rd. Mr. Hogan, recently retired from the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor in Belton, TX, has had an extensive career as a performer on the concert stage, in opera and oratorio. At UMHB he served as the Director of the Opera/Music Theatre program and Opera CRU, an elite vocal troupe, which he founded in 2002. Opera CRU performed for over 70 thousand elementary students in central Texas with their children's opera productions. Mr. Hogan continues to serve as an artist-faculty member at the Lutheran Summer Music Festival and Academy in the United States. News Cam-Faculty Performances pus

The 9th annual NMSU/Warner Hutchison Contemporary Arts Festival was presented on Tuesday, February 26 and Wednesday, February 27 in Atkinson Recital Hall. The multi-event festival featured the NMSU Faculty Chamber Ensemble under the direction of Dr. Michael Mapp. On Tuesday the 26th, the festival will feature a complete version of Igor Stravinsky's masterwork, "L'Histoire Du Soldat," with

dance and narration. The chamber work feature violin soloist Simón Gollo, as well as narrators Monika Mojica, Celeste Shearer, Ron Gillis, and dancer Esperanza Sides. Also featured on the program is a music drama entitled Judas for winds, percussion, voice, electronics, and actor, composed by Department Head Lon W. Chaffin. The following night, the world premiere of "Psalm" by Robert Lethermon, was presented, as well as a new work by NMSU saxophone professor Rhonda Taylor, and the "Octet for Tuba, String Quartet, Electric Bass and Percussion" by Vaclav Nelhybel. Also featured on the program was a recently premiered work entitled "Grave" that tells the story of the historic murders at what is now the Double Eagle Restaurant in Mesilla. Composer Lester Pack worked with local actress and writer Monica Mojica to create a chamber theatre piece that blends actors telling the story with dramatic new music. Performers at the event included La Catrina String Quartet, the entire NMSU Wind, Brass, Percussion and Voice Applied Faculty, pianist Shelle Bird, along with NMSU students and a number of professional musicians and actors from the Las Cruces/El Paso area.

Michael Mapp, Director of Bands, had an active spring serving as a clinician and presenter. In February, he was a clinician at the Metro West Band Festival in Minneapolis, and then spoke at the Kansas Music Educators Association, presenting "Digging Deep: Discovering the Details Within the Score and Enriching Musical Instruction," and later visited the Northern Illinois University Concert Band Festival as a clinician during the end of February and early March.

Dr. Steven Smyth presented a lecture entitled "Use of Technology and the Flipped Classroom to Improve Critical Ensemble Listening Skills" at TMEA in February, which was held in San Antonio.

Allan Kaplan, professor of low brass, was part of a brass master class series presented at the Boston Conservatory of Music in March, along with other noted faculty including John Engelkes of the San Francisco Conservatory and Terry Everson from Boston University.

Rhonda Taylor, college associate professor of saxophone, had an exciting spring presenting diverse performances of her work. On February 18, she performed at the Gerald Thomas Hall Auditorium with Dutch performance artist Japp Blonk, which was made possible by the NMSU Center for Creative Research. the 20th, she had a trio performance with Tatsuya Nakatani, percussion, and Kyle Motl, bass, at the Rio Grande Art Gallery in Truth or Consequences, NM, and in early March, she was a featured solo performer on an evening concert at the 2019 North American Saxophone Alliance Region 2 Conference, held at the University of Arizona in Tucson, AZ.

On March 2nd, the Clarion Duo, NMSU flute professor Lisa Van Winkle with pianist Esequiel Meza, presented a recital in Atkinson Recital Hall. The program included works by Hakim, Pucinar, Sancan and Schumann.

Dr. Madelyn Moore, visiting assistant professor of clarinet, presented a faculty recital on March 16 in Atkinson Recital Hall, with Ji Young Han, piano. Featured on the recital were works for clarinet and piano by Cahuzac, Crusell and Horovitz, along with Three Etudes on Themes of Gershwin by Paul Harvey, among others.

