

Office Notes Don Gerheart, Executive Director



Welcome back everyone to those starting another school year! On behalf of the New Mexico Music Educators Association (NMMEA) I would like to extend a warm welcome to all new teachers and those who have moved to New Mexico to teach in the Land of Enchantment for the first time.

By the time you receive this fall issue of "The New Mexico Musician" school with be in full swing. It seems like school starts earlier each year. Please feel free to contact me, other teachers in your district or area, or any of our NMMEA officers if you have any questions or need help along the way. My contact information as well as our Board of Directors is listed on the first page of this magazine as wll as on our website www.nmmea.com.

On July 23 & 24 2018 NMMEA held four meetings in two days. For the first time I met with four of the six district treasurers to inform them of the fiduciary responsibilities and to help them with their duties dealing with the money matters in their district. I met with the two treasurers who were unable to attend the July meetings in August. Next I met with our district presidents followed by the Executive Committee who plan All-State. The next day the Board of Directors met to take care of our association business. All four meetings were very productive and much was accomplished.

For the new music educators to our state and for those of you that are not current members I encourage you to join our national association NAfME and our state organization NMMEA. In order to participate in NMMEA district events and All-State events including auditions one must be a member of NAfME and NMMEA. Both organizations do a lot to support and promote music education at a national and state level.

Memberships - New, Renewals, and Updating Your Information

Remember that when you join NAfME that membership fee includes your NMMEA membership. You cannot just join one organization or the other. You are encouraged to process your membership on line although NMMEA will continue to accept membership renewals included with All-State registration fees.

If you are a current member of NAfME/NMMEA please log into our website using your latest password. If you didn't change your password last fall your 9-digit NAfME membership will probably work. You will find the login button in the top right corner of our website. Once you log into our website you will be asked to update your profile. Please make sure all information is correct and click "Save".

Note: It is VERY important that you access our website using the email that you have on file with NAfME. If you are unsure what email this is or if you are unable to log in, please contact NAfME at: membersupport@nafme.org.

If you wish to renew your membership, you may do so by clicking "renew" in the upper right hand corner of our website and following the prompts. If you are not a member, you can join NMMEA/NAfME by going to our website and selecting "join" in the upper right hand corner. It is advised that you use your personal email and not a school email. Please make a note of your email and password.

Remember the roster information that is posted on our website is taken directly from NAfME's database. We do not enter or correct any data posted on the online roster. It is your responsibility to update your contact information. Please notify me of any changes to your contact information. Please encourage non-members and new music educators to join NAfME/NMMEA.

In order to maintain an up to date database I would like to ask all new teachers to our state and music educators who have taken new positions to please email me your home contact information as well as your school contact information.

All-State Audition Online Registration Form

The on line registration form is contained in the "All-State" link and also on our home page in the banner. Be sure to follow instructions carefully so you enter your students accurately. Please note that you will have to pay for all the students you register no matter if they actually audition or not. No substitutions. Additionally please print a copy of your registration form BEFORE you hit the "Submit Button" so you have a copy to cross check. You also need to post your registration form so your students can verify that they are registered and their voice classification or instrument is entered correctly. You will need to have your membership current in order to register students and you will need to know your NAfME identification number or password to log into the form. For your registration to be complete you must send a copy of your PO or a check to the Executive Director PRI-OR to the start of auditions. No student will be allowed to audition if the audition fee is not paid or if the PO is not received prior to the audition date.

Special Requests

Special requests for auditioning must be made on the audition registration

form at the time of the audition registration form as submitted. This is not meant to be for things like "This is what I prefer or would like". It is for special circumstances that you have no control over like securing a bus or a testing conflict. Missing class time, while important, is not considered a high priority since there are limited time slots in the late afternoon. There is no guarantee that all requests can be honored. Due to the increased number of very specific requests please limit special requests to only "Morning" or "Afternoon". For the Albuquerque auditions you may request the day also. Do not request specific times such as "between 10:00 AM and Noon". All requests for special scheduling consideration must be requested through the Executive Director. Please provide sufficient justification for your requests in the "Reason for Request" box for the Executive Director to evaluate the validity of your request. If no reason is provided your request will not be considered. Travel considerations will be factored in for scheduling. More information regarding the audition process can be found in the "NMMEA Summer Updates" posted on our home page. New Mexico Arts Grant I am pleased to announce that New Mexico Arts has awarded NMMEA a grant in the amount of \$6018 for this fiscal year. Thanks again to Joseph Flores for preparing the grant proposal we. We received excellent scores from the reviewers as well as many positive comments. Bravo to all who make NMMEA a quality organization and volunteer their time as officers and to help at the district and state level.

Important Update - Fees for those who choose to Register On-Site for All-State will cost you more. You have been encouraged to register on-line BEFORE you arrive at All-State for many years. Most have done so but there are still people

who do not. Now that we have had to modify our on site check in and issuance of badges those who wait to register at All-State and/or renew their membership takes a lot of extra time. Not only that but is slowed down the whole process because our registrars had to spend extra time looking up your member ID and helping you get through multiple steps to get registered. As a result your Board of Directors voted to increase on-site fees fairly significantly to encourage everyone to renew their memberships with NAfME before arriving at All-State and to register for All-State on our website prior to arriving on site. Active members and all non-members will be charged an additional \$30 if they register on site January 9-12, 2019. Collegiate students will have to pay an additional \$10 if they register on-site. Please be advised of these fee changes and remind vourself to renew memberships and register on-line before arriving at UNM. Since we can no longer tie into the NAfME database we are also asking that membership renewals with NAfME be taken care of no later than January 1, 2019.

Reminders

The NMMEA 75th All-State Music Festival & In-Service Conference will be held on the campus of the University of New Mexico January 9-12, 2019. The All-State schedule will be very similar to the schedules of the past few years. The schedule will be posted in early December. Start making plans to attend All-State and help us celebrate providing music opportunities to the students of New Mexico for 75 years.

Please note that our registration form for All-State will have a different look. Neil Swapp and myself have been working very hard so that we don't experience the same problems that we had last year. While not our fault we have been working with NAFME staff to hopefully have a registra-

tion process that will go smoothly.

Most music educators are involved to some degree in other school and community activities. If you are not you are encouraged to do so. There is no better way for you to promote your program and gain support for it than getting out in your community and interacting with the other teachers in your school and your administration. You are also encouraged to be involved in the NMMEA district and state events and activities. Our organization is based on music educators volunteering to help. This is the strength of our organization.

