

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2021 All-State Guest Conductors

Small School Band - Keith Bearden



Mr. Keith Bearden, Professor Emeritus, retired from Texas Tech University in May 2003 after 23 years as, director of the Goin' Band from Raiderland and Associate Director of Bands. In addition, he conducted the University Symphonic Band, the Court Jesters Basketball Band, played trumpet in the Faculty Brass Quintet, taught classes in conducting/music education, and co-directed the Texas Tech summer music camps.

Professor Bearden began his teaching career at a small Texas school in Jayton, TX. After only one year of teaching, he was drafted into the military. He served his country in the USAF Academy Band and had the honor of performing as principal trumpet in the Air Force Academy concert band and brass quintet. He was also a member of the Falconaires Jazz Ensemble. Following his completion of military service, he enjoyed six more successful years of public school teaching in Albany, and at Lubbock Monterey. His bands were consistent winners in concert, marching, jazz on both state and national levels. In 1979 he was honored by Phi Beta Mu as Texas' Outstanding Young Bandmaster. In 1980

he was appointed associate director of bands and director of the Goin' Band from Raiderland" at Texas Tech University.

During his distinguished tenure at Texas Tech University, Professor Bearden was honored as Outstanding Faculty Member by Omicron Delta Kappa and Mortar Board, and in 1999 his Goin' Band from Raiderland received nation's highest award for collegiate marching bands, the Sudler Trophy, presented by the John Philip Sousa Foundation. He was honored for his service as camp director of the Texas Tech summer band and orchestra camp. Other honors include the Kappa Kappa Psi Distinguished Service to Music Medal, Texas Tech's Department of Residence Life's Professing Excellence Award, the Lubbock Independent School District's Meritorious Service Award, the Texas Tech Alumni Association's Distinguished Service Award, and the Texas Tech School of Music's Distinguished Alumni Award. He has also received the Texas Bandmasters Lifetime Meritorious Achievement Award. In 2013, he was inducted into the Texas Bandmasters Hall of Fame.

With a heart for helping develop the skills of young musicians, Professor Bearden remains active as a guest clinician/ conductor for numerous schools as well as honor groups across the United States. He is very active as an adjudicator in both concert and marching competitions across the country.

Concert Band - Dr. Donald J. McKinney



Donald J. McKinney is Director of Bands and Associate Professor at the University of Colorado Boulder. He conducts the CU Wind Symphony, guides the graduate windconducting program, and oversees the university's comprehensive band program. The CU Wind Symphony has collaborated with numerous artists & composers and most recently performed for the CBDNA Southwestern Division Conference on the CU Boulder campus. Prior to his 2013 appointment at CU Boulder Dr. McKinney was the Director of Wind Ensembles and Associate Professor at Louisiana State University. While teaching at LSU the Wind Ensemble was invited to perform for the 2013 CBDNA National Conference in Greensboro, NC.

He has held additional faculty positions at Interlochen Arts Academy and Duquesne University Mary Pappert School of Music. From 2010-2015 he was the Coordinator of Bands for the renowned Interlochen Arts Camp. In this capacity he conducted the World Youth Wind Symphony and administered the summer band program. As a guest conductor he has appeared with the Dallas Wind Symphony, Concordia Santa Fe, Boulder

Philharmonic Orchestra, Greater Boulder Youth Orchestra, and numerous honor ensembles. He has also conducted concerts and clinics in Costa Rica and Canada. On numerous occasions, his performances with the Dallas Wind Symphony have been featured on National Public Radio Performance Today.

Symphonic Band - Dr. Gary Garner



Dr. Gary Garner retired in 2002 after 39 years as Director of Bands at West Texas A&M University. He holds a bachelor's degree from Texas Tech and the Master of Music and DMA degrees from the University of Southern California.

He began his teaching career in Lubbock at Hutchinson Jr. High School and at Monterey High School. From there he went to the University of Southern California as marching band director for four years before accepting a position at WTAMU.

During his tenure the WTAMU Symphonic Band appeared a record ten times before the Texas Music Educators Association, twice at the national conventions of the College Band Directors National Association, and twice in Carnegie Hall, where famed New York Times critic John Rockwell called the band "remarkably accomplished" and termed their performance " a refreshing change from our usual provincial concert fare."

Garner has recorded an album for Crest Records with his sons Brad and Blair, "The First Family of Flute," and an album of flute trios with son Brad and the eminent flutist Julius Baker.

He has traveled widely as guest conductor, clinician, and flute soloist.

Among the awards and honors he has received are: the WTAMU Faculty Excellence Award; the WTAMU Phoenix Club award for teaching excellence; the Minnie Piper Stevens Award; Amarillo High School Hall of Fame; Texas Bandmaster of the Year; Bohumil Makovsky Award for outstanding service to college bands; Phi Beta Mu International Outstanding Bandmaster; Kappa Kappa Psi Distinguished service to Music Medal; and the Gene Hemmle Award as an outstanding music alumnus from Texas Tech. He was chosen the 2005 Honorary Lifetime Member of the Texas Bandmasters Association. In 2008, he was the recipient of the Percy Grainger Award and he was designated the 2012 Legendary Bandmaster by the Dallas Wind Symphony.