Jim Shearer will release his fourth CD on Summit Records this spring. His latest project has been 23 years in the making and is titled "Secret Frets." The music featured on the recording is inspired by the great Gypsy guitarist Django Reinhardt and features Shearer on tuba, with Steve Smith, mandolin; Joseph Mancilla, acoustic

guitar; Curt Warren; electric guitar; and Gordon Butler, violin. The bulk of the music was recorded for a project in the late 1990s but was shelved due to lack of funding to complete the project. Modern studio technology has helped bring the tracks back to life. Tunes on the recording include Reinhardt classics such as "Djangology," "Douce Ambiance," and Django's version of the Bach Double Concerto, which originally featured violinists Stéphane Grappelli and Stuff Smith. Also featured are traditional jazz standards including "Sweet Georgia Brown," "Darkness on the Delta," and "Little Rock Getaway," along with more modern classics such as Keith Jarrett's "Lucky Southern" and Bobby Troup's "Hungry Man." The album will be available from the Summit Records website and from all regular media outlets for both CD purchase and digital download or media streaming.

Jorge Martínez-Rios, professor of viola, had a very busy spring performing, conducting and serving as a clinician. Professor Martinez-Rios has been named the conductor of the New Horizons Symphony following the passing of Dr. Marianna Gabbi last year. He conducted the ensemble in February, featuring NMSU graduate students Amalia Zeitlin (violin), Julio Campos (viola) and professor of violin Simón Gollo as soloists. In may, he will conduct a Russian program featuring NMSU graduate Seth Zamora as soloist, performing the Rachmaninoff Piano Concerto No. 2. In late February, he joined with the CMI Chamber Orchestra in San Antonio, TX, presenting works by Alyssa Weinberg, Aaron Kermis and Dobrinka Tabakova. As a clinician, he also gave workshops and sectionals for 5 different youth orchestras in the San Antonio area. In March, he performed works by Bruch with the Youth Orchestra of Chihuahua, Mexico, and will also perform for the second time with the newly formed Orquesta de Camara de Ciudad Juárez in June.

Jorge Espinoza, professor of cello, also had an exciting winter and spring season, both locally and in Latin America. In January, he taught master classes in the 1st International Cello Festival in southern Chile (Chiloe) and performed as a soloist and conducted a small chamber string orchestra at the Universidad de La Frontera (UFRO). A new piece was written for Espinoza, Concerto for Cello and Orchestra by Cristian Aaron Pereira, which was premiered in two cities in Chile. Professor Espinoza has, since 2016, been invited to work with cello students in short visits funded in part by the Chilean government. Last year, two students from underserved areas of southern Chile visited NMSU and studied English (ESL classes), and had cello and violin lessons in preparation to apply to NMSU as string performance majors in the near future. In late February, he taught a master

class for Las Cruces and El Paso area high school students at NMSU. This summer, Professor Espinoza will be teaching and performing in North Carolina (CelloChill), Philadelphia (CelloSpeak) and California (Montecito International Music Festival).

Camerata del Sol, a new chamber ensemble founded by professor of violin Daniel Vega-Albela in 2017, and consisting of NMSU students, graduates and community members, presented a concert on April 5th in Atkinson Recital featuring two works, an unusual arrangement of Haydn's Seven Last Words of Christ for soloist and string quartet arranged by Spanish educator José Peris, as well as Chausson's beautiful Chanson Perpétuelle for piano quintet and voice. Both works featured Dr. Sarah Daughtrey, Voice Area Coordinator, as soloist, along with Vega-Albela, Dr. Laura Spitzer,

and graduate students Ida Holguin, Amalia Zeitlin, Julio Campos, and graduates Elizabeth Greene and Ceara Caisido. The group was also asked to perform the Haydn on Palm Sunday by the Bishop of Las Cruces, the Most Rev. Oscar Cantú.