Please check our website as it has an abundance of information. A number of important documents are posted including the NMMEA By-Laws, Articles of Incorporation, Minutes of our Executive Committee and Board of Directors Meetings, Calendar of Musical Events, and our Handbook. Your Executive Committee and Board of Directors updated last year's "Handbook" and made some changes in procedures. Please be sure to read the entire "Handbook".

By the time you read this column the results of the vote asking if NMMEA should add a jazz section to our Association. If accepted all of our official documents will have to be updated. If you haven't read them please go so. Those document are the NMMEA By-Laws, Articles of Incorporation, and our Handbook Please also read the Minutes of our Executive Committee and our Board of Directors Meetings.

Conference Hotel

Our conference hotel for the 2019 will again be the Sheraton Albuquerque Uptown Hotel located at the corner of Menaul and Louisiana NE. The rate will be \$94 per room plus tax for up to four students per room. There is ample parking (buses included) at the hotel. A hot deluxe breakfast buf-

fet is included and will be served in one of their ballrooms. The breakfast will include scrambled eggs, sausage or bacon, breakfast potatoes, waffles/pancakes/or French toast, doughnuts, assorted muffins/breakfast breads, various fruits (whole or sliced), cold cereals, yogurt, milk, juice, and coffee. There will also be free Wi-Fi for all rooms booked for NMMEA. The Coronado Mall is located across the street and ABQ Uptown is relatively close. Your Board of Directors encourages directors to support the Sheraton Uptown even though it is the director's choice as to where to house their students.

Music is closely related to religion, hence closely related to life.

"How many of us ever stop to think of music as a wonderous magic link with God; taking sometimes the place of prayer when words have failed us 'neath a weight of care. Music that knows no country, race nor creed; but gives to each according to his need."

Since music is a wondrous magic link with God, and since this great possibility for growth is there in the young people of New Mexico, this would mean that the music educators in New Mexico can do as much work as the pastors in New Mexico can do to make their people individually and collectively a tower of strength, not only for the state but for the nation.

Audition materials can be found online at ww.nmmea.com. Please encourage your students to participate and make All-state auditions a priority. All tempos of the etudes are included in the audition list. some of which are different than printed in the etude books. Please take care that all students are aware of the tempo markings. Also, be sure to check that your students are observing the required minimum ranges and rhythm patterns for the scales. All etudes are shortened and students only need to prepare the indicated measure numbers. All auditions include sight reading.

Registration for All-State auditions will be online--please go to www.nmmea.com to find the link to register. We will be using the Commitment Form again this year, which require the signatures of students, their parents and directors. This form should be signed before the student is registered to audition for All-State. Students who do not

honor their commitment will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis and may be prohibited from participating in future NMMEA activities. Extenuating circumstances will of course be understood and taken into account. The All-State commitment form can be found on the All-State Audition tab at www.nmmea.com. Each student must submit a signed

copy (3 signatures) prior to auditioning to his or her director or sponsor who will keep the form on file until All-State has concluded for that year.

Important note: Percussion auditions have been shortened and simplified. Please refer to the website for the changes.

I know that both Carla and Jennifer will do great work in their new positions, and we are in very capable hands! The NMMEA Board of Directors met this summer at the end of July. At that meeting we were given the go ahead to pilot a third audition site for All-State strings at Farmington High School. We will vote in January at the Orchestra section meeting to decide whether or not we want to keep the third site. If we decide that the third site is necessary and helpful, a formal proposal will be presented to the Board in February. The wheels of NMMEA grind slowly.

Other points of discussion at the meeting were developing judging standards for MPA's, and the future of the NM Musician. It looks like we are moving in the direction of having a registry of trained adjudicators for MPA's. While it is not yet compulsory, or even in place, we might want to start thinking about what the trainings will look like, and the logistics of making them available to

prospective adjudicators. The NM Musician is NMMEA's print magazine. The print magazine will be mailed out as usual for the remainder of 2018, but the Board is looking at the possibility of moving to an online format in the near future. Again, we should probably start thinking about the pros and cons of such a change, as the NMMEA membership will be asked to weigh in on that. As always, we have had a lot of changes in orchestra positions throughout the state. I have done my best to get the new people on the email list, but if you know of someone who isn't getting the emails and needs to, please let me know. Welcome to all of the new orchestra teachers in our state, good luck to everyone changing schools, and congratulations to those who have retired! I know that most high school students have been preparing for All-State for months (right?), but here are the audition materials, just in case. Please note that the sightreading will now be played BEFORE the solo, to ensure that each audition is only seven minutes long. The solos for each instrument are listed easiest as #1, medium difficulty #2, and most difficult #3. Some changes have been made since the materials were first announced last spring, so it might be worthwhile to review the list. 
The Concert Orchestra this year will be under the direction of Michael Hopkins, an associate professor of music education at the University of Michigan, where he teaches undergraduate courses in string techniques, orchestra methods, and music technology, and graduate courses in psychology of music and research methods. Michael is an astoundingly good string pedagogue; his workshop at UNM a few summers ago was one of the best I've ever attended. He has programmed Centennial by Richard Meyer, Baccanale from "Samson & Delilah" by Saint-Säens, Intermezzo from "Cavalleria Rusticana" by Verdi, and Marche Slave by Tchaikovsky.

Jeff Turner, the Fine Arts Director for the Allen (TX) Independent School District, will conduct the Symphony Orchestra. Jeff started his musical career playing second violin with the New Mexico All-State Orchestra (he wouldn't tell me which year). His program includes Brahms' Academic Festival Overture, Dana Wilson's Shortcut Home, and the 3rd movement of Howard Hanson's Symphony No. 2, the Romantic. Our students are sure to have a tremendous experience at All-State, in either group!

While the students are working with Michael and Jeff, educators will have the opportunity to attend workshops given by Marcia Neel (Practical Guide to Recruitment and Retention), Dr. Jason Sah (Achieving Physical Freedom through Bowing Choices), Daniel Fear (NM Core Arts Standards), and Ruth Striegel (Choosing the Best Repertoire for Your Orchestra). We are hoping to be able to

offer a reading session through JW-Pepper as well; Art Sheinberg will be working on that (thank you Art!). Last, but certainly not least, the Honor Orchestra to perform at All-State 2019 will be the Centennial High School Chamber Orchestra, under the direction of Daniel Rivera. Daniel has lead the Orchestra program at CHS since 2012, after over thirty years teaching in El Paso. His groups have consistently scored well at MPA's and State Contests in both New Mexico and Texas. Daniel has played viola professionally in both states as well. As usual, we will have an exemplary high school orchestra performing at All-State this year. Thank you everyone, for all of your work with our orchestra students.