Mixed Choir - Dr. Jeremy Mims

Dr. Jeremy Mims is Assistant Professor of Music at Winthrop University, where he is the Director of Choral Activities. He conducts the Chorale, Chamber Singers, and Collegiate Choir, as well as teaches conducting to undergraduate and graduate students. Previously he was the chair of the music department at Clarke University in Dubuque, IA, where conducted the choirs and string orchestra. He has held numerous positions with community choirs and orchestras and with various churches. His ensembles have performed for various conventions and he is a frequent clinician for area honor choir.

Dr. Mims has served as musical director, chorus master, and accompanist of shows for various professional, collegiate and local theatres and opera companies. A musician of multiple talents and diversity, Jeremy has appeared on national and international concert and opera stages as a conductor, collaborative pianist, violinist, and a tenor chorister. As an active collaborative pianist, Mims has served as accompanist for numerous high school all-region and all-state choirs, as well for professional and university choruses. Twice he has served as the pianist at the Prague Choral Festival, performing in Smetana Hall. He often performs recitals with singers and instrumentalists and with his duet partner, Dr. Melissa Loehnig. Active in the



American Choral Directors Association, Mims has presented at regional and national conventions. Dr. Mims holds degrees from Hardin-Simmons University and the University of Missouri-Kansas City Conservatory of Music and Dance. He is actively researching the works of Mexican Baroque composer Miguel Mateo Dallo y Lana.

Treble Choir - Dr. Kimberly Adams



Kimberly Dunn Adams is the Director of Choral Activities and Assistant Professor of Music at Western Michigan University, where she directs the University Chorale, Collegiate Singers, Grand Chorus, and graduate program in choral conducting. She also teaches choral literature, choral conducting, and advanced conducting.

Adams has earned numerous accolades throughout her career. Under her direction, the University Chorale at Western Michigan University received 2nd place in the 2013 American Prize, a national music competition. In the same year, Chorale was featured in an award-winning, nationally aired commercial for the university. In spring of 2014, the same choir, with Adams conducting, premiered Paul Lansky's cantata, Contemplating Weather, and recorded the piece for Bridge Records. That album was released in spring of 2015 and is available through iTunes, Amazon, and other international retail distributors. Under her direction, the WMU Chorale was selected to perform at the Michigan ACDA State Convention, the Michigan Music Conference, and the ACDA Regional Conference in Chicago. University Chorale's latest album, Ex corde, was released in June 2016 and is available internationally for purchase and streaming.

Adams holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in religion from Oberlin College and a Bachelor of Music degree in vocal performance from Oberlin Conservatory, where she studied voice with Lorraine Manz and conducting with Hugh Floyd. She received the Master of Music degree in choral conducting from the Yale School of Music, where she studied with Marguerite Brooks and Simon Carrington. Adams earned her Doctor of Musical Arts degree in choral conducting with a minor in music theory at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Concert Orchestra - Dr. Michael Alexander

Dr. Michael Alexander is Associate Professor of String Music Education at Baylor University. He joined the faculty in 2006 after 22 years of teaching orchestra at Stratford HS in Houston, Texas. He holds degrees from Southwestern University (BME), Sam Houston State University (MM), and the University of Houston (DMA).

Dr. Alexander has served as President of the Texas Orchestra Directors Association, Vice-President of the Texas Music Educators Association, and President of the Texas Chapter of the American String Teachers Association (ASTA). He currently serves as Chair of the ASTA National Orchestra Festival. His work has been recognized with the Houston Symphony Award for Excellence in Teaching, ASTA Elizabeth A.H. Green Award, University of Houston Outstanding Music Alumnus, TODA Orchestra Director of the Year, and Baylor Outstanding Professor Award.



Dr. Alexander has presented his research on string sight-reading, tuning, and improvisation at state, national, and international symposia. He has co-authored Orchestra Expressions

(Books 1 and 2), Expressive Techniques for Orchestra, and Expressive Sight-Reading for Orchestra (Books 1 and 2). His research is published in the Journal of Research in Music Education, UPDATE: Applications of Research in Music Education, the String Research Journal, Texas Music Education Research, the American String Teacher, the International Society of Assessment in Music Education, and the Southwestern Musician.

Symphonic Orchestra - Dr. Anna Edwards



Anna's dedication to quality musical performance started with her early career as a professional violinist, performing with prestigious ensembles such as the Pacific Northwest Ballet, Northwest Sinfonietta, Auburn Symphony, Silsbee Piano Trio and multiple chamber ensembles. As a violinist, Ms. Edwards was drawn to innovative new music and a strong desire to keep classical music relevant with generational changes in audiences. Recognizing that change starts at the student level, Anna's focus moved to music education, including serving as the Music Director at the national award-winning Roosevelt High School in Seattle for 18 years.

After training with Michael Jinbo at the renowned Pierre Monteux School for three seasons, she received her Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in Orchestral Conducting from the University of Washington. Currently,

Edwards balances her time between conducting in the Pacific Northwest, serving as a guest conductor/clinician across the country, and developing young musicians through instruction and collaboration with professionals in concert settings. The 2020-21 season marks the ninth season for Edwards as Music Director of the Seattle Collaborative Orchestra, seventh season as Music Director of the Saratoga Orchestra, and fourth season as Music Director of the Pacific Northwest Conducting Institute.

