I wish you all the best and look forward to seeing you at the NMMEA Summer Workshop.



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

1. Directors must be members in good standing at the time of audition

registrations, so please plan ahead and renew your memberships early! NAfME must receive a check before they activate your membership, a PO on file with them will not suffice.

2. Make sure to register students

- 2. Make sure to register students accurately. Each year a number of members register students with first and last names reversed. Make sure to enter them correctly and always double check spelling.
- 3. If a student is auditioning for multiple ensembles, a preference must be declared at registration. Directors, please communicate with your colleagues to ensure that the same information is entered for each entry. This may seem like a small issue, but at the time of results it is a huge issue. Thank you for making this a priority.
- 4. Make sure your students understand the audition process and have audition details in a timely manner.
- 5. Watch the audition deadlines as once the late deadline passes no students will be added!
- 6. All homeschool students must register directly through me.
- 7. In order for you to register a student, they must be members of your ensemble. Do not register students for a colleague they need to register their own students.
- 8. Once you have completed the registration process, please check your email for a conformation and make sure all were entered correctly. Once the deadline passes it is impossible to add students left off the original registration.
- 9. And finally, please make sure I receive payment (check, credit card or PO) immediately after you register.

As you look forward to summer break, I would like to remind you of a few things.

#### Membership renewal

Please remember to check your membership expiration date and take care of renewing in a timely fashion. Please renew directly with NAfME. Remember that your membership will not be activated until NAfME receives a check, so it is important to start the process early.

#### Membership accuracy

Please take a few minutes and log into NAfME and check your contact information. I regularly download the membership database and use this to mail or email members, so please check that your contact information is correct.

# Communicating with Your Community

Previously published in School Band and Orchestra, January 2015

To better inform the community about the purpose, structure and achievements of the school's music program, provide an annual written report to the appropriate supervisor and, with permission, to parents and the community.

Steps to Success in Communicating Goals and Accomplishments

#### The Content

• Data! Data! Data! People are busy so respect their time by providing easy-to-decipher data about

every aspect of your program. Include data on enrollment, program growth, percentage participation within the school, average student GPA, number of performances, number of students participating in Honor Groups, All-State Ensembles, etc. This data should provide measurable information that would be used for comparison in prior and subsequent years. In addition, this will assist you in setting goals for the future.

• The report could also in-

- The report could also include more generalized information about the music program, special community performances and appearances by guest artists. The music program is a wonderful public relations component to the school; administrators know this, so use it to your advantage. Make the school and your students the focus of all of your good news.
- Use student quotes about the value of being in the program, and place those quotes strategically in the document. (Be sure to secure written permission to use the quotes.) You could also include quotes from adjudicators, parents and other community notables about how wonderful the school's music program is and its benefits for participating students.
   Detail every positive con-
- Detail every positive contribution in the school or community—no matter how small—by individuals or groups, students and staff.

#### The Process

Start an annual report file at the beginning of each school year and add material to it regularly. It is much easier to eliminate excess information than to create it just before the deadline.
Sort the entries by useful categories, such as ensemble types or grade levels. Review each event with the perspective of whether it is a selling point for the program or an interesting detail for an administrator.

#### The Format

Use a spreadsheet to report

your data. It should be easy to understand at first glance. You may want to show it to a colleague before submitting it to your administration. Remember that the format established for your report will be used in subsequent years to make comparisons and show overall program growth.

- Consider the appearance of the finished report. Think about how many photographs and charts to include and what size the report should be. One standard size is 8-1/2 x 11 inches, which prints on an 11 x 17 sheet that yields four pages. Deal in multiples of four pages. (It is impossible to have an odd number of pages unless one page is blank.) Also consider the texture and quality of paper you will use.
- Secure permission beforehand if you want to include photographs in your report. Parents must provide written permission for photos of students to be included.
- It is important that the report is submitted to your supervisor before it is distributed elsewhere. Work with this person to determine how best to proceed with additional copies and distribution.

#### **Graphically Appealing**

- Leave enough white space so that components don't look crammed together.
- Think about the size of the text (10-12 point works well); the space between lines of text (consider a minimum of a 1/2 point larger than the type size)
- Consider the kind of type style used—serif versus sans serif—the printer can show you examples of these type styles. Studies have shown reading speed and comprehension are 30 percent better with serif typeface. Avoid using too many different sizes and type styles.
- Pictures and graphs are appealing. A small number of photos showing only a few people are better than too many tiny photos or large ones of an entire ensemble. Position photos so the dominant subject looks

into the page, not off into space.Pay attention to page balance.