It is a very good sign to me that every guest conductor who works with our students goes home with a sense of how strong and healthy our programs are. We are able to invite outstanding conductors because the reputation of New Mexico All-State orchestras precedes us, and that is a direct reflection on you, the orchestra teachers of New Mexico. Greetings to all general music teachers! By the time you read this article, the school year will have started and your semester will be well on its way. I am typing this on first day of August, which is my first day of school and I am very excited to for the possibilities of the year.

The NMMEA Executive Board and District Presidents met this past July to plan and discuss the business of NMMEA as well as the upcoming 2019 All-State Conference. As far as the General Music portion of the All-State Conference is concerned, there will be many wonderful clinics presented by some outstanding music educators.

I am pleased to announce our headliner clinician for the All-State Conference, Dr. David Frego. He is the Director of the School of Music at Penn State University and past president of the American Eurhythmics Society. He is an instructor in Dalcroze Eurhythmics and regularly presents workshops throughout the globe. While performing artists of all ages benefit from rhythmic training, eurhythmics in teacher training is an important focus of Dr. Frego's research. I know that you will join me in congratulating Virginia and supporting her and the choir in this wonderful opportunity.

Please read very carefully all of the following information about All-State Auditions.

As in the past, please register your students online at www.nmmea. com by September 15, 2018. Check the spelling of each student's name and voice part and be sure to enter their preferred ensemble if they are auditioning for more than one. It is extremely important that we adhere to the guidelines for auditions and remember that accompanists have a limit of playing for twenty students. Recorded accompaniments are allowed, but cannot interfere with the master schedule. Please go to the www.nmmea.com website, select the "About" tab and find the Handbook with detailed information about the scripted audition process. Another reminder is to select appropriate solos for your students. The NMMEA Handbook defines it as a solo of worthwhile educational value. Pop music will not be accepted. The solo audition will be stopped at two minutes so instructors should select and mark the two minutes they wish the adjudicator to hear. You must bring an original copy of the solo for the adjudicator. No photocopies will be accepted. The audition procedure is explained in detail in the Handbook and will be strictly adhered to

for every student. The short version of the procedure is as follows: solo (2 min.,) choral piece "i carry your heart" (1 min.,) sight-reading prep (1 min.,) sight-reading adjudication (1 min.) leaving two minutes for entry and exit. No tempo setting devices are allowed in the audition room. Teachers, accompanists and students may not wear name tags, school insignia or any other form of identification in the audition room. The audition selection, "i carry your heart" will be performed with the learning/audition CD available from www.eercmusic.com and will be used in every audition. No substitute recordings or live accompaniments for this piece will be allowed. Please make sure your students and accompanists are aware of these procedures and guidelines before audition day. It is extremely important that we all adhere to these guidelines to help make the audition process go well for everyone involved, most importantly, the students.

Dr. Robin Giebelhausen will compose the sight-reading examples. We are extremely grateful to Robin for stepping in to this position and taking on this important task. Jean Ornellas has graciously agreed to continue to prepare the all-state audition schedule. After she sends you an email with your students' assigned times, you have 48 hours to contact Don Gerheart, gerheart@ earthlink.net, if you need to make a correction in voice part, spelling, accompanist, etc. Again, everyone needs to do their part to make this work so check your list very carefully and respond within 48 hours.

Auditions will be Monday, October 15th in Portales (ENMU), Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, October 16th -18th in Albuquerque (UNM) and Friday, October 19th in Las Cruces (NMSU.) Choral adjudicators

are Dr. Michael Hix and Dr. David Edmunds from UNM, Dr. Greg Gallagher and Travis Sherwood from ENMU and Dr. Randi Bolding from NMSU. Site chairs will assist in running a smooth audition process. Please do your part to prepare your students well, get them to the audition site with plenty of time, and adhere strictly to the schedule. A huge thank you to our amazing audition team for their hard work and taking the time out of their busy schedules to take on this monumental task!

At upcoming District Meetings, your District President will be asking for a list of volunteers from the choral section to monitor rehearsals, move risers for Popejoy rehearsals and performances, and introduce clinicians at the 2019 All-State In-Service Clinics. 

DO YOU BELIEVE?

Another "Music Performance Assessment" has passed, thankfully. The Thesaurus has synonyms for assessment: valuation, calculation, taxation. Ugh! Oh for the good old days when music ensembles had a FESTIVAL! But we are currently stuck with it. I only observed bands and, as usual, there were fantastic, great, mediocre, sad and terrible groups. Actually, no "terribles" as current rules allow these groups to be "no shows" and con their administrations as to alternate evaluations.

My concern is to wonder about the mediocre and sad bands. What is the key to bringing these groups of youngsters into the joy of music mak-

ing? The key is, without a doubt, the person up front, the music educator. These appointed leaders usually have credible resumes, education, experience, certification. Why then are the observable results so disparate? My conclusion is that the "exemplary" truly believe in music education. They truly believe that their students, from no matter whatever background. can produce and enjoy the beauty of music ensemble participation. As they meet each class, at whatever level, learning new literature, be it "Hot Cross Buns," " Military Escort" or "La Fiesta Mexicana," they sincerely believe that these youngsters can make music together and at a high level. And without a doubt these teachers 'love kids." This attitude quickly transfers to the students and they become "believers" as well.

The "true believers" have musical expectations from the first note sounded each day. That first note and the proceeding warmup/tuneup leads to the group experiencing the warmth of a full band sound. This establishes the basic expectation that the following rehearsal will have a satisfying musical outcome.

So often, while adjudicating imperfect ensembles, I have come to the conclusion that "this group has NEVER played one truly good note." It may be that those teachers of inferior ensembles may have never established in their own mind that the student group is capable of producing a fine sound and thus have not diligently led the students in all the technics necessary for that product. Concentrating on that "one truly good note" can quickly lead to satisfying ensemble sound and musical performance. But...the leader has to firmly believe that the process is worth the result. Beginning classes can enjoy this experience as well as advanced ensembles. Overhearing comments by "ineffective" teachers it is clear that they do not think that their clients can produce beautiful music, therefore failure is the fault of the students. Perhaps these employees do not even "like kids." Perhaps these employees need to be weeded out.

Mentoring by proven "exemplary" leaders may establish the "true believer" mentality with our newbie music educators. Faith in music education can be instilled in those entering first days in the band room. Above all..

