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

John Sanks, Myself, Stephen Snowden, Brad Dubbs, Tyler North and several others have at various time been able to attend the Mid-West Band and Orchestra Clinics in December in Chicago. The clinics are amazing with loads of great bands and orchestras performing the new music out today. Many sessions by world famous teachers and conductors on a variety of topics. It's a GREAT convention to attend!

Bruce Kroken sort of got us all started on going to MidWest, back in the 90s, etc...Bruce, being from Wisconsin, had attended MidWest MANY times in his early career, as did most of Eastern half of the country. We thought we were pioneers heading back to a new thing with Bruce and John in the early 2000s, watching amazing performance by concert/jazz bands, service bands, orchestra, jazz orchestras, it was exhilariting. If you read the article on the next page, come to find out that a VERY similar thing happened back in the early 1950's. Orin Barthalomew and John Pylman, both from Indiana, attended the MidWest convention in 1954 after settling in NM and their group immediately began to expand after they sang the praises of the convention. I guess we weren't the music pioneers we thought we were.

Another very innovative thing that

happened back in '54 was that Raphael Mendez was coming back to perform in Hobbs with an all-star band made up of 11 HS's from West Texas and Eastern NM. Pancho Romero of NMSU and I were both around when Raphael Mendez performed with NMSU at the President's concert in 1974. I had NO CLUE that he had been coming to NM and performing with local bands since the 50's that we know of and perhaps earlier. Bennett Shacklette had Raphael Mendez perform with the Santa Fe Band and Mendez gave his brass clinic before the concert.

Can you imagine 1000 kids performing a half time show in Carlsbad for something called Circus Daze? They must have included a LARGE amount of bands to get 1000 kids on the field.

The orchestra growth is amazing and documented by orchestra teachers around the state.

ENMU had a band day at a football game with 15 bands, UNM had a band day at a football game with 14 bands

Check out the calendar of Events, I'm amazed at all the festivals people were running all over the state! With the numbers of students going to them, they must have had massive numbers of volunteers to help out! PS - there are two more pages like this one, listing events.

A little bit further in the magazine is the entire schedule of events for the Jan. NMMEA conference, interesting to see what they did and where the concerts were placed, none were on Saturday by the way. :)

# Going Around the Horn ...

Two high school band directors, Orin Barthalomew of Eunice and John Pylman of Lovington, were lucky enough to make the annual Midwest Clinic, attended by some 4,000 band directors throughout the country, at Chicago in December. And they report a wonderful time with 3 days of swell demonstrations, discussions, concerts, etc., by the nation's top men.

And the nice thing about all of this is that their respective schools thought enough of the idea to finance it for both the instructors. No wonder both these schools are really moving forward with their instrumental programs. Rumor has it that already one more fellow will join the group next year. Bruce Robinson, band director at Portales, is reported to be planning such an excursion, perhaps under the same financial arrangement.

It is understood that plans call for the return of the world renown trumpeteer, Raphael Mendez, to Hobbs in early May. He appeared there last spring with an All-Star Band of selected players from 11 schools from New Mexico and West Texas furnishing the band for the program. Definite plans for the program will be furnished later.

An article from Carlsbad tells of over 1000 students participating in "Circus Daze," a half-time show under the direction of Stan Sibenthal. It was a tremendous success, according to those who witnessed it.

Report has it that Kenneth Bender, orchestra director of Alamogordo, is very well pleased with the development of the string program, as is Bill Cramer at Las Cruces, and Bennette Shacklette, Instrumental Director at Santa Fe. He likewise reports that their string program, under the direction of Emily Rumold, is beginning to grow. This is mighty good news to all of those interested in the growth of the orchestral program in the state.

And, incidentally, Mendez is to appear as a guest soloist with the fine Santa Fe band on a program in February. Those interested in knowing more about this program and the usual brass clinic Mendez holds with it should contact Shacklette, director of the band.

ENMU held its annual high school Band Page Ten Day in connection with their Homecoming this fall with 15 schools attending from New Mex. and West Texas. Also the U. of New Mexico had a Band Day in connection with one of their home football games with 14 bands from the central part of the state participating.

The Southwest District Instrumental Clinic, on Dec. 3 and 4, was a big success with 14 schools participating and all expressing the feeling that much was accomplished. Floren Thompson, Director of Bands at ENMU, went from there as a guest clinician to T. or G. where he guested at a local high school band program under the able direction of prexy Gregg Randall, and a mighty good program too. . .

Bands, choirs, orchestras, and all kinds of other groups, are doing much all over the state. A little bit of it we hear about from the directors, but most we have to pick up ourselves. Write us and let us know what you are doing.

Thursday will begin with our fa-

mous Keynote Speaker, Dr. Tim

Lautzenheiser. He inspires all who

hear him. You are going to love the Thursday workshops too which are quite varied in content and clinicians. \* "CAN I APP YOU A QUESTION?" presented by Cat Woo, Albuquerque Public Schools Fine Arts Department Elementary Music Teacher. students are digital natives, growing up in a world that is surrounded by technology. Students already have technology readily available in the forms of laptops, tablets, and phones. They use them. Why can't we, as teachers, use them for learning? In this session, participants will learn to flip the classroom and make the music classroom readily accessible to students. This session will not only help you discover useful apps that assist your day-to-day routines, but you will walk away with

tips on using tech in a meaningful and engaging way for our students.

Cat Woo is Orff Certified, received all three Kodaly levels training and two World Music Drumming levels in Albuquerque. She was Vice-President, President, and Past President for the New Mexico Orff-Schulwerk Association. She received her Bachelor of Music Education at New Mexico State University and her Master of Music Education from the University of New Mexico. She is an Apple Certified Teacher and is Google Level 2 Certified. During the 2018-19 school year, Cat served in her district's Digital Innovator Cohort. \* "POPULAR MUSIC EDUCATION AND THE MODERN BAND" presented by the non-profit, Little Kids Rock. This clinic will focus on teaching by doing before explaining using body percussion, vocal ensembles, popular repertoire and instruments.

\* "NO INSTRUMENTS? PROBLEM! BODY PERCUSSION AS AN INTRO TO IMPROVISA-TION" by Otto Gross, a curriculum developer for Ouaver Music. You don't need a full set of classroom instruments to give your students an amazing musical experience. Open up the world of storytelling, improvisation, and composition to your students using the instrument they carry with them ---their bodies! Teachers will walk away with activities that can easily be used to enhance any lesson or serve as inspiration for lesson planning.

Otto Gross II graduated cum laude from Berklee College of Music with a degree in Music Education. He taught General Music, Band, Chorus, Jazz Band, and Percussion in Massachusetts, Maryland, and Tennessee. He is a Certified AOSA Orff-Schulwerk Educator having completed Orff Levels I, II, and III. He has performed with artists including Bobby McFerrin, The Marsalis Brothers,

and Cece Winans. Otto has toured internationally with EMI artists as a music director, pianist, bassist, and drummer. Otto currently works as a producer, songwriter, clinician, actor, and music curriculum developer for QuaverMusic.com. He teaches under the stage name "Austin Otto", performing for schools, universities, conferences, and more. Otto has a passion for bringing people together to experience and create music.