#### Organize

- Before you start writing, organize
- Include all pertinent information
- Prioritize information
- Determine which information can be further illustrated with charts or graphs, or enhanced by other visuals, such as photos
- Remember to include information about the importance of music education to student success

#### Use the "Write Stuff"

- Attractive graphics will interest readers, but the core of any publication is its editorial substance.
- Write professionally and have your report proofread before taking it to your administration. Be sure to ask for permission to publish the report beyond the confines of the school and ask for input from your supervisor before you make additional copies for others.
- Write in simple, direct language to convey information of significance and interest, but with a meaningful message.
- Outline first
- Use strong action verbs
- Use short sentences and paragraphs Use the active voice
- Keep people in mind
- Use educational jargon sparingly but appropriately. It is important that you are seen as up-to-date on all current issues related to education, so use the proper terms. Use quotes when possible. Be concise; avoid wordy descriptions.
- Select familiar words
- Simplify; then simplify again
- Check and double-check your grammar and spelling, then have someone else check it yet again. You will be judged by the quality of this document.
- Write headlines that say something. Headlines need to com-

municate so that the people who scan your report can also learn something. Choose titles and headlines that will give a snapshot of the feeling you want to create.

• Once you have designed an annual report that seems complete, ask for comments from a variety of others including an English teacher as well as a parent and an administrator before sending the report to be printed or sent out over the internet. They may not only find typographical errors, but may suggest something you have overlooked.

#### Distribution

- The final step is to distribute the report to the school board, administrators, parents, feeder schools (and the administrators, music educators and counselors in these feeder buildings), the local media and local politicians. Be sure to inform your supervisor about which people you want to receive your report. Make extras to keep on hand and be sure that the principal's office is provided with extra copies so that they can share them with visitors.
- You can also use the report for background information when applying for grants, or as an internal tool to help assess the program.
- Consider expanding your distribution to include local service groups, especially since you may find yourself asking them for financial support in the future. You could also distribute a copy to each visitor to the music department, including student teachers and guest artists. Give copies to real estate agents who might have clients looking for a community with a strong music program.

#### **Project Reminders**

- Have clear goals for what you want to accomplish by producing an annual report.
   Enlist the help from other
- faculty members and students in producing the report. Communicate your goals and what you are trying to accomplish. Talk with journalism and art faculty to create a team ap-

proach to producing the most dynamic, content-driven report possible.

- Work with a local printing company in understanding time and cost considerations. Ask for their input, based upon their experience and expertise. Get preliminary cost estimates so that you have an idea of the amount involved for the number of copies you want to distribute.
- Talk with your booster or parent group to request funding to accomplish your goals in producing an annual report.
- Share the process with your students so they can learn the importance of telling others about the value of music.

Audition Registration If a student is auditioning for both choir and an instrumental ensemble, it is very important that both the choral director and the instrumental director register the student using the students' given name (i.e. the same name) and declare preference. Please consider that if you have a large number of singers auditioning to use one accompanist per voice section. This will help Jadira Flamm schedule the singers, accompanists and for the schedule to flow smoothly! Per NMMEA Handbook: "Vocal students auditioning shall provide their own accompanist. A recorded accompaniment may be used in place of the live accompaniment. Accompanists may play for no more than 30 students for All-State Auditions." Audition Protocol: "Choral All-State auditions this year will be conducted blind and behind a screen. A panel of judges will still travel to each site but will be behind a screen for the audition. If you are a memory audition judge and do not have recordings to use for the Wednesday evening memory audition, please contact Clarissa prior to Wednesday evening, so that she can get those to you. The WIFI is spotty at best in the practice room area at UNM so you will need to DOWNLOAD these to your computer/ipad/phone prior to arriving at UNM.

Memory judges had some concerns about the level of preparation of the singers for the memory auditions. As directors sponsoring singers, it is our professional responsibility to make sure the student entered has all music and recordings and is prepared and ready for memory auditions. It's so important for student success that they have all materials in a timely fashion such that they can be prepared for the memory audition and work with your kiddos. MOST importantly, hear them sing the repertoire early enough that they can make improvements! We've proven that recordings are a valuable tool

but nothing beats the interaction we have with our singers!! They thrive on it!

Would you consider screening your students prior to bringing them to the memory audition? Some singers (who ended up with the choral VP after not successfully completing memory auditions) stated that they "did not want to be there, were required to audition to be in their high school ensemble and shared that with their directors.) How heartbreaking! I know how hard you all work with all your singers and I understand that December is a crazy time. Let's brainstorm and come back with ideas!

content of what we are teaching.