New Mexico Jazz Educators Bruce Dalby, Chair



Update: NMMEA Jazz Division Initiative

For more than a year NMMEA and New Mexico Jazz Educators leaders have engaged in intensive discussions about bringing NMJE and its activities under the NMMEA umbrella. In June 2018 an ad hoc committee met to develop a proposal for creating an NMMEA Jazz division. In attendance were Bernie Chavez, Don Gerheart, Neil Swapp, Ryan Finn, Carla Lehmeier, Jennifer Rogers, Sayra Salter, and Yours Truly. The resulting proposal was considered by the NMMEA Board of Directors at its July 24 meeting. The Board gave its unanimous approval to the creation of a Jazz division. and voted to authorize an NMMEA membership vote on the question. Although the results of that vote will not be known until weeks after the deadline for this article, the information here is founded on the assumption of a positive vote, and that NMJE will be dissolved and Jazz All-State 2019 will take place as an NMMEA Jazz Division event. Still, I urge jazz educators to stay up to date about Jazz All-State information and policies by regularly consulting nmmea.com/ all-state/jazz-all-state-information. The most significant policy change of the Jazz division proposal is the cessation of the middle school Jazz

All-State component. Although that program has been successful in its two years of existence, I am optimistic about prospects for future middle school jazz honor group initiatives, possibly at the district level or under the sponsorship of nonprofit jazz organizations.

2019 Jazz All-State Conference will be held January 25-27 at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. Sincere thanks to Dr. Rich Schwartz for taking on the considerable workload associated with hosting. Clinicians will be: High School Band I – Steve Weist, University of Denver

High School Band 2 – Richard Schwartz, Eastern New Mexico University

High School Band 3 – Brad Dubbs, Eldorado High School

Audition material and procedures are posted at nmmea.com/all-state/jazzall-state-information. The deadline to register for auditions is Friday, October 5, 2018; all registrations must be postmarked on or before this date. The cost of each audition is \$20.00 per student per audition. For example, if one student auditions on both alto and tenor saxophone, the total cost for that student will be \$40.00. The late registration deadline is Friday, October 12, 2018. No registrations will be accepted after this date. There is an additional \$10.00 charge per audition per student for late registration. For example, if one student auditions on both alto and tenor saxophone and registered late, the total cost for that student would be \$60.00. Schwartz@enmu.edu Jazz Sessions at NMMEA All-State The jazz headliner this year will be Dean Sorenson, Director of Jazz Studies at the University of Minnesota, and a highly sought-after composer, arranger, trombonist, educator, and clinician. He will present two clinics: "Jazz Rehearsal Game Plan" and "All About the Rhythm Section." I will also do a session entitled "Getting Started With Jazz Improvisation". New Audition Policies NMJE members at their January 2018 business meeting authorized several new policies for Jazz All-State auditions: The audition etude will be performed not with metronome, as in the past, but with an accompaniment track of piano, bass and drums. Improvisation is required, not optional. All auditioners will improvise to two choruses of Bb blues. The chord progression is provided with the practice resources posted online, but in the audition it must be memorized: no notation permitted. The two choruses of improvisation will be preceded by a blues "head" (melody), played from memory. This year's blues head is Tenor Madness by Sonny Rollins. Because of copyright we are unable to provide the notation to the melody. A recommended source is volume 8 of the Jamey Aebersold jazz playalong series: Sonny Rollins. The practice accompaniment tracks are three choruses (three times through the chord progression) played at quarter note = 168; chorus 1: play head; choruses 2 and 3: improvise. nmmea.com/all-state/ jazz-all-state-information to

2019 John Batcheller Award Kim Letellier - Los Alamos

Kim says of herself, "I graduated Summa Cum Laude with a Bachelors of Music Education from Kansas State University in May 1987. I also completed Level One and Two in Orff-Schulwerk training in 2002 & 2003, respectively. I started my teaching career in Rossville, KS for the Kaw Valley Unified School District #321. I taught K-6 music in two schools in that district for two years from Aug. 1987 to May 1989. In Aug. 2000, I was hired for a job-share elementary music position in the Los Alamos Public Schools. I am now teaching at the school my own children attended. Chamisa Elementary. I teach all K-6 students at Chamisa each week. I also conduct two band ensembles, 5th grade beginning band and 6th grade advanced band. I founded and direct the non-audition school choir called The Chamisa Sing-Sations, (grades 4-6, with 3rd grade by special invitation) and the hand chime group called The Chamisa Chime-Ringers (a 6th grade exclusive group). In 2004, The Chamisa Sing-Sations choir was selected as the NMMEA

Music Honor Group. My professional experience extends far beyond the classroom in LAPS. I have served the district for the past 16 years as the District Music Team Lead. With that title comes many responsibilities including coordinating professional development, overseeing purchasing, and supporting curricular vertical alignment activities. I have served the New Mexico chapter of the American Orff-Schulwerk Association as a member-at-large (2004-2006). During that time. I coordinated the Donate 30 program in honor of the chapter's 30th anniversary. I have also been a host for an NM-AOSA workshop in Los Alamos at my school. One of my most rewarding service activities has been the time I spent as NMMEA General Music vice-president (2009-2011). I truly enjoyed serving my colleagues in this capacity. It was rewarding to bring world-renowned clinicians to the educators of New Mexico. I also enjoyed discovering the wonderful music educators that we have in this state. While attending NMMEA annual

conferences is always a highlight of the year, I have also consistently attended the Kansas Music Educators Conference, where I maintain connections with fellow music education graduates and with my former mentors. "