\* "LATIN SONGS" by Mirna Cabrera, a choral conductor and music instructor at Mid-Plains Community College in McCook, Nebraska. This session will focus on classroom tested Latin American songs and games for various ages. Strategies will be shared for using folk music as a tool to help students lean within an integrated curriculum binding language literacy and cultural enrichment with music. Her Spanish songs and games will provide fun new activities and performance practice materials for your classroom, including translations and a Spanish language diction guide.

Dr. Mirna Cabrera was born in Holguin, Cuba. She is a choral conductor and music professor whose musical interests span from art choral music to children's folk repertoire and world music. Her Master of Music in choral conducting and Doctorate of Musical Arts degrees were earned at the University of Kansas. She is a certified Kodaly music educator who studied in Hungary and has taught music to pre-K through post graduate students for over twenty years. Dr. Cabrera is sought after to conduct choirs and share her book-CD publication A la rueda, rueda, a Hispanic folk song publication which she co-edited with Cuban ethnomusicologist Martha Esquenazi. The publication's CD is a product of her work with Hispanic Kansas City area children and youth from

2008-2009, and the folk songs are a product of extensive field work both in Cuba and the United States. Dr. Cabrera currently teaches at Mid-Plains Community College, McCook, Nebraska where she directs the concert choir and instrumental ensembles, as well as teach music theory for majors and music history for non-majors.

\* "TEACHING UKULELE THROUGH POPULAR MUSIC AND THE MODERN BAND" presented by the non-profit, Little Kids Rock. This clinic will use technique, reading charts, play along and videos to introduce this fresh approach to ukulele teaching.
\* "CREATING THROUGH FOLK DANCE" by Virginia Weaver, an elementary music teacher from Farimington. This clinic will focus on creative folk dancing.

\* "THE JAM ZONE-TECH TOOLS FOR USING POPULAR MUSIC IN YOUR CLASSROOM" presented by the non-profit, Little Kids Rock. This session will explore using the Internet to find Song Charts through the Jam Zone. How to teach by doing before explaining using videos and practice lessons giving direction without explanation. Teaching improvisation using popular music, technology and the pentatonic scale will also be covered.

\* "TUCUMCARI NYOKA MARIM-BA BAND" is the Elementary Honor Ensemble this year. You will not want to miss this fantastic concert! Andrew Kesten's ensemble will perform in Popejoy at 3-3:30PM on Thursday.

\* "FOLK DANCE SESSION" by Paul Halsted and Carla Haynes. This folk dance session will highlight dances from Phyllis Weikart's Teaching Movement and Dance. Carla and Paul are experts at decoding and making sense of this popular folk dance book. Come and reset through dancing! Join us Friday for our amazing headliner, Terri Scullin. Her focus on curriculum integration, "CONNECT WITH PURPOSE!" will be split into three sessions. The first session will offer lessons on how to integrate the Arts and science. The second session will cover lessons about how to integrate language arts and the Arts. The third session will share lessons on how to integrate Social Studies and the Arts.

Terri Scullin graduated from Boston University in 1988 with Bachelor's Degrees in Music Education and Vocal Performance. #### **ALL STATE GUITAR CLINICIAN:**

Chuck Hulihan, has enjoyed a career over the past two plus decades as a guitarist, educator, conductor, narrator, arts administrator, and as a classical music radio host. Chuck has directed the guitar program at Glendale Community College since 1999, where he is the Assistant Department Chair for Performing Arts, and in 2015 he was chosen by his peers to receive the GCC Gaucho Globe Award for Supporting Student Success. His work at GCC is highlighted by collaborations with composers whom have written new works for the GCC Guitar Ensembles, including Mark Houghton, Rex Willis, Jan Bartlema, Adrian Andrei, Frank Wallace, Andrew York, Vito Nicola Paradiso, Francisco Munoz, Aramis Silvereke, and Phil Moloso. Since 2000, his students have consistently won the Artists of Promise competition in both solo guitar and instrumental ensemble categories, and in 2014 the GCC Guitar Octet won the Guitar Foundation of America's Ensemble Showcase Competition and went on to perform two world premieres at the 2014 convention.

Chuck's work as a conductor has included over 50 concerts directing the GCC Guitar Ensembles and includes leading large orchestras comprising students from high school, college, and guitar society ensembles. He has led the Arizona Guitar Orchestra (AZGO), a collaboration of musicians from across Arizona, in three statewide tours that featured Shingo Fujii's Concierto de Los Angeles with soloist William Kanengiser, Brad Richter's Once We Moved Like the Wind, and Andrew York's By Chants with the Los Angeles Guitar Quartet. He has been a featured guest conductor with the Clark County School District Honor Ensemble, the Vanguard University Guitar Festival Orchestra, the State College of Florida Guitar Ensemble. The Sonoran Desert Guitars Festival Ensemble, Austin Classical Guitar's Guitar Curriculum National Teacher Training Summit and Guitar Ensemble's Festival, and Florida and Virginia All-State Guitar Ensembles. He is the Director of the Guitar Foundation of America's Youth Guitar Orchestra, Community Guitar Orchestra, and Guitar Summit. Music education doesn't just reach the students in our classrooms. It enriches communities, strengthens families, and builds maraderie. The upcoming NMMEA All-State Music Festival and Conference is an excellent place for anyone to do just what Cage and Kent were asking. For our col-

legiate students, there will once again be a roundtable discussion featuring our guest conductors and clinicians. This event, held in the conference hotel, provides the collegiate students a wonderful opportunity to chat with the professionals and glean valuable advice from their personal experiences. In addition to this event, I would highly recommend that everyone attend the wonderful clinic sessions offered throughout the conference and watch the performances given by this year's honor groups. As one bit of personal advice to the collegiate attendees, I would encourage you to also attend the rehearsals. Find scores to the repertoire and go watch master teachers work. That alone, can be invaluable to your growth. Also, don't just watch rehearsals in your area. If you are an instrumentalist, go to choral rehearsals, if you are a vocalist attend the band and orchestra rehearsals. Pull as much out of the experiences made available to you as you I look forward to seeing everyone in Albuquerque in January. All the best.

The instruments Nyoka currently plays on were hand-made by Peter Bush with Rosebush Marimba. Mr. Bush delivered the instruments in April, 2017. These types of instruments were invented in Mozambique, Zimbabwe. Therefore, marimba bands typically choose their name from the language of the Shona tribe. The name Nyoka means "snake." The TES school mascot is the Rattler, but there is no word for rattler in the Shona language.