I miss my singers, I miss making music with them and I miss hearing about their lives. I miss the interaction of watching those light bulbs moments when the music comes together and the joy it brings.

#### 2019 Guitar Auditions:

Auditions for the 2020 All State Guitar Ensemble were held at Albuquerque High School on October 17th and 18th. • 163 students registered for audi-

- 163 students registered for auditions
- 137 auditioned
- 26 no-shows/cancellations
- 29 schools were represented

Our numbers for applicants are quite good at 163, though down a bit from the previous years 170. Having 29 schools represented is fantastic! From those 29 schools sending auditioners, 22 had students pass the audition to go on and perform in the guitar orchestra. Our percentage of no-shows was 15.95 which is a little below average when comparing to the other areas like

band, choir, etc. We only had 1 student who passed the audition and didn't take part in the festival.

Every year is different for many reasons. Sometimes you have above average year and others you have to rebuild. Obviously we are faced with many challenges right now and there exists a great deal of uncertainty about the future. We'll just have to see how things look in the coming months and how all of this will play out, but for now I encourage you all to think about keeping our audition numbers up for next year. This is critical to sustaining a section for guitar within NMMEA, and with a wide body of applicants comes a higher quality ensemble providing the best experience for all involved.

2020 All State Guitar Ensemble: The 2020 All State was a great success. Chuck Hulihan did an outstanding job and students consistently maintained markable level of focus and engagement. As has been the case with every All State, a new benchmark of excellence set as we continue to raise the standards of guitar education in New Mexico. My heartfelt gratitude goes out to everyone who helped to make the festival so great.

2020 Guitar Auditions: Auditions for the 2021 All State guitar ensemble will once again be held at Albuquerque High School, on October 28th-29th. Omar Villanueva did an excellent job hosting for us last year. Thanks for hosting again, Omar.

# 2021 All State Conductor: David Tanenbaum

Recognized internationally as an outstanding performer and recording artist, a charismatic educator, and a transcriber and editor of both taste and intelligence, David Tanenbaum is one of the most admired classical guitarists of his generation. He has performed throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico, rope, Australia, the former Soviet Union and Asia, and in 1988 he became the first American guitarist to be invited to perform in China by the Chinese government. He has been soloist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, San Francisco Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra, London Sinfonietta, the Oakland Symphony, Vienna's ORF orchestra, with such eminent conduc-Esa-Pekka tors as Salonen, Kent Nagano and John Adams.

David Tanenbaum has been a featured soloist at many international festivals, including those of Bath, Luzern, Frankfurt, Barcelona and Vienna as well as numerous guitar festivals. In 1989, as President of the Second American Classical Guitar Congress, commissioned five new works, including Rosewood by Henry Brant for a large guitar orchestra. He has subsequently conducted Rosewood more than a dozen times on four continents. While his repertoire encompasses diverse styles, David Tanenbaum is recognized as one of today's most eloquent proponents of new guitar repertoire. .

# Collegiate...

Who fought and conquered well

It seemed quite appropriate to share this wonderful short poem, written in 1890, by the great Winston Churchill when he was but fifteen years old. Although it expresses the horrors of the last pandemic of the 19th Century, it also concludes, in true Churchill fashion, on a note of hope and positivity. These are truly strange times and even more so, difficult times, for all of us tasked with finding ways to continue to provide education to our students. If anything, this has caused many of us to rethink our approach.

For the last half century at least, music education has been an extremely personal endeavor relying on faceto-face communication between teacher and pupil. In some ways, this pandemic has reinforced those notions, as we have discovered the lack of a truly sufficient replacement for in person rehearsals. (I would argue this has more to do with the actual physical attributes of sound waves permeating our entire bodies in live rehearsals versus only using our ears at home – but that is for another time). However, in other ways, just as Churchill used his present circumstances as the starting point for a creative endeavor, I have witnessed more inventiveness and musical expression online than ever before. It would appear, necessity truly is the mother of invention. The amount of creative content being shared on social media has skyrocketed.