2019 Rollie V. Heltman – Service Award Joseph Flores - Las Cruces

Joseph Flores has been teaching middle school and high school band programs in the El Paso, Texas and Las Cruces, New Mexico areas since 1997. In his career, Mr. Flores has taught at several schools. Most notably, he has taught at Las Cruces High School, Onate High School, Centennial High School, and now Zia Middle School. Under his direction, all of his groups have consistently earned superior ratings and have been recognized at local, state, and national levels for musical excellence. While at Las Cruces High School, the music department was recognized as a Grammy Foundation Signature School in 2000. Also, during his tenure at Las Cruces the LCHS Jazz Band was selected as the 2002 Jazz Honor Band by the New Mexico Jazz Educators (NMJE). While at Onate High School, the OHS Royal Knight Regiment marching band earned high finals placement at all competitions, including Bands of America Regionals. Additionally, while at OHS, the Symphonic Wind Ensemble won the 2009 state championship for concert bands hosted by the New Mexico Activities Association (NMAA). In 2012, Mr. Flores was selected to open New Mexico's newest comprehensive

high school, Centennial High School, as the school's first director of bands and elective department head. In its inaugural year, the CHS band program opened with less than 60 students. In four years the program more than doubled in enrollment size and offered a comprehensive band program with marching band, multiple concert bands, multiple jazz bands, winter guard, and a chamber music program. Under Mr. Flores' direction all Centennial band programs were widely recognized for their very high level of success in musical achievement on the field and in the concert hall. In 2016 the CHS Wind Symphony won the state championship for concert bands hosted by NMAA. In addition to his responsibilities with the Centennial band program, Mr. Flores was also the coconductor of the Centennial Symphony Orchestra. The CHS Symphony Orchestra won the state championship for orchestras hosted by NMAA in 2014, 2015, and 2016 and was selected as the 2016 honor orchestra by the New Mexico Music Educators Association (NMMEA). Additionally, Mr. Flores was nominated for the 2016 Golden Apple Award by the New Mexico Golden Apple Foundation.

Since 2009, Mr. Flores has annually written grant applications on behalf of NMMEA, earning the association over \$55,000 in funding. Lastly, Mr. Flores is member and Past President of the New Mexico Chapter of the International Band Master's Fraternity, Phi Beta Mu.



2019 Teacher Emeritus Award Henry Estrada - Los Lunas

Henry Estrada is a native of New Mexico. He was born and raised in Deming and attended New Mexico State University in Las Cruces where he earned his Bachelor of Music Education degree in 1977. He taught in the Alamogordo Public Schools system for four years before entering the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque. He received his Master of Music Education degree from UNM in 1983 before accepting the position which he currently holds as Director of Bands at Los Lunas High School.

Mr. Estrada's Wind Ensemble and Symphonic Bands have earned first division awards at district, state, and regional festivals. His top groups have earned 29 consecutive First Division ratings at District Festivals and 11 First Division ratings at State Festivals. The marching bands have received numerous awards at state and regional festivals, including

many first place trophies for parade marching. In addition, the "Tiger Band" has represented New Mexico at the Sun Bowl Parade in El Paso, Texas and at the Hollywood Christmas Parade in Hollywood, California.

Henry also performs professionally in the Albuquerque area. He has played trumpet and recorded with the Albuquerque Jazz Orchestra, the Outpost Jazz Orchestra, the Chamber Orchestra of Albuquerque, the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra, Henry has been involved at the State level of the New Mexico Music Educators Association. He has served as Band Vice-President and also as State President of this organization. He has served two terms as president of the state chapter of Phi Beta Mu, national band director fraternity, and as the treasurer of the New Mexico Jazz Educators Association. He has also served as director of the New



Mexico Ambassadors of Music European Tour since 2004.

Henry was named "Music Educator of the Year" by the New Mexico Activities Association (NMAA) in 2003 and also by the New Mexico Music Educators Association (NMMEA) in 2005. In 2011, the New Mexico Jazz Workshop elected him to the Jazz Educators Hall of Fame.

2019 Music Educator of the Year Award Marilyn Barnes - Santa Fe

Marilyn took on the choral program at Santa Fe High with seventeen students in SY 2007-2008. Within a year, she had birthed traditions such as a yearly excursion to Disneyland for the Music in the Parks Festival, summer choral tours in Europe, winter and summer intensive study retreats, clinics, National Association of Teachers of Singing festival participation, fundraisers, master classes, workshops, and more. All of her performing ensembles bring in consistent superior ratings in Music Performance Assessment, and she never has failed to enter her top ensembles in the State Choir Contest. What began as a program with one or two choral ensembles is now characterized with two beginning ensembles, one intermediate ensemble, two advanced ensembles, and more than 150 students all told. Voice class and music theater classes are additional curricular enhancements.

Student accomplishments and activities under Marilyn's leadership are unending. Her ensembles are the frequent recipients of performance invitations for civic

affairs, professional performing arts events, and merchant-related occurrences. Our local Santa Fe community well knows her ensembles.

Marilyn has served our aspiring adult community as SFPS Choral Team Leader and as Vice President of Choir for North Central New Mexico Music Educators' Association. As a leader in our department, Marilyn has mentored, taught, and coached many new and developing choral educators. She has served as a mainstay of support through all of our SFPS choral division setbacks, challenges, and achievements. Many of our choral educators, past and present, may attribute their growth in professionalism directly to Marilyn. Further, her concern for the district choral program, with ensembles in more than twenty schools, has enabled our Santa Fe Public Schools choral program to move into excellence from a tenuous rebuilding phase which began 10 years ago.

Marilyn's activities in the world of choral arts are fueled by her love of music and

children.

For all that Marilyn has given us, her accomplishments and achievements, her impact upon the lives hundreds of students, and her influence upon choral education at the local, regional and state level, she is most deserving of this award.

Marilyn herself is a testimony to excellence in the field of choral education. Her modeling is an inspiration. Her energy, creativity, and enthusiasm



are something we all draw upon for sustenance to carry out our own individual missions.!

2019 Hall of Fame Award Dr. John Clark - Albuquerque

John Clark began his musical career a young age studying piano with Jessie Demotte Case, the last living student of Franz Liszt. While in Indianapolis, John continued to serve as organist for Irvington Presbyterian Church. Both John and Janie graduated from IU in 1963 with BME degrees and married that August in Marion, Indiana.

1965, daughter Clarissa was born and in 1966 John earned of Arts Degree. John received a call from Don Neuen letting him know he was headed to UW and would he like to come be on staff and pursue his Doctorate of Musical Arts. In 1970 John was offered a dual position at Michigan Tech University, Houghton. He accepted and relocated his family to the peninsula. upper In the spring of 1972, John became a finalist in the search for a choral director to replace Eph Ely at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque. In May of that year, he and Janie welcomed another daughter, Kelcy, accepted the position at UNM and relocated to Albuquerque where John began his 33 year career at

the University of New Mexico. John served as the conductor of the Concert Choir, University Chorus and Chamber Singers, oversaw the graduate program in Choral Conducting, taught courses in applied conducting, choral methods and techniques, and score study at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. Sensing the choral program needed a boost, he began the UNM Collegiate in 1973. This Singers chorale was the "Wisconsin Singers" and "Ball State Singers" of New Mexico. The ensemble was existence for 30 years. John served as the founding Choral Director for the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra, the Masterchorale of Albuquerque, was the director of the Albuquerque Boy Choir and the chorus director for Opera Southwest and served as Chairman of the Music Department for three years. John has directed All State High School Choirs, High School Honor Choirs in over 32 states and been an festival for 50 adjudicator over years. John has faithfully served as the organist and/or choral director for Trinity United

Methodist Church, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, First United Methodist Church, Monte Vista Christian Church, St. Francis Episcopal Church and currently serves and the accompanist for the Neighborhood Church. He retired from the University of New Mexico in May of 2005 following his final performance of Brahms REQUIEM. In retirement" he continued to serve as Director of Music for First United Methodist Church, and director of the Festival Choruses until 2012.!