Nyoka is supported financially through generous grants and donations from New Mexico Arts (a division of Cultural Affairs), the McMullen Foundation for Education and Altrusa of Tucumcari.

Andrew Kesten has been teaching elementary school music for 23 years. His current position includes kindergarten through fifth grade music classes at Tucumcari Elementary School. In addition to regular music classes, Mr. Kesten directs the Nyoka Marimba Band made up of fourth, fifth and sixth grade students. Before his current position, Mr. Kesten taught for sixteen years in the greater Houston area. Andrew Kesten holds a Bachelor of Music from the University of Houston and a Master's degree in Kodály pedagogy from The Hartt School, University of Hartford, Connecticut. Mr. Kesten completed Orff levels training at the University of Houston and the University of Texas at Brownsville. He is currently continuing his studies and professional development through World Music Drumming.

Sight-Reading Made Simple This clinic we will discuss the research behind sight-reading improvement, activities for ensembles to improve sight-reading, and resources for you and your students. Improving sight-reading will improve so many other aspects of your classroom and make MPA a breeze!

Josephine Gonzales is a proud Albuquerque native. She received her Bachelors in Music Performance in oboe summa cum laude from Arizona State University in 2010. Pedagogical Tips and Tricks for Improving Your Ensemble
In this two-part series, hear from successful middle school band directors and learn their top pedagogical tips and tricks for improvement in tone and technique when teaching young musicians. Attendees will take away assured strategies to implement in their young bands.

Woodwind Panel: Stephanie Lenhart (Gattis MS), Melissa Rice-Perez (Marshall MS), Katie Tomicek (Las Cruces Catholic School)

Stephanie Lenhart joined the band faculty in Clovis, NM as the head band director at Gattis Middle School in Fall 2014. Originally from El Paso, TX, she attended West Texas A&M University in Canyon, TX where she received her Bachelor's in Music with All-Level Teacher Certification. During her time at WTAMU, she studied saxophone under Don Lefevre and was a member of West Texas



A&M University's Symphonic Band. Ms. Lenhart has led the Gattis Band to numerous superior ratings at their district contest. Many of the Gattis Band students have also been members of the Southeast All-

District Honor Band. The Gattis Concert Band was awarded Best in Class in the Junior-Varsity Band division at the Greater Southwest Music Festival in both Spring of 2017 and 2019. In January of 2018, the Gattis Symphonic Band was

invited to perform at the New Mexico All-State Music Conference as the 2018 New Mexico State Honor Band and later that semester the band was named State Champions at the Middle School State Concert Band Contest. Ms. Lenhart is currently working on her Master's in Music Education at the American Band College through Central Washington University and plans to graduate in the summer of 2020. She looks forward to many more years in Clovis, NM.

Melissa Rice-Pérez is in her fifth year as band director at Marshall Middle School as well as serving as an assistant for the Clovis High School Band. She is a graduate of Washington State University (M.A. 2014) and Eastern New Mexico University (B.M. 2011).

In her time at Marshall Middle School, the Symphonic Band has earned consecu-



tive sweepstakes Superior ratings **SENMMEA** in Perfor-Music Assessmance ments, as well as placing second in the **NMAA** Middle School State Band Com-

petition in 2017. Her students have high representation in the SENMMEA Honor Band, and have earned consistent Superior ratings for her Concert and Cadet Bands at the Greater Southwest Music Festival in Amarillo, TX. Since Mrs. Rice-Pérez started at Marshall Middle School, the band program has increased by almost 80 students. Melissa has adjudicated in New Mexico and Texas, and has worked as a clinician for band programs in the area.

As a clarinetist, Mrs. Rice-Pérez is experienced in band, orchestral, chamber, and solo music. Melissa has had the opportunity to participate in intercollegiate bands in Orlando, FL, Phoenix, AZ, Seattle, WA, and Springfield, MA. She has served as principal clarinetist in many wind ensembles, including the Eastern New Mexico University Wind Symphony and the Washington State University Wind Ensemble with whom she performed as solo clarinetist for George Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue at Benaroya Hall in Seattle, WA. She was second clarinetist for the Washington-Idaho Symphony during her time in Washington, as well as principal clarinetist in the Washington State University Symphony Orchestra for the entirety of her graduate career. Melissa was featured, along with Dr. Jennifer Laubenthal, on Mendelssohn's Concert Piece No. 2 accompanied by the Eastern New Mexico University Wind Symphony in a performance at the historic Lensic Performing Arts Center in Santa Fe in March of 2017.

As an academic, Mrs. Rice-Pérez has researched and written on many topics pertaining to the clarinet, the history of religious music, and band pedagogy. Her primary documents include an essay on the Baroque period entitled Martin Luther, The Protestant Reformation, and the Musical Results as well as her graduate thesis, A Study of the History, Pedagogy, and Aesthetics of Vibrato on the Clarinet.

Melissa currently serves as President for the Southeast District of the New Mexico Music Educators Association and is the Vice President of the Board for the Eastern New Mexico University Alumni Band. She has studied under Dr. Tamara Raatz, Dr. Jennifer Laubenthal, and Dr. Shannon Scott; Mr. Dustin Seifert and Dr. Danh Pham are her primary mentors. She is a member of the International Clarinet Association, National Association for Music Educators, New Mexico Music Educators Association, and a Life Member of Kappa Kappa Psi National Honorary Band Fraternity. She lives in her historic Clovis home with two rescue dogs and her husband, Daniel.

Katie Tomicek has been teaching and performing flute for over 25 years in Las Cruces, New Mexico. She has grown and maintained a private flute studio since graduating from the University of Northern Colorado in 1994. She has had the honor of producing more than 180 NMMEA All-State qualifiers on flute



and piccolo. Her students have gone on to study music at many prestigious programs such as Juilliard, Peabody, the University of Michigan, Rice and the Eastman School of Music.

Ms. Tomicek performed with the Las Cruces Symphony for 12 years before becoming the Executive Director of the organization in 2013. After a few years of

serving as an arts administrator, she found herself drawn back to teaching and now serves as the Band Director at Las Cruces Catholic School. Ms. Tomicek also teaches colorguard. In the past, she taught at both Mayfield and Centennial High Schools and currently serves as the Colorguard Coordinator for the Pride of New Mexico at New Mexico State University.

Alexander Austell graduated from the University of New Mexico with a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education in May of 2016. Alex is currently the Director of Bands at Rio Rancho Middle School and the Associate Band Director at Rio Rancho High School. Before becoming a certified teacher with Rio Rancho Public Schools, Alex had been mastering his skills as a musician and educator by performing with a variety of ensembles, and receiving instruction from the music education faculty, at the University of New Mexico.