Guitar Ensemble - David Tanenbaum

Recognized internationally as an outstanding performer and recording artist, a charismatic educator, and a transcriber and editor of both taste and intelligence, David Tanenbaum is one of the most admired classical guitarists of his generation. He has performed throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico,Europe, Australia, the former Soviet Union and Asia, and in 1988 he became the

first American guitarist to be invited to perform in China by the Chinese government. He has been soloist with the Los Angeles Philharmonic, San Francisco Symphony, Minnesota Orchestra, London Sinfonietta, the OaklandSymphony, Vienna's ORF orchestra, with such eminent conductors as Esa-Pekka Salonen, Kent Nagano, and John Adams.

David Tanenbaum has been a featured soloist at many international festivals, including those of Bath, Luzern, Frankfurt, Barcelona and Vienna as well as numerous guitar festivals. In 1989, as President of the Second American Classical

Guitar Congress, he commissioned five new works, including Rosewood by Henry Bryant for a large guitar orchestra. He has subsequently conducted Rosewood more than a dozen times on four continents.

While his repertoire encompasses diverse styles, David Tanenbaum is recognized as one of today's most eloquent proponents of new guitar repertoire.

David Tanenbaum is currently Chair of the Guitar Department at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, where he received the 1995 Outstanding Professor Award, and he has been Artist -In-Residence at the Manhattan School of Music. He is in demand for master classes worldwide. Mr. Tanenbaum's students have won many international competitions, and his former students hold teaching positions internationally.

David Tanenbaum studied guitar with Rolando Valdez-Blain, Aaron Shearer and Michael Lorimer, attending the San Francisco Conservatory and Peabody Conservatory.

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Clinic Synopsis

No Excuses: Establishing Excellence from Day 1 (Mason Yordy/Josephine Gonzales)

Developing a culture of success, high standards, and community can be challenging in any school. Additionally, for those teaching in a low socioeconomic educational situation these challenges can be exacerbated with negative stereotypes of achievement limits, discipline problems, and high turnover rates. During this clinic we will discuss how to dispel and problem solve these negative stereotypes as well as explore methods, actions, and strategies to develop successful programs and build strong communities in any teaching situation.

Body, Soul, and Spirit: Leading inspiring rehearsals that introduce our ensemble to the "Special World" (Benjamin Druffel)

The "Special World", a term coined by the legendary music educator Weston Noble, is not a place. It is a state of being. In his book Creating the Special World, Mr. Noble describes the "Special World" as: "… a moment of wholeness—something we strive for almost every moment of our lives—to feel complete. Applying Noble's philosophy, this clinic will present ensemble conductors with strategies they can use in rehearsal to help students transcend a regular rehearsal day and into this "Special World" including careful repertoire selection, tapping into imagination during score study, student involvement in rehearsals, and the use of metaphor in teaching. Implementing Technology with Ensembles (Jason Panucci)

Does the idea of introducing technology to your ensemble evoke nightmarish visions of mountains of prep work, device incompatibility issues, and content creation? Software should maximize instruction time and make your job easier. We'll introduce you to a single-sign-on platform, compatible across all devices which integrates seamlessly with your favorite software tools, includes curated content, and enables you to track student growth.

Recruiting & Retention: Building Your Program from the Inside Out (Shawn Silva/Kevin Moreman/Valentino Leyba)

Do you feel like you have to get as many students in the program as possible talented or not because numbers mean value? In this clinic we will discover the value of the students who are already enrolled in your program and how to foster them to lead to a healthier program. We will discuss how the effort and maintenance of the band becomes more attainable and accessible for more students to naturally join the high school band.

Student Engagement in a Virtual World (Olivia Tucker)

Student engagement is one of the most challenging facets of virtual learning, particularly in large ensemble music. The social interactions, friendships, and community aspects of music-making are difficult to replicate online. Many students are struggling to want to practice their instruments, engage in synchronous instruction, and participate in music altogether. In addition, adolescence is a crucial time of identity construction. Teenagers' experiences in schooling and education shape how they see themselves and others. For music educators, part of effective instruction and motivation involves helping students see themselves as successful musicians while presenting increasingly complex musical experiences. The combination of adolescent engagement and identity construction with online music education presents music teachers with a unique set of challenges.

In this session, we will explore how to effectively inspire secondary large ensemble students to participate in online instruction and continue refining their musical skills from home. I will present educational research on student engagement in virtual settings, and we will apply findings to our current practices of teaching music online. Through the use of meaningful motivation strategies, we may encourage our students to engage in virtual music education and continue growing as musicians and people through musical achievement. (Link to handout)

Score Study for the Young Teacher (Brett Richardson)

Efficient score study and purposeful score marking can be a mystery to novice teachers. In this highly engaging clinic, Richardson will present a systematic approach to efficient score study and score marking that young conductors will benefit from. New teachers, come learn how to "crack the code" and digest scores effectively so your rehearsals can be positive and ultimately, more focused on the music! (Link to handout)

Motivation, Innovation, & Differentiation for Your Beginning Band (Richard Canter)