2019 Hall of Fame Award Dr. Bruce Dalby - Albuquerque

Bruce Dalby grew up in Logan, Utah in a musical family. His father Max F. Dalby was a prominent music educator, and Bruce started the footsteps-following process by taking up the trumpet at age seven. All nine children in the family played instruments, and Bruce was one of three to become a music teacher. After his undergrad work at Utah State University Bruce spent five years as a school band director in Caldwell, Idaho. That was followed by a master's degree at the University of Illinois, then five more wonderful years in the mid 1980s as band director at Manzano High School in Albuquerque. After leaving New Mexico to earn his doctorate, he was fortunate to be able to return to the Land of Enchantment in 1989 to take a music education position in the Department of Music at the University of New Mexico, where he is currently Professor Emeritus. His activities at UNM have been varied, including six years as director of the jazz program. His main

responsibilities, however, have been in music teacher preparation. He considers teaching music itself plenty challenging,

but to presume to teach how to teach is especially audacious. Still, he tries. As a working retiree at UNM Bruce teaches aural skills courses and occasional methods courses for music education majors. Other post-retirement activities include serving as President of the New Mexico Jazz Educators and the Albuquerque Jazz Orchestra. He also tries to stay relevant by maintaining an active music making life. Learning to read music notation in one's youth can pay wonderful dividends, including giving white boys from Utah the opportunity to play jazz and salsa in addition to the standard "classical" fare. He considers himself lucky to be able to gig occasionally, and will likely continue to do so as long as the lips buzz and the phone rings.



2019 Administrator of the Year Award Jakob Lain - Santa Fe


2019 New & Emerging Music Educator of the Year Award Miguel Jaramillo - Rio Rancho

The annual Autumn Overture concert series this year featured nearly all of NMSU's instrumental and choral ensembles in concerts in early October in Atkinson Recital Hall. On October 3, the Wind Symphony performed, directed by Dr. Michael Mapp, Director of Bands. On October 9th, the premiere concert of the choirs under the direction of new Director of Choral Activities, Dr. Randi Bolding, was presented. On October 12th, the Jazz Ensembles, led by Dr. Pancho Romero, performed after their exciting trip to Spain this past summer. Finally, on Oct. 13th, Simon Golló led the Philharmonic Orchestra in a concert of varied works.

Winds and Percussion

We are pleased to announce the appointment of Dr. Steven Smyth as the Associate Director of Bands/Director of Athletic Bands, following one year as Interim Associate Director. Dr. Smyth will also serve as Coordinator of Music Education. He earned his bachelor's degree in Music Education from Iowa State University, a Masters in Wind Conducting Performance and Pedagogy from Oklahoma State University, and the DMA in Conducting from the University of Kansas. Before joining NMSU, Dr. Smyth had a very successful tenure at Iowa State University where he directed the Cyclone Marching Band, Symphonic Band, Men's Basketball Band, as well as teaching Marching Band Methods. While under his leadership, the Cyclone Marching Band at Iowa State won the coveted Sudler Trophy. The John Philip Sousa Foundation awards the trophy every two years to only one exceptional college marching band. Dr. Smyth previously served as Associate Director of Bands at the University of Central Arkansas. He taught in the public schools of Iowa for several years, beginning at Lenox High School and then at Dowling Catholic High School. As an arranger and drill writer, Smyth writes shows for com-

petitive high school programs across the United States. He also maintains an active schedule as a clinician, adjudicator, and guest conductor across the United States, Europe, and Japan.

We are also happy to introduce Dr. Madelyn Moore as Visiting Assistant Professor of Clarinet and Music Education. Most recently, she served as Instructor of Woodwinds at Kilgore College in Kilgore, TX and at Tarrant County College-Northeast Campus in Hurst, TX. Dr. Moore completed her DMA at the University of Kansas, and also holds a Masters of Music in clarinet performance from Northern Illinois University and a Bachelors of Music Education from Texas Christian University. Dr. Moore has taught extensively in the Chicago area, in the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex, and has been on staff at Midwestern Music Academy, Blue Lake Fine Arts Camp and the TCU Band Camps.

Dr. Moore is an active performer and lecturer, having given chamber performances at The Juilliard School and Mannes College of Music, and at the Midwest Double Reed Society Conference. She was an invited lecturer at the 2006 Clarinetfest in Atlanta, GA as well as the 2015 ClarinetFest in Madrid, Spain and gave a lecture and performance at the 2016 ClarinetFest in Lawrence, KS, and performed as soloist at the Southeastern United States Band Directors Conference held at Troy State University in Troy, Alabama. She has also performed with the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra, the Fort Worth Civic Orchestra, the Sinfonietta of Fort Worth, the New Texas Symphony and the Illinois Valley and Kishwaukee Symphony Orchestras. Dr. Moore has performed as principal clarinet of the Taneycomo Festival Orchestra and has given chamber concerts as part of the Imani Winds Chamber Music Festival. As principal clarinet of the University of Kansas Wind Ensemble she was featured as a soloist on their CD

"Landscapes" which was released on the Naxos Label. With this group she also premiered Mohammed Fairouz's piece In the Shadow of No Towers at Carnegie Hall in the spring of 2013, which was also recorded and released on the Naxos label.

The NMSU Wind Symphony, directed by Dr. Michael Mapp, Director of Bands, performed two concerts this fall in Atkinson Recital Hall, first on October 3rd as part of the Autumn Overture concert series, and the second on November 13th. The October concert, entitled "Shadow and Light", featured works by Wagner, Ticheli, Perrine, Freund, Chin Ting Chan, and H. Owen Reed. "Prismatic Pastiche", the second concert, featured works by Husa, Grainger, Suchan, Welcher, and Giannini.