From solo performances simply recorded using a cell phone to full on productions of large-scale works using one of the many recording platforms available, this isolation has provided an impetus for many to create new ways of expressing themselves musically. I have seen students that would have been scared to death to play by themselves in rehearsal post recordings of themselves performing an entire chamber

ensemble work on their own. Isn't that interesting? In reality, performing by oneself in rehearsal is in front of only fifty or so people. Putting it out there on social media is open to the world. What gives? This is probably a very important question to meditate on while in isolation. From another perspective, I have seen the realization by those outside of the teaching profession, of just how important the profession is to our society. The importance goes far beyond the simple transmittance of musical knowledge, but also to providing many basic needs for students nationwide. It has forced the hard questions: what about food that students would normally have at school; what about access to internet; what about access to safety? These are truly sobering thoughts, and many have simply taken these things for granted, but due to this event, they are now forced to face the realities because it is much closer to everyone's' own backyard. So, on the one hand extreme creativity is bursting forth and on the other hand a mirror is being held up to our faces. What a wonderful opportunity to shape the future of education. It would be great, when some normalcy returns, to not forget about a few things. Let's not forget about the creativity that we saw come from all of the students as they sought ways to express their musicianship outside of our traditional classes. Let's not return to an environment where students might be afraid to perform in front of real faces instead of a computer screen. Also, let's not forget that there are always more factors that influence a student's performance. Hopefully we can work to make sure that those factors are met as a society. It is with utmost sincerity that I wish everyone the best of health and that as we remain home to help keep this virus at bay that we find ways to remain creative, remain sane, and

remain thankful. This too shall pass

and when it does how wonderful it is going to be to have a new outlook on just how important music education is and the simple yet till now sometimes overlooked truth of just how important each and every single person simply is.

The reader may have already noticed a change in the Jazz All-State audition materials: the ballad is no longer included. At the Jazz Division business meeting at NMSU there was much discussion of the audition process. The consensus view was that the audition day is too demanding for many students, especially trumpet players (and other brass) auditioning for both band and jazz. Although the ballad is a valued component we voted to leave it out for this year. The issue will be revisited

in next January's business meetings. An important agenda item for spring is applications for the 2021 Honor Jazz Ensemble. An aspect of the new relationship with NMMEA is a new policy regarding eligibility for Honor Jazz Band applications. The wording in the NMMEA handbook is as follows: Jazz - Honor ensemble preference will be on a 3-year rotation: small school (middle school, mid high, or iunior high and high schools with school enrollment of 1200 students or lower); high schools with school enrollment of 1201 students and higher; non big band ensemble. As a point of reference 2019 is a small school year. Preference for the 2021 Honor Jazz Band will go to non big band ensembles. The application deadline is extended this year to June 26. Go to https://www.nmmea. com/forms/ for the information and link to the application form. As usual, audition dates and locations for the 2021 Jazz All-State will be the same as for NMMEA All-State Bands: Nov. 4-5, 2020. Go to nmmea. com for information and materials. Finally, huge congratulations to Ryan Finn for his election as the next Jazz Vice President! Ryan is doing amazing things for jazz education in Los Alamos and has established himself as a respected leader. I am thrilled to know that leadership of the Jazz Section will be in such able hands when my term ends next January.

George Nicholson is currently an Adjunct Professor at Queens College and The College of New Jersey, teaching graduate conducting, low string pedagogy and supervising student teachers. In 2018-2019 he was Visiting Assistant Professor of Music Education (Strings) at Ithaca College in Ithaca, New York. In 2014, Mr. Nicholson moved to New York City to pursue his doctoral degree in music education at Teachers College at Columbia University, where he is a Florence K. Geffen fellow under Dr. Randall E. Allsup. In addition to coursework, he supervises student teachers, mentors practicing music teachers, conducts the InterSchool Orchestras of New York, and plays bass with the Queer Urban Orchestra. His research interests focus on socially-just teacher practices amidst the political landscape of today's Mr. Nicholson received his bachelor's degree from the University of Miami, Florida, and his master's degree from the University of Georgia. He had the privilege of teaching orchestra in Cobb County, Georgia, at the middle school and high school level to wonderful, passionate, and thoughtful students. During his time there, the program produced award-winning performances, became actively involved in the local community, and engaged in creative musical experiences. Outside of the school, he was a clinician and judge for Georgia Music Educators Association events as well as other organizations around the state. He was born in Ridgewood, New Jersey, and grew up studying music in the Ridgewood public school system, as well as at the Manhattan School of Music Preparatory program.

Olivia Tucker is a Ph.D. candidate in music education at the University of North Texas. She currently serves as an instructor of Introduction to Music Education and is an assistant director of the New Horizons Senior Band. Prior to her doctoral work, she earned a Master of Music Education degree from UNT while teaching band in Dallas-Fort Worth area schools. She holds a Bachelor of Music in Music Education degree from Howard Payne University. Ms. Tucker's research interests include music teacher education and music teacher identity and agency. Her work may be found in the Journal of Music Teacher Education and Update: Applications of Research in Music Education. Ms. Tucker has annually presented her work for ensemble teachers at the Texas Music Educators Association Clinic and Convention in San Antonio, and she presented music teacher education research at the American Educational Research Association Annual Meeting in Toronto in April 2019, and at the 2019 Symposium on Music Teacher Education in Greensboro, North Carolina.