As a trumpet player, Alex performed in



the top groups at UNM such as the Wind Symphony, Symphony Orchestra, Jazz I and Jazz II, and various chamber groups. Outside of his time spent at

UNM, Alex has played with New Mexico Philharmonic and occasionally plays as a professional musician for pit orchestras, chamber groups, and jazz groups in the Albuquerque and Santa Fe areas. In March of 2016, Alex even had the opportunity to perform in the semifinals at the National Trumpet Competition in Columbus, GA. Chuck Gerheart A native of New Mexico and in his twenty-third year of teaching, Charles Gerheart is a third generation music educator. In his twenty-one years as the band director at Cobre High School. Gerheart's ensembles have consistently earned Superior ratings in marching and concert festivals in and out of New Mexico. Under his direction, the Cobre High School Concert Band has won the NMAA State Concert Band Competition for Class AAA/AAAA seventeen out of the past twenty-one years. The Cobre band has participated in clinics for the University of

New Mexico, MENC-SW Division Symposium, and TMEA. Gerheart is a member of the NM Phi Beta Mu, and has served as the Band Vice President, President, past President of New Mexico music Educators Association, and served eighteenth years on the



NMAA/NMMEA State Band Contest Advisory Council. Charles was inducted into the NMMEA Hall of Fame in 2018, and in 2013 received the NMMEA Music Educator of the Year, and was

awarded the NEA-New Mexico Award for Teaching Excellence. Charles Gerheart is a graduate of Los Alamos High School and the University of Wyoming.

Joseph Flores has been teaching middle school and high school band programs in the El Paso, Texas and Las Cruces, New Mexico areas since 1997. In his career, Mr. Flores has taught at several schools. Most notably, he has taught at Las Cruces High School, Onate High School, Centennial High School, Zia Middle School, and now oversees all Fine Arts curriculum and activities for Las Cruces Public Schools.

Under his direction, all of his groups have consistently earned superior ratings and have been recognized at local, state, and national levels for musical excellence. While at Las Cruces High School, the music department was recognized as a Grammy Foundation Signature School in 2000. Also, during his tenure at Las Cruces the LCHS Jazz Band was selected as the 2002 Jazz Honor Band by the New Mexico Jazz Educators (NMJE). While at Onate High School, the OHS Royal Knight Regiment marching band earned high finals placement at all competitions, including Bands of America Regionals. Additionally, while at OHS, the Symphonic Wind

Ensemble won the 2009 state championship for concert bands hosted by the New Mexico Activities Association (NMAA).

In 2012, Mr. Flores was selected to open



rector of bands and elective department head. In its inaugural year, the CHS band program opened with less than 60 students. In four years the program more than doubled in enrollment size and offered a comprehensive band program with marching band, multiple concert bands, multiple jazz bands, winterguard, and a chamber music program. Under Mr. Flores' direction all Centennial band programs were widely recognized for their very high level of success in musical achievement on the field and in the concert hall. In 2016 the CHS Wind Symphony won the state championship for concert bands hosted by the NMAA. In addition to his responsibilities with the Centennial band program, Mr. Flores was also the co-conductor of the CHS Symphony Orchestra. The CHS Symphony Orchestra won the state championship for orchestras hosted by the NMAA in 2014, 2015, and 2016 and was selected as the 2016 honor orchestra by the New Mexico Music Educators Association (NMMEA). Additionally, Mr. Flores was nominated for the 2016 Golden Apple Award by the New Mexico Golden Apple Foundation, selected as the 2016-2017 NMMEA Music Educator of the Year, and selected as the recipient of the 2018-2019 NMMEA Rollie Heltman Award.

Mr. Flores teaches tuba and euphonium privately. He has also regularly served as a guest conductor with the Mesilla Valley Concert Band and the New Horizons Symphony Orchestra, both in Las Cruces, New Mexico. Additionally, Mr. Flores is active as a guest speaker, guest conductor, adjudicator, and clinician. He has presented several clinics to fellow music educators at the NMMEA All-State Music Festival and In-Service Conference.

Professionally, Mr. Flores has served as President of the NMMEA Southwest District and he has also served as Band Division Vice-President, President, and Past-President for the entire NMMEA state organization. Lastly, Mr. Flores is a member and Past President of the New Mexico Chapter of the International Band Master's Fraternity, Phi Beta Mu.

Pamela Towry Church is the Director of Bands for the Cimarron, New Mexico Municipal Schools. She teaches grades 6-12 for the district. A native of Dallas, Texas, Ms. Towry attended the University of Texas at Austin, earning her Bachelor of Music degree (1979) as well as her Master of Music degree (1985) in Instrumental Conducting. She taught in the public schools in Texas prior to assuming the position of Assistant Professor of Music, Associate Director of Bands, and Percussion Instructor at Northwestern State University of Louisiana in 1987. Ms. Towry moved to New Mexico in 1990, teaching at Santa Fe High School for two years before serving as the Music Department Chair and Director of Bands at Los Alamos High School until the spring of 2000. She re-established the band program in Cimarron in the fall of 2000. A frequent adjudicator and clinician in the Southwest, she conducts honor bands, marching and percussion clinics, and band workshops throughout the year. In its third year of existence under her direction, the "Cimarron Wind Ensemble" was awarded "First Place" in Division A-AA at the New Mexico Activities Association's State Concert Band Contest in 2003. They have since garnered eleven more A-AA State Championship titles.

Ms. Towry has served in several capacities on the Board of Directors and Ex-

She was the Cimarron Municipal Schools' "Teacher of the Year" in 2007 and 2011, and was the 2011 National Federation of High Schools "Outstanding Music Educator" for the state of New Mexico. In 2012 she was named "New Mexico Music Educator of the Year." Ms. Towry was inducted into New Mexico Music Educator's Associations' "Hall of Fame" in January of 2015. The current school year marks her 40th year of teaching. Pam and her husband Russell reside in Red River, New Mexico.

Braving the Road Less Traveled: Modern Concert Literature for Modern Winds (Bleeding Edge and Otherwise)

Selection of quality literature is one of the most important responsibilities for the modern conductor. Fortunately, the modern wind band medium is one of the most compositionally dynamic in history. Unfortunately, great new music often goes undiscovered and unperformed - especially music that is selfpublished by individual composers or small collectives. Some of this music may be a perfect fit for your ensemble. In this clinic, we will discuss repertoire selection philosophy and practice with special emphasis on newer and more hard-to-find literature. In addition, we will delve into topics such as new composers worth following, places to look for new literature, composer and content diversity in literature selection, commissioning new works and concert programming in demanding situations (such as limited instrumentations, joint performances and solo features).

Tyler North is currently the Director of Bands at Sandia High School where he has taught in various capacities for almost 19 years. Presently, Mr. North serves as director of 2 concert ensembles, 1 jazz ensemble and a steel ensemble as well as directing the Matador marching and athletic bands. During his tenure at Sandia High School, these

ensembles have consistently garnered first-division ratings at festivals around the state and region. In addition, the Sandia Wind Ensemble was named the NMAA Centennial Band in May of 2012.