The NMSU PRIDE Band, under the direction of Dr. Steven Smyth, Associate Director of Bands, was featured in a Concert on the Green on Sunday, August 19th at the Corbett Center on the NMSU campus. This concert was presented for local community members, students, and parents as a great way to start off the fall semester. Dr. Smyth also led the Symphonic band in two concerts in Atkinson Recital Hall, the first on September 25th and the second on October 15th.

This fall's 41st annual Tournament of Bands took place on October 27th in Aggie Memorial Stadium, and brought more than 30 bands from around the region, including New Mexico, Texas and Arizona. This year's tournament featured special guest announcer Brandt Crocker, Drum Corps International Hall of Fame announcer.

The New Mexico State University Jazz Ensemble and Trumpet Studio, led by Dr. Pancho Romero, participated in a cultural exchange and a series of performances and workshops in the province of Valencia, Spain June 24th through June 27th. The

ensembles were invited to perform in Spain by Vicente Campos, director of the Conservatori Superior de Música de Castelló. Dr. Campos visited NMSU in the spring of 2017, and conducted masterclasses for the trumpet students and attended a rehearsal of the jazz ensemble. The ensemble's mission in Spain was to share knowledge and expertise in America's original musical art form, jazz.

The ensembles performed at the XXII Festival Internacional Música i Festa in Massanassa, Spain, a municipality of Valencia. The ensemble opened the week-long festival with a first ever jazz performance in a traditionally classical venue, premiering two compositions: Palos Nuevos, by Dan Gailey, a tribute to the Spanish flamenco style, and Pueblo de Taos, written for the NMSU Jazz Ensemble by Fred Sturm. Pueblo de Taos depicts native American culture and music of the region. While in Spain, the students visited the musical instrument manufacturer, Stamvi, where they were treated to a guided toured the facility. The ensembles concluded the tour with a stop in Paris, France where they visited the Paris Conservatory and the Cité de la Musique, a group of institutions dedicated to music.

Strings and Orchestra

La Catrina String Quartet released a new CD entitled "Alma con Brio" this summer, which featured quartets by Mozart, Beethoven, Shostakovich and the String Quartet no. 3 by Grammy winning composer Yalil Guerra. The CD was recorded in Las Cruces at Peace Lutheran Church and produced by RYCY Productions, which is based in California. Also released this summer was the new CD "Music for Tuba and String Quartet" featuring James Shearer, Professor of Tuba and Graduate Coordinator, with La Catrina String Quartet. com, on CD or instant download formats from all major media outlets. The recording features the premiere recording of Manny Albam's "Quintet for Tuba and Strings," along with new works for tuba and string quartet by Lester Pack, James Grant, and NMSU Department Chair Lon W. Chaffin. The recording also features the work "Cauterizing the Soul" by NMSU alumnus and film composer Justin Raines. This work won the 2014 Harvey Phillips prize for composition awarded by the International Tuba Euphonium Association.

The premiere CelloFest cello workshop, which took place on June 23rd, hosted eighteen cellists from the age of seven through adult from Las Cruces, Albuquerque, El Paso, and Chihuahua, Mexico. The participants were coached by NMSU cello faculty Jorge Espinoza, Erin Eyles Espinoza, and Joel Becktell, former principal cellist with the Austin Symphony Orchestra and the Santa Fe Pro Musica, and assistant principal cellist of the Santa Fe Symphony. The day included cello technique sessions, cello sectionals, cello ensemble, a masterclass, a session on breathing and relaxation techniques, and a presentation about how cellos are made by luthier Arnold Schnitzer. The CelloFest event concluded with performances by the cello faculty trio and the CelloFest ensemble in Atkinson Hall.

Choirs and Voice

We are pleased to announce the appointment of Dr. Randi Bolding as Director of Choral Activities. Dr. Bolding will conduct the University Singers, Statesmen and Masterworks Chorale, as well as teaching choral literature, beginning and advanced conducting, as well as choral methods courses. She holds degrees from Michigan State University (B.M. in Music Education and D.M.A. in Choral Conducting) as well as from

University of Texas at Austin (M.M. in Choral Conducting.), where she conducted both the Michigan State University Women's Glee Club and the University of Texas at Austin Longhorn Singers, respectively. She previously taught conducting, choral methods, qualitative research and supervised student teachers as well as founded and conducted the Singing Cardsmen, the premiere men's chorus, at the University of Louisville. After just one year as an ensemble, the Cardsmen were invited to performed at the annual 2017 KMEA (Kentucky Music Educators Association) state conference. In 2018, the Singing Cardsmen were invited as the premiere ensemble at the Collegiate Choral Showcase at Carnegie Dr. Bolding also taught for several years in the public schools in her native state of Texas, at the high school and middle school levels in North Austin. Under her direction her choirs received the highest ratings in contest, produced All-State singers and were consistently among the top choirs in the region. In addition to her public school teaching, she has held church music directing positions at Williamston United Methodist Church in Williamston, MI as well as at First United Methodist Church of Round Rock, in Round Rock, TX. She was also the Artistic Director for a 90-member adult civic chorus, The Round Rock Community Choir.

In addition to conducting and teaching, Dr. Bolding is an active adjudicator and clinician for regional and state organizations from the middle/junior high school to the collegiate level. Dr. Bolding has worked with ensembles and has been asked to present at state conferences across the country, speaking on topics such as teaching high school at-risk populations, building secondary choral programs, selecting repertoire, rehearsal strategies and developing sight-reading curriculums.

Gian Carlo Menotti's "The Medium" along with "Lyrical Apparitions" was presented on October 29th in Atkinson Recital Hall, showcasing NMSU faculty, students and community members. This pre-Halloween evening of haunting opera and song featured a "séance" of ghostly singers followed by the presentation of Menotti's dark opera about a medium, her daughter, their helper, a mute gypsy boy, the thin line between hoax and reality, and the hauntings of mysterious secrets of the past. Dr. Sarah Daughtrey, Voice Area Coordinator, sang the role of Madame Flora (the titular medium), with graduate student Ida Holguin as Monica, her daughter. Clinics and Workshops: The NMSU Jazz Ensembles, led by Dr. Pancho Romero. will host the 50th Annual Jazz Festival and Jump Start on November 15th and 16th. For this banner year, the Jazz Ensembles will be inviting Jazz Alumni to perform in an Alumni Jazz Ensemble directed by former director Mr. Sam Trimble. Guest soloist with the Alumni band will be Chris Vadala, former woodwind artist with the Chuck Mangione group. Other guest artists will be Wayne Bergeron, Los Angeles trumpet studio musician and lead trumpet with Gordon Goodwin's Big Phat Band, and Charlie Bisharat, LA jazz violinist and member of the John Tesh group.