In this activity-based clinic, Richard Canter will discuss innovative, quick and effective ways to differentiate instruction in order to reach all levels of learners in the beginning band. Throughout this clinic, we will investigate the various ways students are motivated to learn in the beginning band and how to overcome the many challenges the beginning band director faces. In addition, with the possibility of continued remote or blended learning, we will discuss strategies that keep students motivated and having fun throughout the assessment process. (Link to handout)

The Shape of Sound: A Pedagogical Approach to Tone and its production for Wind Bands (Michael Mapp)

Tone is one of, if not, the most important musical concept that a musician must understand. It is also the product of several factors which must take place simultaneously. This presentation focuses on defining tone as it applies to wind bands and the physical aspect of producing a tone on a wind instrument. Practical strategies and resources will be used to help clarify an abstract idea and special interest will be placed on beginners, middle school ensembles, and the continuation of the concept in later years. Visual aids and demonstrations will also be used to help explain the concept(s). Discussion and warm-up strategies will also be provided.

You Don't Have to Do It Alone: Collaboration is Your Superpower! (Donna Schmidt/Sam Nesbitt/Aaron Lovato)

Are you feeling frustrated and alone in your teaching life? We will show you how to put together a team of colleagues to work collaboratively designing lessons and activities to engage your students. Attendees will leave with ideas as we will also share the lessons and activities we have created over the last few months.

Adapting the Band Room for Students with Special Needs (Andrew Quinn)

This session will focus on different strategies and techniques on making your band room inclusive to everyone that walks through the door. We will look at different physical adaptations and teaching techniques for students based on their capabilities and needs. There will also be several personal anecdotes presented from people that have participated in band programs with different abilities and from band directors of students with different abilities.

Leading in a Culture that "Can't" Change (Raul Barcenes)

You got your new position!... and you find out that it is not as you imagined. Budget restrictions, administration obstacles, socio-economic factors and student culture have made this extremely difficult. But do not despair; it is not over! This session looks at factors that inhibit success in starting new positions, modifying cultural expectations, winning students, parents, and administration over, and tips for progressive student success which will provide long lasting results for excellence. The strategy presented has worked at every level, including secondary school and collegiate, and helped in the most important area, doing "what's best for YOUR kids." (Link to Handout)

Musical Theatre in the Classroom (Kathy Clawson)

This session is about incorporating musical theater into the choral classroom! Planning units, accessible curriculum, resources as well as activities will be provided. As an Albuquerque native, Kathleen will share about her journey as a professional vocalist and as an educator.

A Virtual Tour of Global Choral Music (Jon Petzet/Frank Eychaner)

The choral repertoire has changed in the last 50 years. Not only must conductors feed their ensembles music from the various historical eras but we have a responsibility to examine the 21st century repertoire from different regions of the globe. This session will offer repertoire, composers, websites, and other resources to expedite the exploration of the global choral music anthology. Music will be explored from countries such as Argentina, Brazil, China, Cuba, Estonia, Hungary, Kenya, Latvia, Mexico, Norway, South Africa, and Zambia.

"How you Doin'?" 2021 (Will Gonzales, Evan Stoor)

"How you Doin'?" Understanding the psyche of the student, creating special moments for students online, the dynamic of the online classroom and new best practices, materials and ideas for balance and affirmation for teachers.

Redefining Musical Intuitiveness in a COVID classroom: Exploring Resources, Modalities and Technology (Raul Barcenes)

This session is for all secondary music disciplines and will show how educators can redefine musical intuitiveness in the online classroom. Dr. Barcenes has experience in teaching music from elementary through college in Title 1 schools in urban settings and in affluent areas. This session will help us to navigate the new online teaching world and explore resources, modalities and technologies designed to create successful experiences for both educators and students.

What My Choral Director Really Taught Me (Jon Petzek)

There are so many non-musical things we learn from singing choral music. We learn foreign languages, physics/acoustics, history, mathematics, science, poetry/literature, In addition, we learn the value of vocal health, discipline, focus, listening, practicing, compassion, empathy, and teamwork. Petzet will demonstrate the cross-curricular nature of the music rehearsal and how it is integral to all students. (Link to handout)

A Judges Perspective-Preparing Students for Auditions (Ben Silva)

The clinic will open with insights from an experienced all state adjudicator sharing what he looks for in determining a passing audition. Attendees will then be invited to participate in a dialogue concerned with the challenges and rigors of preparing students for success.

Exploring Freedom in Your Artistry: Alexander Technique for Musicians (Darci Balkcom)

In this workshop we will explore fun and easy tools and principles of psychophysical coordination and efficiency that you can apply to your musicianship and teaching.

Creative Activities for Freeing Your Student's Musical Personalities (Mickey Jones)

In this workshop, we will discuss several projects, approaches, and games to do with your students to help them tap into their creativity and begin to find their own musical voice. These activities will not only help students enjoy more creative aspects of music making and composition but can help relax and improve instrumental technique as well. We will specifically discuss approaches for the guitar but the projects and activities could be done on any instrument.

Modern Band + Adaptive Learning + Teacher Tools = More Music in Schools (Dan Mascola)

How the combination of the modern band movement, adaptive learning technology, and online teacher tools are shepherding a new age of music education in schools.

Can I App You a Question? II (Cat Woo)

This session will not only help you discover useful apps that can assist your day-to-day routines, but you will walk away with tips on using tech in a meaningful and engaging way for our students.