Before beginning his career SHS, Mr. North received undergraduate and graduate degrees at Fort Hays State University (Hays, KS) and the University of New Mexico (Albuguerque, NM) respectively. In pursuit of his post-secondary degrees, Mr. North has had the honor to work with many fine educators including Lyle Dilley, David Wilborn, Michael Robinson, Eric Rombach-Kendall and Bruce Dalby. Mr. North is also certified in both AP Music Theory and IB Music instruction.

Mr. North is an active member of the New Mexico Music Educators Association, serving as vice-president of bands for the Albuquerque district for 8 years and president for 5 years. Mr. North has also supported the future of music edu-



cation by working with many student-directors over the years, many of whom have gone on to have wonderful careers of their own. Finally Mr. North is in frequent demand as a clinician

and adjudicator around the states of New Mexico and Kansas.

Mr. North currently resides in Albuquerque, New Mexico, with his wife, Jean (without whom the last vestiges of his sanity would have slipped away years ago), his daughter Amara, and his yellow Labrador, Nana (without whom his clothing would not have its customary coating of yellow dog hair).

Band: It's not life, but a great way to live! The purpose of this session is to inspire collaboration among students' thorough motivational techniques based in relevant and practical applications of their musical activities to their daily lives. This clinic focuses on both the educational theories of Maslow, and the motivational techniques of Carnegie, Pink, and Covey. My focus is using "real world" analogies and justifications to help students reach beyond the now and believe that their efforts now are beneficial both for immediate and future success.

Steven L. Smyth is the Associate Director of Bands and Music Education Coordinator at New Mexico State University, where he conducts the NMSU Symphonic Band, the Pride of New Mexico Marching Band, Roadrunner Basketball Band, and teaches courses in Music Education. Previously, Dr. Smyth held similar positions at Iowa State University and the University of Central Arkansas.



Smyth taught in both the public and private schools of Iowa where his groups experienced significant growth in participation and excellence of performance. Dr. Smyth holds degrees from Iowa State University, Oklahoma State University, and the University of Kansas. Dr. Smyth's research interests are in Live Cinema and the commissioning of newscores for windband and movies of the silent era (1885 - 1929).

Motivating and Preparing Students to Be Effective Practicers Individual practice is essential for students to gain skills and grow in musicianship. All too often, however, our guidance to our students is little more than, "Now go home and practice." Using a practical and developmental approach, Royston will discuss the importance of teaching students how to practice and suggest ways the teacher can address some of these strategies in the classroom. This clinic will be presented with many ideas and resources that will be able to be adapted and implemented immediately by the instrumental music teacher at any level. The session will include information on motivating students to practice, creating goal-based practice charts, utilizing effective practice activities and strategies, organization and time-management of the practice session, self reflection, and assessment. In addition, advice will be offered regarding including and educating parents in the need and the most effective approaches to student practice.

Natalie Steele Royston is an Associate Professor and Coordinator of Music Education at Iowa State University. Prior

to her current appointment, Dr. Royston served for three years with the Iowa State University bands, most recently as Associate Director of Bands, Director of the Cyclone Marching Band, director of the basketball Pep Band, and conductor of the Concert Band. Previously, she served as Associate Director of Bands at Abilene Christian University in Abilene, Texas and taught in the public schools of Ohio where her ensembles received consistent superior ratings at district and state events. She is also a graduate a Highland High School in Albuquerque and was a multiyear member of NM All-State and AYS. Dr. Royston received a Bachelor of Music Education degree and Master of Music degrees in Trombone Performance and Wind Conducting from Ohio University and a PhD in Music Education from



the University of North Texas. Her biography is published in several recent editions of Who's Who Among America's Teachers. She has

held memberships in Phi Kappa Phi, Pi Kappa Lambda, Tau Beta Sigma, Mu Phi Epsilon, Music Educators National Conference, the College Band Directors National Association, and the Iowa, Ohio, and Texas Music Educators' Association. Dr. Royston is an active clinician and researcher. She has presented at conferences and research symposiums across the country and is published in the Journal of Research in Music Education, the Journal of Music Teacher Education, Update: Applications of Research in Music Education, Research and Issues in Music Education. Contributions to Music Education, the Music Educators Journal, and the Instrumentalist.

Unhelpful Conducting Habits Learned from "Helping" Students This session will highlight some conducting habits of the monly seen in music educators at all levels. We will discuss the wellintentioned origins of these habits and as well as the communicative and educational difficulties they tend to cause. Alternative conducting gestures or rehearsal strategies will be presented, and the session will conclude with some basic suggestions for conductors wishing to improve their conducting.

Matt Casarez, better known as "Mr. C", is currently in his 13th year as Director of Bands at Rio Rancho High School and in his 15th year of teaching. Mr. C was also the band director at Eagle Ridge MS and Rio Rancho Mid-High during his time as Associate Director at RRHS. Before coming to RRHS, Mr. C taught at LBJ MS in Albuquerque as well as Cibola HS. Before moving to New Mexico, Mr. Casarez was the Assistant Director at Pflugerville HS in Austin, TX.

Mr. C graduated from Texas State University in San Marcos, TX with a Bachelor's Degree in Music Education in 2000. Mr. Casarez received his Master of Music in Trumpet Performance in 2004 from The University of New Mexico. While at UNM he was principal trumpet in both the Wind Symphony and Symphony Orchestra.

Creating an Inclusive Environment: A Practical Guide to Applying Teaching Skills to Students with Autism- Andrea Rutan

Andrea Rutan started her university studies at the University of Memphis in 2007 where she received a BA in viola performance under Lenny Schranze. During that time Andrea performed in several masterclasses for solo viola and chamber music under teachers such as Victor Asuncion, Soh Hyun Park-Altino, Leo Altino, and Timothy Shiu. In 2012 Andrea began her studies in the Master's Program for String Pedagogy under world renowned pedagogue Susan Kempter at The University of New Mexico. She continued to receive viola instruction under Kimberly Fredenbergh. Since receiving her MA Andrea has performed with The New Mexico Philharmonic, Santa Fe Symphony, ProMusica, Chatter, San Juan Symphony as well as other organizations in the community. Andrea is



also a member of The Empire String Quartet in Albuquerque, NM. In 2015 Andrea became the Lead Teaching Artist for the New Mexico Philharmonic's

youth education program called The Young Musician's Initiative – an extension of El Sistema. Andrea has conducted clinics and masterclass in and around Albuquerque, NM for middle and high school orchestras. She currently maintains a studio in the Albuquerque area that serves students on the Autism Spectrum. Andrea has been a caretaker for children with ASD for eleven years and draws on her personal experiences

with these individuals to modify her teaching in the studio.