we announce the retirement of Dr. Laroy Borchert, Professor of Clarinet. Dr. Borchert joined NMSU in 1984, with 34 years of service during his tenure. Dr. Borchert taught Applied Clarinet and Pedagogy/Literature, Woodwind Techniques, Woodwind Ensembles, as well as several music theory and history courses. He also served as Acting Department Head and Woodwind Area Coordinator, Ear Training Coordinator, as well as serving on several university committees. Dr. Borchert was the Principal Clarinet in the Las Cruces Symphony Orchestra, playing with them for more than 30 years. He will continue to perform with the LCSO as well as with the El Paso Symphony Orchestra after his retirement. He also performed with the El Paso Opera, Bruce Nehring Consort Orchestra, American Wind Symphony Orchestra, Waco Symphony Orchestra, and at the Blossom Music Festival at Kent State University. He was as a soloist with the Chamber Players de Las Cruces, El Paso Pro Musica, Sinfonia Clásica (Ciudad Juárez), at two conventions of the International Clarinet Association, and was the featured clarinet soloist on a tour of Germany in 1999. He premiered works in New Mexico, Arizona, Florida, and Puebla, Mexico. He has presented clinics and master classes internationally in Turkey, Germany, Mexico, and in Colombia. He is a Buffet Crampon clarinet Artist/Clinician and has been active as a soloist, clinician, and/or adjudicator in New Mexico, Texas, Florida, Georgia, Montana, and Ciudad Juárez, Mexico. He was also active as a scholar writing for music journals and presenting papers at humanities and music theory conventions.

Horn Professor Nancy Joy had an exciting summer traveling both internationally and in the U.S. to perform, serve as faculty and conduct ensembles. In May, Ms. Joy taught at "Hornswoggle" at the Humming-bird Music Camp in Jemez Springs.

In July, she attended the 50th anniversary of the International Horn Society meeting at Ball State University in Muncie, Indiana, where she premiered a three-movement work by Music Department Chair Lon W. Chaffin entitled "Red River" for flute, horn and piano. In Europe, she performed, conducted and taught at Festival SBALZ, the Spanish Brass Festival in Alzira, Spain. She also traveled to Boston, Bloomington, IN and Belgium.

Music Department Chair Lon W. Chaffin composed original music for the NMSU Theatre Department's production of River Bride, a play by Marisela Trevino Orta directed by Theatre Department Chair Wil Kilroy, that opened on September 21st at the ASNMSU Center for the Arts.

Allan Kaplan, Professor of Low Brass, released a new CD this fall entitled "Duke's Voice" with the Kaplan-Mack Goldsburgy Jazz Sextet by Fortuna Music, and recorded at the University of Texas at El Paso. The recording includes tunes inspired by legendary jazz musician Duke Ellington, including newly composed pieces and jazz standards.

Director of the NMSU Philharmonic Orchestra and Assistant Professor of Violin Simon Golló spent the summer conducting, performing and serving as faculty and clinician, as well as directing the annual Aruba Symphony Festival. In May, he was invited to be part of the faculty at a new program in Colombia, the Filarmónica Joven de Colombia, one of the most prestigious youth orchestras in the Professor Golló prepared the violins for their Central America tour, for which the soloist was famed violinist Joshua Bell. In May and June, Professor Golló toured Brazil, as a soloist and conductor at the Instituto Ciranda Música e Cidadania, as well as conducting master classes for violin and viola players in Cuiabá; at the first Festival de Cordas de Porto

Alegre, he performed three chamber music concerts as well as conducting master classes for more than twenty violinists; he also performed the Brahms Double Concerto with the Orquestra Sinfônica of the University of Caxias do Sul. In June and July, he conducted the Orquesta Filarmónica de Zacatecas in Zacatecas, Mexico, as well as performing as part of the Beethoven Festival/Park City Chamber Music Festival in Park City, Utah. As the artistic director of the Aruba Symphony Festival, he performed in several chamber music and orchestral concerts, and conducted two concerts with the orchestra of the Festival. The festival hosted 67 participants from eight different countries, as well as many renowned faculty from around the world. Jorge Martínez-Ríos, Associate Professor of Viola, had a very busy summer performing and conducting workshops both regionally and abroad. In May, he performed two concerts in Juárez and Las Cruces with Radostin Konstantinov (principal clarinet from Juárez Symphony) and Alain del Real (pianist for Opera de Bellas Artes in Mexico City), as well as performing as soloist in the Bruch Double Concerto for Viola and Clarinet with Camerata de Coahuila in Torreón, Mexico, where he also conducted a workshop for the Colegio Americano de Torreón Orchestra ending with a sold our concert at the end of the month. In June, he performed as principal viola with the San Antonio Chamber Orchestra, as well as several chamber concerts around San Antonio, along with the "Savor the Music", a performance/ fundraiser for the Classical Music Institute at the Tobin Center for the Performing Arts. In mid-June, Professor Martínez-Ríos taught as faculty for the Classical Music Institute Summer Program alongside colleagues from the Curtis Institute, Harvard, Yale and the Juilliard School. In July, he conducted a workshop for viola students from the Universidad Autónoma de Ciudad Juárez in Mexico.

This fall included several exciting events for Professor Martínez-Ríos. In September, he conducted a clinic for the Escuela de Música Silvestre Revueltas in Durango, Mexico, and later in the fall, he will perform in Oaxaca, Mexico and conduct the New Horizons Symphony in Las Cruces. Of special note is the official presentation of the new chamber music series Asociación de Música de Camara del Norte, which will be centered in Ciudad Juárez. The mission of the organization is to present world-class performances, to feature regional faculty/artists and to serve as a platform for young artists from Las Cruces, El Paso and Juárez. One of the fall concerts will feature NMSU faculty members Dr. Laura Spitzer and Dr. Sarah Daughtrey, along with Professor Martínez-Ríos, in a performance of Brahms op. 91, Zwei

Gesänge for alto, viola and piano.

Jorge Espinoza, Assistant Professor of Cello, served on the faculty of the Montecito International Music Festival in Los Angeles, a three-week music festival for highly gifted string, piano, wind, and voice students.

Laura Spitzer, Associate Professor of Piano, returned to Idyllwild Arts, for the 26th year, in June and July teaching a two-week piano workshop for students ages 8-13. For the first time, two second-generation students attended.