The Music Educators Guide to Grant Writing (Ashleigh Lore)

This session will focus on a general overview of grant writing: finding grants and funding, writing and submitting proposals, and what to do when a recipient of a grant. Whether awarded funding or not, there are important steps to take post-submission, and these will be highlighted as well. Finally, a special look at how Covid-19 has affected funding, and what participants can do to be effective when it seems as though funding is not available. (Link to handout)

Engaging Brain Based Music Strategies for Social Emotional Learning & Literacy (Mary Knysh)

Student engagement is the key to optimal brain-based learning. Knysh shares a well-designed brain-based musical pathway toward teaching and practicing SEL skills by creating focused, empowering, engaging and creative classroom environments. Have your instruments nearby!

1, 2, LET'S ALL PLAY Drumming and Movement for Young Children (Mary Knysh)

Mary shares an array of fun and accessible brain-based drumming and movement activities perfectly suited for your early childhood curriculum. Participants will be learning sequential strategies and games designed to enhance rhythmic skills, creativity and self-expression in young learners. Have your instruments nearby!

Teaching Ukulele with the Brain in Mind (Mary Knysh)

Brain research tells us that making music, movement, creative play and numinous experiences are key to neuroplasticity and brain-based learning. Chenoweth has performed to sold-out audiences across the world, including performances at Carnegie Hall and Royal Albert Hall. Chenoweth released "The Art of Elegance," her album of American Songbook classics via Concord Records. The album debuted at #1 on Billboard's Current Jazz and Traditional Jazz charts, and #1 on Amazon's Vocal Pop chart. Chenoweth also returned to the stage in her limited engagement MY LOVE LETTER TO BROADWAY, at the Lunt-Fontanne Theatre, receiving rave reviews. In 2014, she released a CD and DVD of her own live concert performance, "Kristin Chenoweth: Coming Home." Last December, Chenoweth performed with iconic The Tabernacle Choir and Orchestra in their annual Christmas concert. The concert aired on PBS and BYUtv in December 2019.

In 2015, Chenoweth earned a Drama Desk Award, Outer Critics Circle Award and Broadway.com Audience Choice Award for her lead role in the Roundabout Theatre Company's "On the Twentieth Century." She also earned nominations for a Tony Award and a Drama League Award.

Chenoweth recently starred in the second season of NBC's hit comedy series "Trial & Error," receiving critical acclaim for her performance as Heiress Lavinia Peck-Foster. She was seen in the Starz original series "American Gods," where she reunited with executive producer Bryan Fuller in the role of Easter. Notable television roles include appearances in "The West Wing," Disney's "Descendants" and "The Muppets." In film, Chenoweth voiced the role of Gabi in the hit animated film "Rio 2" and Fifi, Snoopy's beloved French poodle in "The Peanuts Movie." She starred in the indie teen drama entitled "Hard Sell" and additional film credits have included "The Boy Next Door," "Deck the Halls," "Twelve Men of Christmas," "Four Christmases," "RV," "Bewitched," "The Pink Panther," "Hit & Run" and "Family Weekend." She also starred in NBC's "Hairspray Live!" as Velma Von Tussle in December 2016. Chenoweth voiced the role of Princess Skystar in Lionsgate/Hasbro's "My Little Pony: The Movie," and can also be heard in the Sony Pictures animated film "The Star."

Chenoweth is a passionate supporter of charities which dedicate their time and efforts to helping those in need. She formed a charity partnership with the Broken Arrow Performing Arts Center (BAPAC) Foundation in her home state of Oklahoma. Chenoweth's accomplishments were honored by her hometown with BAPAC naming "The Kristin Chenoweth Theatre" in 2012. Partnering with the BAPAC in a labor of love, Kristin launched an annual Broadway Bootcamp in 2015, providing young Broadway hopefuls with the opportunity to take classes, hold performances and learn from top mentors in the entertainment industry including Kristin herself. In her lifelong mission to cultivate arts education across the globe, Chenoweth has also created "Places! The Kristin Chenoweth Tour Experience," a unique educational program for young singers that puts them right next to her performing on stage. Each concert in Chenoweth's ongoing tour will feature local participants from higher education conservatories, universities, and colleges for the immersive educational experience.

Chenoweth is a graduate of Oklahoma City University with a Master's degree in Opera Performance. She is an inductee into the Oklahoma Hall of Fame, as well as the Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame.



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2021 NMMEA Award Recipients

Tyler North, Music Educator of the Year



Tyler North is currently the Director of Bands at Sandia High School where he has taught in various capacities for almost 20 years. Presently, Mr. North serves as director of 2 concert ensembles, 1 jazz ensemble and a steel ensemble as well as directing the Matador marching and athletic bands. During his tenure at Sandia High School, these ensembles have consistently garnered first-division ratings at festivals around the state and region. In addition, the Sandia Wind Ensemble was named the NMAA Centennial Band in May of 2012. Prior to his appointment as director of bands at SHS, Mr. North served as the assistant director at Sandia where he had the privilege of working with and learning from Mr. Stuart Fessinger. During this time, Mr. North also served as director of bands at Washington Middle School (also in Albuquerque).