The Department will also be welcoming two new faculty members this fall in the area of Vocal Performance. Dr. Olga Perez Flora will be joining us from her current position at the University of Nevada Reno, and James Flora will be joining us from his current position at Arizona State University.

Cuban-American mezzo-soprano Olga Perez Flora has been lauded by Opera News for her "smoky tones" and "firm, pleasant voice and lively poise." She has performed with opera companies and symphonies both across the country and internationally. Some of her recent engagements include performances with the Akron Symphony in de Falla's El amor brujo, Opera Columbus as Suzuki in Madama Butterfly, Third Lady in Mozart's Die Zauberflöte with the Erie Chamber Orchestra, the Duraflé Requiem, Bach's Cantata 147 and Respighi's II Tramonto with the St. Vincent Cammerata, Verdi's Requiem with the Hollywood Concert Series, de Falla's El Retablo de Maese Pedro with the Newark Granville Symphony Orchestra, the Duruflé Requiem and Haydn's Lord Nelson Mass with the Idyllwild Arts Festival, and Handel's Messiah with the Mississippi Symphony Chorus, as well as a recording of Stephen Colantti's children's opera The Selfish Giant with the Erie Chamber Orchestra. Dr. Flora also has performed Marcellina in Le nozze di Figaro with Operafestival di Roma, Zerlina in Don Giovanni with Opera in the Heights, and the role of Olga in Eugene Onegin with Opera Company Middlebury to wide acclaim. Known for her sultry Carmen, Flora has performed this signature role numerous times, including her debut with Amarillo Opera. She has enjoyed being a recitalist for both Pittsburgh Opera and the Pittsburgh Song Collaborative, and will perform a Cuban song recital series for Otterbein and Muskingum Universities as a community outreach event this spring. Additional upcoming engagements include Haydn's Lord Nelson Mass and Bach's Cantata BWV 4 with the Southeastern Ohio Symphony Orchestra. Her academic degrees include the Doctorate in Musical Arts from The Ohio State University and the master's degree in Opera Theater from Arizona State University, as well as the bachelor's degree in Vocal Performance from Northern Arizona University. Dr. Flora is involved in several young artist programs, including the Idyllwild Festival of the Arts, where she has served as a vocal coach and opera scenes director for twelve years, and the Flora Italian Summer Studio which she and her husband, James Flora, launched in the summer of 2016 in Rome, Italy, with the Tito Gobbi Association, where she serves as the artistic director. Dr. Flora is represented by Berger Artists Management.

American tenor James Flora, hailed for his "resonant, impeccably-trained voice and fearlessness to his singing," has received acclaim in repertoire ranging from Verdi and Wag-