This hour-long presentation will guide teachers on practical applications for teaching stringed instruments to students with Autism (ASD). We will go over behavior modifications for classroom management, common manipulatives used for teaching string skills as well as a review of videotaped lessons with a student diagnosed on the Autism Spectrum

He is published in Teaching Music Through Performance in Band, Volume I, and has produced, collaborated on, or directed numerous professional recordings. Professor Simons holds a Bachelor of Music Education from the University of Montana, Missoula, where he graduated with a president's recognition award, a Master of Music in Wind Conducting from Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, and a Doctorate in Wind Conducting from the University of Kansas, Lawrence.

Rebecca Simons has been the orchestra director at La Cueva High School since January of 2011. In that time, the orchestra program has grown tremendously as the program just grew from 2 ensembles to 3. Under her direction, both Camerata



and String Orchestra have received superior ratings at district, state, and national festivals. The LCHS Camerata Orchestra was selected in

2017, as the NMMEA honor orchestra. In 2019, Camerata was accepted to and performed for the National Orchestra Festival as part of the American String Teachers Association's national conference. Under Mrs. Simons' direction, Camerata won 3 consecutive NMAA state championships while the competition was in existence. From 2013-2015, Mrs. Simons served as the NMMEA Orchestra Vice President for the state, served on the committee for the NMAA state orchestra competition, and assisted the La Cueva High School music department as they received their first ever NAMM Support Music Merit Award in 2015. Autumn Overture Concert Series NMSU's Autumn Overture Concert Series, begun last fall as part of the "Partners for Musical Excellence" campaign, began with a Faculty Chamber recital on Sunday, October 2, in Atkinson Recital Hall. On the program were Voigt's Nocturno for Clarinet, Horn, and Piano with horn professor Nancy Joy and visiting clarinet professor Yasmin Flores as well as the Saint-Saëns Tarantella for Flute, Clarinet, and Piano, with Ms. Flores and Lisa Van Winkle, flute. Also presented were Ravel's Chansons madécasses, with Sarah Daughtrey, mezzo-soprano, Laura Spitzer, piano, Jorge Espinoza, cello and Dr. Van Winkle, flute. The brass faculty (Ms. Joy, Allan Kaplan, trombone and Pancho Romero, trumpet) was featured in Ewazen's A Philharmonic Fanfare, and the percussion faculty (Fred Bugbee and Michael Armendariz) performed Tyson's Vertical River, along with Koshinski's Pocket Grooves with Katie Brennan, bassoon and Michael Armendariz. The program concluded with La Catrina String Quartet performing the Quartet No. 1, Op. 20 by Alberto Ginastera. The series continued with three concerts during the second week of October; the first concert featuring the Wind Symphony & Symphonic Band on October 11 in a "Picturesque Pastiche" of works by composers such as Grainger, Hindemith, Alford and Arnold. Among the highlights were Short Ride in a Fast Machine by John Adams, Down East Fanfare by Jack Stamp, and an arrangement for band of Eric Whitacre's Sleep. The Wind Symphony was led by Ms. Ingrid Larragoity-Martin and the Symphonic Band was conducted by visiting assistant professor, Mr. Cheldon Williams.

The NMSU Choirs performed Thursday, October 13 in a concert entitled "The Traveler's Heart," under the leadership of Dr. John Flanery, Director of Choral Activities, with graduate students Christa Fredrickson leading the Women's Chorale and Carol Nike as assistant conductor. Senior music education major Evan Stoor led a number for The Statesmen (men's chorus) and both the Masterworks Chorus and University Singers were led by Dr. Flanery. Works on the concert were wide-ranging, from composers such as Victoria and Purcell, to Copland, Mulholland, Moses Hogan and Rene Clausen.

The final concert in the series, presented Saturday, October 15, showcase NMSU's Jazz Ensembles, led by Dr. Pancho Romero, in a concert of classic and contemporary compositions, entitled "Vintage and Progressive". Included were

such pieces as "Don't Get Sassy" by Thad Jones, "But Beautiful," arranged by Bill Holman, "Vortex (Endless Winter)" by Patty Darling, and "Dizzyland" by Don Menza.

The "Partners for Musical Excellence" campaign encourages donors to contribute to scholarship funds that will serve to enhance the education of future music educators and performers studying at NMSU.

#### Ensemble News

The Wind Symphony and the Symphonic Band presented a concert on November 16, performing works including Copland (Emblems), and Kathryn Salfelder (Cathedrals) as well Respighi's popular Pines of Rome arranged by Guy Duker. The Wind Symphony is led by Ms. Ingrid Larragoity-Martin. The Symphonic Band, conducted by visiting assistant professor, Mr. Cheldon Williams, performed David Gillingham's At Morning's First Light, John Mackey's march, Xerxes, and John Barnes' Chance Blue Lake Overture.

The 48th Annual Jazz Festival and "Jazz Jump Start" took place on November 17-18, with workshops and clinics with featured artists Mike Anthony, guitar, Andy Poling, drums and Hillary Smith, vocals. The Festival culminated in two concerts, presented by the NMSU Jazz Ensemble I along with the featured artists.

The first concert presented by the NMSU Philharmonic Orchestra under the baton of Simón Gollo, newly appointed this fall as assistant professor of violin and conductor of the orchestra, took place on November 9 in Atkinson Hall. The program included Tchaikovsky's Serenade for Strings op. 48, Beethoven's Overture to Egmont Op. 84, with Boccherini's Cello Concerto Nr. 6 in D major featuring soloist Jorge Espinoza, assistant professor of cello and member of La Catrina.

The fall's busy choral activities season culminated with all of the NMSU choirs performing December 3 - 4 with the Las Cruces Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Dr. Lonnie Klein, performing part I of Handel's Messiah as well as Christopher Rouse's Karolju. The University Singers also traveled to Santa Fe and Albuquerque in October with performances at the Cathedral Basilica of St. Francis of Assisi and area high schools, as well as performing with the Universidad Autónoma de Ciudad Juárez in a joint concert at St. Mark's Church in El Paso on September 29. The University Singers were also part of a Veteran's Day concert with the Wind Symphony and Symphonic Bands on the Downtown Main Stage in Las Cruces on November 11.

The NMSU Horn Choir, affectionately known as The NMSU "Corno Crew," will be a featured performing ensemble at the Southwest Horn Conference held at Phoenix College in Phoenix, AZ, January 27-29, 2017. They will perform a world premiere, composed by sophomore horn student Joshua Anders, featuring modern horns, a natural horn, kudu horn, conch shells, a shofar, as well as several students demonstrating Mongolian throat singing. Their program opens with a Fanfare by Douglas Campbell and then closes with Silverado by Bruce Broughton. In addition to The Corno Crew's performance, Ms. Joy will also perform as a contributing artist during the weekend.