Before beginning his career at SHS, Mr. North received his undergraduate and graduate

degrees at Fort Hays State University (Hays, KS) and the University of New Mexico (Albuquerque, NM) respectively. In pursuit of his post-secondary degrees, Mr. North has had the honor of working with many fine educators including Lyle Dilley, David Wilborn, Michael Robinson, Eric Rombach-Kendall and Bruce Dalby. Mr. North is also certified in both AP Music Theory and IB Music instruction.

Mr. North is an active member of the New Mexico Music Educators Association, serving as vice- president of bands for the Albuquerque district for 8 years and president for 5 years. Mr. North has also supported the future of music education by working with many student-directors over the years (13 and counting!), many of whom have gone on to have wonderful careers of their own. Finally Mr. North is in demand as a clinician and adjudicator around the state of New Mexico having served in that capacity in every corner of our state . Mr. North currently resides in Albuquerque, New Mexico, with his wife, Jean (without whom the last vestiges of his sanity would have slipped away years ago), his daughters Amara and Avalyn, and his yellow Labrador, Nana (without whom his clothing would not have its customary coating of yellow dog hair).

She attends numerous music workshops yearly from ukulele, to Orff, to folk dancing.

Kelly's passion is helping young students experience the joys of music through moving, singing, playing, creating, and listening. As a continual learner herself, Kelly believes her responsibility is to create lifelong music lovers and well-rounded members of society.

After all these years, she still loves the variety in the elementary music classroom.

Kelly lives in Farmington, New Mexico with her husband Tom, 17-year-old son Quinn, and 14 year old daughter Annie.

Mason Yordy, New and Emerging Music Educator



Mason Yordy is a graduate of Valley High School in 2007, Mason attended UNM from 2010-2015 and graduated with a Bachelor of Music Education with endorsements in General Music and Band.

Mason describes himself as, "a hardworking, dedicated, and experienced teacher who takes a personal interest in his students' progression as developing musicians. I take pride in the fact that I can adapt to various communities and find the best way to approach the education of students. I always strive to learn as much as possible and the the best educator that I can be."

Mason student taught at Sandia HS and Jackson Middle School in the fall of 2014. Mason's first job was at Acequia Madre Elementary School and Gonzales Community School from 2015-16, moving to Van Buren MS in 2016 - through the

present. Mason has also served as the Highland HS assistant from 2016-present. Mason also values and teaches private lesson and has done so since 2011. Mason is also partnered with the Youth Jazz Collaborative's After School Elementary Band program to help instruct elementary students, 2018-present.

Mason has performed with Conchordia Santa Fe, 2015-2017 and the Summer series Albuquerque Concert Band, 2015 - present. Mason's professional organizations are the National Association for Music Education 2014-present, NMMEA 2015-present and is the District VII Vice President of Middle School Bands, 2017-2019.

Mason's musical journey is best described through his eyes and words, "When I started my position at Van Buren MS, there was a mountain of obstacles in my way. Only five beginners had signed up, I had no intermediate band and no jazz band, very few instruments, bent folding chairs, broken and graffitied stands, broken equipment, incomplete musical literature, and a program that had only been to a music festival once in the past six years. Since my start at Van Buren, I have grown my beginning band from only five sixth grade students to fifty students. This past year was the first year in which I was able to justify the need for multiple beginning bands to adequately educate all of the new beginning students.

Since my start at Van Buren, our middle school band program has annually received ones at music festivals. The first time my band received a superior rating was the first time anyone could remember it happening in recent history. My proudest accomplishment in the part three years is that the community now holds the expectation that Van Buren is an excellent band program.

My work is just beginning. Next year, I will be starting an after-school jazz band program with confidence that it will become a regular class for students in the next four years. I will continue to work with my after-school cadent band, will grow its number of members and the group will perform twice a semester at Van Buren with the other bands.

Most importantly, I want the kids to be good students and to become well-rounded, caring individuals who will succeed in life. At the end of the day, I am first a teacher, and secondly a music educator!

Donna Schmidt, Rollie Heltman Service Award



Donna Schmidt, a native of Beltsville, Maryland, received her Bachelor of Music Education degree from James Madison University in 1991 and her Master of Music degree from the University of New Mexico in 1995. She taught in Arlington, VA, and was for two years the band director at McKinley Middle School in Albuquerque. Since 1997 Mrs. Schmidt has been band director at Desert Ridge Middle School in Albuquerque, where she oversees a large band program.

In the words of Kurt, Donna's husband: "Donna's significant and positive influence on our family may be best exemplified by pointing out her inspiration for our oldest son, now 27, resulted in his achieving a degree in Tuba Performance and Composition from the California Institute for the Arts and, for our youngest child, now 13, who started this school year as a total beginner and yet completed the year feeling like a true band member. Our daughter has commented on how, in addition to band being her favorite subject, she feels that Mrs. Schmidt's band room constitutes her "safe haven" and daily refuge in a large middle school. In the band room our daughter reports she feels safe,

respected, encouraged, validated, and allowed to be herself at her best."