ner to works by Carlisle Floyd and Daron Hagen, where he sang Louis Sullivan from Hagen's Shining Brow at Frank Lloyd Wright's 20th century masterpiece, Fallingwater. He made his Pittsburgh Opera debut as Fenton in Falstaff, and has since returned for seven productions, including Carmen, Turandot, Lucia di Lammermoor, and most recently as 2nd Jew alongside the Salome of Patricia Racette. Mr. Flora has performed leading roles in opera companies across the United States, including Alfredo (La Traviata), Tamino (The Magic Flute), Pinkerton (Madama Butterfly), Rodolfo (La Bohème), Don José (Carmen), appearing with companies including Washington Concert Opera, Arizona Opera, Glimmerglass Opera, Opera Company Middlebury, Opera Columbus and others. Equally at home on the symphonic stage, he has sung with the Pittsburgh Symphony, Reno Philharmonic, Erie Chamber Orchestra and Buffalo Philharmonic, and recently debuted with the La Voz Humana: Lenguajes Múltiples festival in Cuba with Maestro Leo Brouwer and guitar virtuoso Joaquin Clerch. Mr. Flora's upcoming performances include a debut as Cavaradossi in Tosca with Opera Company Middlebury, where has previously been seen as Nicias (Thais) and Mitch (A Streetcar Named Desire). He will also sing a recital in Lake Tahoe with the Tahoe Chamber Music Society this summer. He has sung with the Metropolitan Opera Chorus under Maestro Donald Palumbo in their most recent productions of Die Meistersinger von Nürenberg and Fidelio. Mr. Flora was a Young American Artist with Glimmerglass Opera, a Resident Artist with Pittsburgh Opera and a Marion Roose Pullin Studio Artist with Arizona Opera, where he made his operatic debut as Malcolm in Verdi's Macbeth. In 2010, he was a Richard Tucker finalist. He holds voice degrees from The Ohio State University (B.M. in Vocal Performance, Summa cum laude) and Florida State University (M.M. in Vocal Performance). He has served on the voice faculties of University of Nevada, Reno, Central Michigan University, Otterbein University and Point Park University, and is a member of NATS and AGMA. He has students performing on and off Broadway in productions of Hamilton, Urinetown, Shrek the Musical and Rent, and has students in Dolora Zajick's Institute for Young Dramatic Voices. The NMSU ensembles performed on February 9th, in a concert led by Dr. Mapp, directing the NMSU Wind Symphony in several works, including Danzon #2 by Marquez, Winter Ricercar by Walczyk, and La Fiesta Mexicana by Reed. Wind Ensemble by David R. Gillingham. On April 22nd, the Symphonic Band performed Scott McAllister's "Black Dog" Dr. clarinet professor Madelyn Moore as featured soloist, along with other works. The Southwest Trumpet Festival, coordinated by Dr. Pancho Romero, took place at NMSU on February 28-29. The festival featured guest artists and clinicians Rebecca Wilt, piano, trumpet players Peter Bond (Metropolitan Opera Orchestra), and NMSU alumni Jacquelyn Lankford (McNeese State University, Monroe Symphony), Hugo Moreno (revival of West Side Story, Broadway), and Marcus Flores (International Trumpet Guild Solo Competition winner) who have all gone on to lead successful careers in teaching and performing. The intent of the festival was to "create an alliance of trumpet players and share knowledge that will benefit all, and to help those participants achieve their goals and understand that there is a path to success," according to Dr. Romero. Concerts featuring students and the guest artists featured works by Strauss, Vivaldi (Concerto for Two Trumpets), Eric Ewazen, and composer Justin Raines, who wrote a composition honoring Dr. Romero's career at NMSU. Mr. Raines is an alumnus of NMSU, now living and composing in Los Angeles. Throughout the week, Rebecca worked with NMSU students in many applied areas. Ms. Wilt, who has received national and international recognition is a virtuoso collaborative pianist, has worked with many of the world's prominent wind instrument performers, in many of the world's greatest venues in North Europe, America. and Asia. NMSU hosted the 2020 Jazz All-Conference on January

24-26. The event featured many guest clinicians and performances by the ensembles. The NMSU Clarinet Choir, led by Dr. Madelyn Moore, performed at MacArthur Elementary School and Mesa Middle School in Las Cruces on April 30th.

#### Strings and Orchestra

The Southwest Honor Orchestra Festival was held from January 31 through February 2nd, at NMSU. During the three day festival, students from Alamogordo High School, Centennial High School, Coronado High School, Mayfield High School, Las Cruces High School, Las Cruces Youth Orchestra, and Esperanza Azteca Ciudad Juarez, Mexico had the opportunity to prepare for a concert with guest musicians from La Catrina String Quartet and Camerata del Sol chamber ensemble for the final concert, in which all joined with the NMSU Philharmonic Orchestra, conducted by Simón Gollo. The concert featured a variety of works, including Britten's Jubilate Deo in C, Dubula, arranged by Stephen Hatfield, and two songs from Rodgers and Hammerstein's South Pacific. of the choral groups at NMSU had a busy and exciting spring, performing and touring both regionally and abroad. The University Chamber Singers began their semester with a winter tour Arizona and collaborated with four Phoenix area schools. Later in the year, the Chamber Singers toured Italy with Dr. Patrick Scott, one of the United States' prominent young organists, singing at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome and St. Mark's Basilica in Venice. Dr. Scott has been named one of the top 20 leaders and organists under the age of 30 by The Diapason magazine. He has presented recitals, workshops, hymn festivals, and master classes for chapters conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the Organ Historical Society, the American Choral Director's Association, and the Royal School of Church Music. The NMSU Statesmen will be traveling to central Texas on tour in May. They were able to collaborate with other