Faculty News and Campus Performances

Allan Kaplan, professor of trombone, recorded the music of Led Zeppelin this past fall with the El Paso Jazz Collective. The EPJC is a group whose focus is to create new arrangements of music from the jazz cannon and beyond, as well as performing educational concerts and workshops for young students and musicians in the region. The EPJC has performed

at several venues in both El Paso and Las Cruces. This year the group is focusing on the music of Kennedy Center Honorees, Led Zeppelin. Arrangements will include: "Stairway to Heaven", "Kashmir", "The Ocean", "Going to California", "Lemon Song", "Dancing Days", "Misty Mountain Hop", "Whole Lotta Love" and more. In the past the El Paso Jazz Collective has featured the music of NEA Jazz Master Herbie Hancock. On October 4, La Catrina String Quartet presented a recital of varied quartets in Atkinson Recital Hall. Featured were Mozart's Quartet in G; the Shostakovich Quartet No. 8, op. 110, and several Latin American works for string quartet.

During the fall semester, horn professor Nancy Joy presented several All-State Horn Audition Clinics in Albuquerque and in southern New Mexico.

In the fall of 2016, Dr. John Flanery, Director of Choral Activities, was featured as guest conductor for festivals and honor choirs in Hattiesburg, MS, Memphis, TN and at Indiana University of Pennsylvania.

NMSU Faculty and students were a strong presence at the College Music Society's National Conference in Santa Fe on November 27-29. Dr. Sarah Daughtrey (Voice Area Coordinator), Dr. Laura Spitzer (Assoc. Professor of Piano) and Dr. Fred Bugbee (Director of Percussion Studies) were selected to present a performance of works from Peter Garland's experimental music journal Soundings, published in Santa Fe in the 1970's and '80's. Also featured during the Conference were two performances by visiting assistant professor of clarinet, Yasmin Flores, first in the CMS Performers' Showcase, and then in the Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival's Conference engagement event entitled "Bringing Music to Children". Junior piano performance major CJ Andrews also participated in a master class.

Dr. Daughtrey was also selected to present as part of the Texoma Region of NATS (National Assoc. of Teachers of Singing) Artist Series at its annual conference at West Texas A&M University in Canyon, TX on November 2-5. She performed a short program of Brazilian song, as well as presenting an interactive session on Brazilian Portuguese diction. Dr. Daughtrey and guest pianist Dr. Justin Badgerow, of Elizabethtown College in PA, also presented a recital of Brazilian piano and vocal works on November 1 in Atkinson Recital Hall. Dr. Badgerow also gave a master class to NMSU piano students on October 31.

Junior piano performance major CJ Andrews was selected to participate in the College Music Society's national conference "Master Pedagogue" session with Robert Weirich, who serves on the faculty of the UMKC Conservatory of Music and Dance, and has previously taught at the Peabody Conservatory of Music, Northwestern University, and the Eastern Music Festival. Two NMSU Music Department alumni performed on a joint concert of the U.S. Military Academy Band (West Point Band) and the Herald Trumpets of the U.S. Army Band (Pershing's Own) for the annual "1812 Overture" Concert in September at West Point, NY; Master Sergeant Mike Cano (1993), Group Leader of the Ceremonial Band at Pershing's Own and Sergeant Major Christopher Jones (1992), Element Leader of the West Point Concert and Marching Band and Drum Major Emeritus. The Herald Trumpets made a special trip from Washington, D.C. to join on the West Point Band's big end of the summer event per-

These projects involve choral, string and band organizations, and have NAfME members donating two hours per week to middle and high school music programs, offering tutoring, instrument repair, rehearsal time, and sectionals. 7th & 8th graders from various Las Cruces middle schools met on a weekly basis to receive sectionals, master classes, lessons and ensemble experience from the music education students at NMSU under the leadership of Ms. Larragoity-Martin and Kristen Major. MSCE's semester's activities concluded with a December 7th concert featuring student conductors in works including Oye by Jim Papoulis, an arrangement of Jingle Bells by Laura Farnell, Sing to Me by Andrea Ramsey and a work by senior Hannah Hopper,

Gloria. Student conductors include Evan Stoor and junior Anton Tan.

NMSU NAfME students will be presenting a clinic at the NMMEA Conference at UNM in January. The clinic will feature seniors Evan Stoor and Dominic Lowhar along with Ms. Larragoity-Martin in "The Teaching Millennial: How will the millennial generation better serve music education in the classroom?"

Dr. Warner Hutchison passed away on May 29, 2019. Rest In Peace.

Warner Hutchison (b. 1930: Denver, CO) is Prof. Emeritus and former music department chairman, New Mexico State University, Las Cruces, NM. He attended the Lamont School of Music, University of Denver; Rockmont College; Southwestern Seminary, Ft. Worth (Bach. Sacred Mus); University of North Texas (M. Mus; PhD, composition); Eastman School of Music; and Indiana University. He studied with composers Samuel Adler, Merrill Ellis, Roy Harris, and Kent Kennan. He taught French horn, composition, theory, music history and was Director of Bands and Brasses at Houghton College, NY and Union University, Jackson, TN, and taught horn, theory, composition, and music literature at NMSU for 29 years. In 1986, he was a visiting lecturer in 20th c. music, art, and dance for one term at the Univ. of London. From 1972 to 1979 he edited a journal of papers by the American Society of Univ. Composers (now Society of Composers, Inc) and edited textbooks on counterpoint and electronic music for Wm .C. Brown Co.

He was a member of the French horn section in orchestras in Denver, CO;Denton, TX; San Angelo, TX;

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Rochester, NY; Knoxville, TN; and Las Cruces, NM.

His catalogue of over 270 works since 1950 includes orchestra, band, choral, opera, and chamber music as well as electronic music and incidental musicfor plays. Over 50 publications are with Belwin, Bourne, Carl Fischer, European American, Kjos, Lorenz, Manduca, Shawnee, Seesaw, Presser, TRN, Tuba/Euphonium Press and others. He appeared as guest composer for the Meet the Composer series in San Diego and San Francisco as well as symposia at various universities and music schools, and was one of ten composers selected nationwide for the 1994 Ernest Bloch Symposium.

Awards and commissions have led two MacDowell Colony fellowships, grants from the Ford Foundation, National Endowment, Music Teachers National Assoc. (MTNA), NM



Arts council, and a nomination for a Pulitzer Prize. Premieres include Lincoln Center, Kennedy Center, and Carnegie Hall.

Large works include a horn concerto (1997); a band symphony; two extended works for chorus and winds: Mass (1992) and Paso por Aqui (1999); two chamber operas; and orchestra works: Prairie Sketch (1956); Prologue (1957); The Sacrilege of Alan Kent (1971)- monodrama for baritone, orchestra and tape; Death-Words from the Cherokee (1976)-soprano, orchestra, tape; Varied Carols (1986); The Desert Shall Bloom As the Rose (1988). Incidental electronic music for plays

includes The Miracle Worker (1965); Antigone (1974) and Equus (1979). Significant chamber music includes a woodwind quintet (1955); Homage to Jackson Pollock (1973)-soloist on 31 percussion instruments, tape and slides; Ceremonies (1974)- ballet for oboe, amplified and prepared piano, tape, dancers; Requiem for A. Lincoln (1976)- two performers, amplified and prepared piano, tape; Narnian Suite (1977)-chorus, horn, percussion; two brass quintets based on the Book of Revelation, Apocalypse I and V (1979, 1988); and Poe-Songs (1995)-soprano, horn, and vibraphone.