A final personal note to be made, having served 13 years as New Mexico's State Superintendent of Public Instruction, I had the rare honor of visiting hundreds of classrooms across New Mexico. Donna Schmidt embodies the very best of our profession. The children of our state are the ultimate beneficiaries of her competence and character. A professional tuba player, Mrs. Schmidt has performed with the Mount Vernon Brass Quintet, New Mexico Brass Quintet, Santa Fe Symphony, New Mexico Symphony, and was a soloist with the Capital Winds in Washington, DC. Mrs. Schmidt has been featured as New Mexico's representative for the School Band and Orchestra magazine's "50 Directors Who Make a Difference." She was also named the 2016 NMMEA Music Educator of the Year and was a recipient of the 2018 Golden Apple Award for Excellence in Teaching. She is a highly sought-after clinician and adjudicator, having recently presented a peer-led session at the 2019 Carnegie Hall Summer Music Educators Workshop.

Dr. Greg Fant, Hall of Fame Award



Greg Fant is currently an emeritus professor at New Mexico State University after serving 30 years. The past 10 years he served NMSU as Associate Vice President and Deputy Provost. His responsibilities included oversight of the Teaching Academy, NMSU's Albuquerque Center, the "Instruction Innovation and Quality" distance education unit, and Human Resource Services. Additionally, he coordinated academic programs among the system's four community colleges, served as chair of the General Education Course committee, and led various task forces for executive administration including interim oversight of the campus diversity units. During his tenure at NMSU, he also served as Interim Dean, Associate Dean, and Assistant Dean for the College of Arts and Sciences as well as the Academic Department Head of Music.

He joined the faculty at NMSU in 1990 as Associate Director of Bands responsible for the University's "Pride" Marching Band, Symphonic Band, Roadrunner Revue Pep Band and taught courses in Instrumental Music Education. Under his direction, the Pride Marching Band made nine recordings, performed exhibition shows at numerous marching festivals, played for several professional football games, and performed for the Prince of Monaco. His articles have appeared in the New Mexico Musician and the Music Educators Journal.

An advocate for Music Education, throughout his career Dr. Fant has presented clinics for a wide variety of school groups as well as adjudicating numerous band festivals. He has served as President of the New Mexico Music Educators Association and has written grants to support the All State Music Conference. His work as NMSU Music Department Head included grant funding from New Mexico Arts for a Jazz Outreach Tour and an educational outreach tour to small communities in New Mexico entitled "For New Mexicans by New Mexicans." He also volunteered his time for the New Mexico Lions clubs by forming a statewide ensemble each year from 1997-2007. Under his direction, the New Mexico Lions Honor Band traveled to three International Conventions.

A 1984 recipient of the Mississippi Bandmasters Association's "Outstanding Young Band Director" Award, Dr. Fant was also honored with the "Patricia Christmore Excellence in Teaching Award" at New Mexico State and toward the end of the 2019-2020 academic year was recognized by the NMSU Faculty Senate for his dedication to the students and faculty across the NMSU system.

Dr. Fant is a member of Music Educator's National Conference, New Mexico Music Educators Association, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, and Phi Beta Mu. Prior to retirement, he served as music director for Mission Lutheran Church in Las Cruces. Currently he is a peer reviewer for the Higher Learning Commission and a remote learning coach for his 5- and 9-year-old grandsons in Highlands Ranch, CO.

Dorothy Kincaid, Hall of Fame Award



I was born Jan 17,1945 in Lawrence, Kansas. I started playing trombone in 4th grade and am still at it. I graduated from San Francisco State University in 1969 with a BA in Music Education. I married Bruce on June 28th, 1969 and started teaching in Belmont, CA that year. We came to Santa Fe in 1973. I taught middle school and elementary school band. For five years I had the band program at two middle schools. I also worked with the Santa Fe HS band. Later I branched out and added guitar and a program for special learners.

I retired from SFPS in 2000 and started at St Michael's HS in 2002. I'm also active with the Santa Fe Great Big Jazz Band, the Santa Fe Concert Band and High Desert Winds.

Monica Leaming, Hall of Fame Award



Monica Learning holds a BA from Fort Lewis College in Durango, Colorado and MM from Northern Arizona University, the Flagstaff, Arizona. Born in Alamogordo, New Mexico, she knew she wanted to get back to New Mexico when she started her teaching career. She began teaching choirs in Farmington in 1996, adding bands in 2000. In 2002, the transition from band to orchestra allowed her to discover her passion... orchestral conducting. It is this background that helped make Monica a unique NMMEA Hall of Fame recipient due to her contributions to band, choir and orchestra students.

Ms. Learning has been the orchestra director at Farmington HS from 2006 - present. She has been the orchestra director at Tibbetts MS from 2000 to the present. In addition to ALL of that, Monica was the music director in 2011 for Sandstone Productions, Farmington, NM. She was the Tibbetts Events Coordinator and Department Head from 2005-2008, NWNMMEA District President from 2006-2009,

NMMEA Orchestra VP 2009-2011 and the NWNMMEA Orchestra VP from 2004-2019, 2020-present.

Ms. Learning's awards are wide and varied, we would run out of space if we listed them all, so here are some highlights!! NM Teacher of the Year Nominee 2019, Honor Teacher (Farmington) 2018, 2016, 2015, 2012, 2011, 2007, 2003, and 1998. NM Golden Apple Teacher of Distinction, 2018. Grammy Music Educator of the Year Nominee, 2017. NW District Nominee for NMMEA's Music Educator of the Year, 2014-2016.