choruses, men's high school programs and community groups. The men will be singing everything from renaissance to baroque, to musical theatre and even some Oak Ridge Boys. The Women's Chorale, under the direction of Chelsea Bolas, toured the southeast portion of the state this spring. The Masterworks Chorale continued to carry the strong tradition of choral music in the community of Las Cruces, with a performance of Mendelssohn's Psalm 115 as well assomegreatAmericanchoralclassics. On March 19th, The NMSU Opera Workshop presented an evening of scenes and songs by W.A. Mozart, entitled "Mozart Mara-Student and community singers performed, and the performance was directed by Annie Pennies, accompanied by Ji Young Han. The Vocal Area had a very exciting spring semester hosting the 2020 Rio Grande Chapter of NATS (National Association of Teachers of Singing) Student Auditions on February 28-29, which featured two guest clinicians this year. Through the generosity of the Music Department, both Virginia Dupuy (Professor of Voice at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, TX) and Rebecca Wilt (professional coach-accompanist) were able to present master classes to both NMSU and students of NATS members. The auditions brought 50 students and many pianists from New Mexico and Texas to campus to compete and participate in the classes. Several NMSU students were finalists. with three first place winners in their divisions. NMSU voice students also took part in the annual Vocal Artistry Song Festival in Albuquerque, which this year featured Spanish song.

Faculty News and Campus Performances

Dr. Lisa Van Winkle, Assistant Professor of Flute, has been selected to perform at the 2020 National Flute Association convention in Dallas, TX. She will perform Lament and Jubilation for flute and piano by former NMSU Music Department Head, Warner Hutchison on August 9th on a recital titled "New Voices". Dr. Van kle has conducted NMSU flute ensembles at two national conventions held in Albuquerque and Las Vegas and performed in chamber groups, with this being her first appearance a soloist at the convention. Madelyn Moore, tant Professor of Clarinet, was elected the new Collegiate Vice President for NMMEA. Moore also performed at the College Music Society's Great Plains Chapter Conference on Saturday, March 21 as part of The Violetta Duo, playing a program entitled "Flute and Clarinet Duos of the 21st Century." Simón Gollo, Assistant Professor of Violin, had a very busy spring conducting and performing both in the US and abroad. In January, he was the guest concert master for a concert at the Auditorio Manuel de Falla with the Orquesta de la Ciudad de Granada, in Granada, Spain; in February, he served as assistant concert master with the Dallas Chamber Symphony, and later performed with the Cuarteto Q Arte and Cuarteto Latinoamericano at the Teatro Mayor in Bogotá, Colombia. Returning to the US, Gollo performed as guest soloist in Mozart's Concertante for Violin. la and Orchestra with the Central Ohio Symphony along with Randolph Kelly (former principal viola of Pittsburgh Symphony). Again, with the Cuarteto Q Arte, he performed in March at "Festival Internacional Música Sacra" with bandoneon

player Daniel Ruggiero in Quito, Ecuador. In April, Maestro Gollo was Guest Conductor with the Orquesta Sinfónica Juvenil del Gobierno Provincial del Guayas in Guayaquil, Ecuador. Jorge Martínez-Rios, Associate Professor of Viola, continued his relationship with the Classical Music Institute (CMI) in San Antonio, TX, with many performances this spring and summer: as viola soloist for Dobrinka Tabakova's Suite in Old Style for viola solo, harpsichord, and string orchestra; as part of the chamber ensemble for Beethoven's String Quintet C Major Op. 29 and Schubert's String Quintet in D Major; and as principal viola with the Chamber Orchestra for several works, including Britten's Variations on a Theme of Frank Bridge and two Beethoven ensemble works. As conductor of the New Horizons Symphony Orchestra, Martinez-Rios hosted Mihai Marica, cello, as soloist for Dvořák's Concerto for Cello in B minor, Op. 104 for its May concert. Earlier, on March 1st, the New Horizons Symphony Orchestra, along with the Youth Symphony Orchestra of Torreón, from Coahuila, Mexico presented exciting"Side by Side" concert, performing beloved favorites such as Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue, music from the movie The Magnificent Seven, and American and Latin standards including My Way, Fly Me to the Moon, Sobre las Olas, and Huapango by Moncayo! This concert marks the beginning of a cultural exchange between Las Cruces and its sister city, Lerdo, Mexico. As a member of Sister Cities International, Las Cruces has been officially sanctioned to carry out the widest possible diversity of activities, including educational and cultural exchange or projects. Sister City programs are also unique in that they inher-

ently involve the three main sectors in a community: local government, businesses, and a wide variety of citizen volunteers. In 1956, President Eisenhower held a White House Conference to develop ways for promoting international relations and world peace. Plans were forged for the organization of worldwide sister cities, intended to promote friendship and international understanding through "People to People" contacts. Today, over 1,000 US cities are paired with more than 1,700 foreign cities, involving all 50 states and 122 foreign countries. Many NMSU applied professors, Dr. Rhonda cluding **Taylor** (saxophone), Dr. Madelvn Moore (clarinet), Jorge Espinoza (cello), Dr. Pancho Romero (trumpet), Dr. Lisa Van Winkle (flute), Dr. Allan Kaplan (trombone), Dr. Fred Bugbee (percussion) and Nancy Joy (horn) worked with the students from Torreón in preparation for this event.