Published works include Prairie Sketch for orchestra and The Sacrilege of Alan Kent-monodrama for baritone, orchestra, and tape (both published by Seesaw Music Corp); The Desert Shall Bloom As the Rose (Kjos Music); for band- Dirge and Hosanna (Belwin); Fantasy Variations; Franklin Mountain Suite a As the Stars Forever (all from Kjos Music); Paso por Aqui for soloists, chorus, wind ensemble (TRN) and numerous works for choirs, chamber music, and electronic music published by Seesaw, European American, Kjos, et al.

CDs include As the Stars Forever and They Flew Away on two albums by the USAF Heritage of America concert band. Other CD's include Apocalypse I for brass quintet, tamtam, and bells (Crystal Records); Apocalypse V for brass quintet, tamtam, bells, keyboard (AUR Records); Poe-Songs for soprano, horn and vibraphone (Capstone); Suite for Clarinet Choir (Encore).

A permanent collection of compositions along with papers, reviews, notices, correspondence, et al are in the Rio Grande Historical Collections, New Mexico State University Library Archives, Las Cruces, NM.

Louise Drlik, prominent music educator who influenced the lives of thousands of students, passed away peacefully at age 96 on July 1, 2019 in her home in Montezuma, New Mexico.

She was born on July 16, 1922 in Gillette, Arkansas to Herbert and Pearl Jones. When Louise was two years old, her family moved to Blackfoot, Idaho, a city of 5,000 at the time, where she grew up the second of seven siblings. She graduated from Blackfoot High School in 1940 as valedictorian, editor of the school newspaper, and class president.

After high school she attended the University of Utah in Salt Lake City where her family had moved for her father's employment. After two years at the university, she moved with her family to Portland, Oregon and attended Oregon State University for a year. She graduated from the University of Washington in Seattle in June 1944 where she received her Bachelor of Arts with a major in sociology and a minor in music.

After graduation, Louise took a job in Ridgewood, New Jersey with the YWCA where she created and supervised recreational and musical activities for teens. She was proud to be associated with this organization because it was an early leader in including women of all races, creeds, and nationalities in its programs. She went on to similar "group work" jobs in Toledo, Ohio; New Orleans, Louisiana; and Detroit, Michigan.

In Toledo, Louise met her husband Joseph Drlik and married him in 1948. They moved to New Orleans for Joe to briefly attend the Tulane

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University School of Social Work. In 1949 they spent 6 months bicycling through Europe. In 1950 they moved to Las Vegas, New Mexico where Louise worked as secretary in the New Mexico Highlands University art department while Joe obtained his Master of Fine Arts there. Later they worked together as social workers in Tau Beta Community House in Hamtramck, Michigan. Tau Beta was known as a "settlement house" similar to Jane Adam's Hull House in Chicago. Louise honed her skills teaching music and folk dance, particularly music that was of interest to the ethnically diverse community.

In 1954, they returned for the summer to Las Vegas, New Mexico where Joe taught classes in graduate crafts in the Highlands Art Department. The family lived in a suite at the Plaza Hotel and enjoyed the regular band concerts across the street in the park.

Later that year they moved to Germany where Joe had accepted the job of Crafts Director for the Army Special Services. Louise became director of a nursery school for children of civilian and Army personnel in Nuremberg. In the fall of 1959, Joe was transferred to Orleans, France where they lived in an ancient hunting lodge outside the tiny village of Bucy-Saint-Liphard.

In the fall of 1960, they moved back to the U.S. and chose Las Vegas, New Mexico as home because of their love for Northern New Mexico and the happy memories they shared of their previous stays in the town.

From 1962 to 1964 Louise attended Highlands University, earning certification for K-12 music education. In August 1964, she completed her master's degree with a major in music composition and a minor in music education. She was elected to the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society. From 1965 through 1973 she continued

post-graduate courses at Highlands in music, Spanish, and reading for the classroom teacher.

In 1963, Louise received her teaching certificate and began working for the Las Vegas City Schools. There she developed the district's first elementary school music program. In 1965 she added the junior high chorus and special choral groups to her assignments. She directed a number of small choral ensembles that received "excellent" and "superior" ratings at district music festivals. She mentored the Freedom Fifteen, a high school choral ensemble accompanied by guitar and sometimes string bass. This group sang folk and protest songs in the late 1960s in venues all around Northern New Mexico and won first place in a statewide talent contest at Winrock Center in Albuquerque.

In 1969, Louise became the Memorial Middle School general music and choral groups department coordinator. She was in charge of developing the music program at the newly constructed middle school.

Louise was appointed Music Department Head for the Las Vegas City Schools in 1973. During her tenure, she taught general music, music theory, chorus, guitar, piano, recorder, and folk dance. She also assisted in training vocalists to audition for and participate in the New Mexico Music Educators All-State Conference choirs.

From 1965 to 1975 Louise worked as the director of music for the Follow Through Program summer sessions. (Follow Through was a continuation of the federal Head Start Program which delivered educational, health, and social services to disadvantaged preschool children and their families. Follow Through worked with children during their early elementary years.) She worked closely with the directors of both Head Start

and Follow Through as well as the bilingual supervisor in planning and teaching a bilingual curriculum that included songs in Spanish and English, folk dances, and singing games. During this time, Louise worked with Margaret Aragón, Follow Through Director, to compile The Bilingual Song Book, which was used in the Las Vegas City Schools and was supplied, by request, to many other school districts.

Between 1973 and 1976 Louise worked with her colleague, Nancy Leippe, on writing, compiling, and recording a series of curriculum units on life in Northern New Mexico in the late 1800s.

From 1965 to 1972 she taught piano and conducted teachers' music workshops during summer sessions at Highlands University.

Louise retired from the Las Vegas City Schools in 1980, but she did not stay retired for long. In 1981, she became assistant professor of music at Highlands University. There she directed the choirs and ensembles as well as the community chorus, taught voice, sight-singing, and methods classes for music majors. In cooperation with the drama department, Louise co-directed and served as accompanist for the student musicals Godspell, Strider, Archie and Mehitabel, and Cabaret. During this time, she also served as a judge at numerous district festivals for choral groups and as a clinician for honors choirs. She was also a judge for All-State vocal auditions. Louise retired from Highlands University in 1987.

Throughout her time in Las Vegas, Louise taught piano to many students. She gave up her last piano student at the age of 96.

In 1994, Louise was inducted into the New Mexico Music Educators Association Hall of Fame.