Camerata del Sol, the chamber ensemble founded by professor of violin Daniel Vega-Albela in 2017, and consisting of NMSU students, graduates and community members, performed concerts on April this spring featuring two Lenten cantatas by Bach and Vivaldi, and a movement from the elegiac I Crisantemi by Puccini. The Bach and Vivaldi featured Dr. Sarah Daughtrey, Voice Area Coordinator, as soloist, along with Vega-Albela, Dr. Laura Spitzer, and graduate student Amalia Zeitlin (violin), lio Campos (viola), and James Carney (cello). The ensemble performed the concert at the Newman Center at NMSU and in El Paso. The Doña Ana Arts Council recently partnered with Dr. Jim Shearer (Professor of Tuba and Graduate Area Coordinator) to create a new concert series called "Classical Drinking." who is serving as artistic director, curated a series of six concerts that include NMSU faculty and other area professionals with the

goal of performing classical music in a more open and informal setting. complete with ence participation. All concerts take place at the Doña Ana Arts Council performance and gallery space in old Mesilla. Concerts this spring included NMSU faculty member Dr. Sarah Daughtrey, performing songs, ensembles and arias about drinking from opera and classical song, as well as Erik Unsworth, bass, along with many special guests, including Shearer (tuba) Dr. Allan Kaplan, trombone. Each concert takes place on the second Saturday of each month 7:30 pm and follows a monthly gallery opening event. Dr. Daughtrey was also featured as the alto soloist for Beethoven's 9th Symphony with the Roswell Symphony Orchestra in April.

In addition to recognizing these wonderful students another major part of the concert was to honor two outstanding faculty members who have devoted a significant portion of their lives to education and New Mexico State University. These two wonderful individuals that we had hoped to honor in person this evening were Dr. Greg Fant and Dr. Pancho Romero, both of whom are retiring.

Dr. Pancho Romero came home to New Mexico State University in 2001 after teaching in Oklahoma where he was Associate Professor of Music at Oklahoma Baptist University and was active in the Oklahoma Band Masters Association. Upon his return to NMSU, Dr. Romero, affectionately referred to by his students as 'Doc,' worked tirelessly to maintain a strong trumpet studio, develop exemplary jazz ensembles, and advocate on behalf of NMSU and music education within the state. There may not be a single person in the land of enchantment that hasn't been greeted by Dr. Romero's warm smile and ever so welcoming, "buddy."

Dr. Romero's students have gone on to become terrific educators and performers throughout the country.

New Mexico and a Jazz All-State, now affiliated with the New Mexico Music Educators Association. To Dr. Romero, we will miss you and

Dr. Greg Fant, Associate Vice President/Deputy Provost at New Mexico State University, was hired in 1990 as the Associate Director of Bands. Over the past 30 years, Dr. Fant's contributions to NMSU are far too many to count. He has been instrumental in the development and groundbreaking of new facilities on campus, directed the task force to establish NMSU Online, and has led efforts to align student learning and retention.

Prior to his role as Vice President and Deputy Provost, Dr. Fant served as a dean, the Chair of the Department of Music, Associate Director of Bands, and the saxophone professor. During his time within the music department, Dr. Fant helped establish a robust band program. While serving as the associate director, Dr. Fant was responsible for the ever-popular Pride of New Mexico. His work continued a long-standing tradition of excellence and developed a new sense of camaraderie amongst all involved. Under his direction the Pride, received many accolades including a performance for the Prince of Monaco and President George W. Bush.

While serving as the director of the marching band, Dr. Fant also worked tirelessly as the chair of the department. His efforts in this role guided the updating of the music education curriculum, the re-accreditation

of the department, and helped to foster a substantial number of majors within the area. Dr. Fant's support of the NMSU Music Department has been unwavering since he came to the university. His commitment to students, staff, and faculty is truly touching. Those who know Dr. Fant, know that he has a quick smile, calm demenanr, and is extremely introspective; all traits that serve students particularly well and have set a great example for those also aspiring to teach. To Dr. Fant, thank you for all of the years of support for the NMSU Band program and thank you for your service to New Mexico State University.

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
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