Ms. Learning has loved serving Farmington Municipal Schools for her entire 24-year career. The community of Farmington is supportive of the arts and is often complimented by clinicians and adjudicators who come to work with Farmington music students from all over New Mexico and the country at large. "I honestly don't know where the time went!" Ms. Learning said, when asked how long she's been teaching in New Mexico. She's starting on her second generation of music students now and said, "I guess that's what happens when you just stay in a place. It gives you the opportunity to make an extremely lasting effect. As if Ms. Learning didn't make enough music with students all day long, she enjoys coming home and performing with her wife of 20 years, Cecilia, in a group they call the "Zia Chicks". They have become a well-known performing group all around the Four Corners.

Leslie Leach, Emeritus Teacher



After finishing a Bachelor's degree at UNM in 1964, I began my teaching career with the Gallup-McKinley Schools in Crownpoint and Thoreau where I taught Junior High School band and Choir. In 1965, after the birth of our first daughter, I began teaching in Magdalena where I taught band, choir, jazz band and (one year taught 8th grade math). I was able to develop a jazz band program as well as a full choir in the evenings. It was there that I became involved in the local Community Action Association and was elected president.

Our second daughter was born in 1967. In 1969 I moved my family to Silver City where I became the Junior High School band and Choir director. While in Silver City I became involved in the local music scene singing in barber shop quartets, playing in jazz and country combos as well as playing in the local WNMU band and symphony orchestra. Opportunities opened for me to teach percussion at WNMU as well as NMSU. As a member of the local Methodist church, I assumed leadership of one of the choirs.

During the years in Silver I enjoyed working as an elementary music teacher, taught beginning and intermediate band as well as assisting with the Silver High School marching and concert band programs. During the time in Silver City I worked on my master's in music Education which I completed in 1971. In addition, I was fortunate to enroll in the Grace Nash Orff-Schulwerk classes at NAU where I completed level III and went on to teach the percussion section for another summer class.

In 1985 we moved to Farmington, NM and I assumed a position with the First United Methodist Church as Director of Music Ministries and Associate Pastor. In that capacity, I enrolled in the Course of Study at Perkins School of Theology where I completed certification as a United Methodist Pastor. My responsibilities at 1st UMC included planning music for 5 singing choirs and three handbell choirs and supervising volunteers who helped me. 1991 brought about another change when I left the ministry and returned to teaching.

I was hired to teach in the Kirtland Central School District where I taught choir, jazz band and assisted Janet Isham with the concert band at Kirtland Mid School as well as traveling to Shiprock to teach choir, band and assisted Phil Thomas with the band program. In 1993 the band director's position at Hermosa Junior High School opened up in Farmington where I taught beginning, intermediate and advanced band as well as assisted Joe Bowman with the Farmington High School Band. When Barbara Specht resigned as Coordinator of Music, I accepted the responsibilities of that job in addition to my teaching load. In 1996-97, the Hermosa Concert Band was invited to participate in the National Festival of the States in Washington, DC, representing the State of New Mexico. I am so grateful for the opportunity my students had through that trip.

When I decided to retire in 2000, I proposed to the district (and they agreed) that they continue my employment as Coordinator, part time. One of the highlights of my life was being inducted into the NMMEA Hall of Fame in 2002. In 2003 when the NM Legislature passed the Elementary Fine Arts Act, I added the responsibilities of Program Director of the Elementary Fine Arts which, over the next 12 years I was able to encourage the district to make that position a full-time job. In 2015 I retired from Farmington Municipal Schools.

Throughout my career as a music educator I have maintained active membership in NMMEA, NAfME (MENC), AOSA, and PAS.

Dr. Sue Cleveland, Administrator of the Year



Dr. Sue Cleveland has been Superintendent of the Rio Rancho Public School District since its creation in 1994. During that time, the district has grown from 5,900 to 17,600 students. The district has been recognized for the quality of its instructional programs, facilities, and outstanding staff, as well as unique partnerships with the New Mexico business community.

Dr. Cleveland is a Past President of New Mexico Superintendent's Association and the New Mexico Activities Association and represented New Mexico on the American Association of School Administrators Governing Board and the College Board in New York City. She serves on the Presbyterian Healthcare Foundation Board of Directors, United Way Board and on many state educational committees and task forces.

Recognitions include, among others: 20 Women to Watch in the New Millennium (Sage Magazine) in 2000, the YWCA "Woman on the Move" Recognition in 2000, and the

Governor's Award for Outstanding New Mexico Woman in 2001. Dr. Cleveland is a former state superintendent of the year and more recently, was recognized by the New Mexico Business Weekly as one of the ten "Women of Influence" in New Mexico for 2007.

Prior to her current position, Dr. Cleveland was Superintendent of Schools in Cherokee County, South Carolina, and held teaching and administrative positions with the Deer Park Independent School District (Houston metro area). Her initial teaching experience was at Las Cruces Mayfield High in southern New Mexico.

She received her B.A. from the University of New Mexico, her M.A. from New Mexico State University and her Ed.D. from University of Houston.

Farmington Municipal Schools provides music instruction to over 5,000 K-5 elementary students, and nearly 2,000 students in grades 6-12. They have 24 dedicated instructors teaching music education classes in the district. Our teachers are leaders and mentors in NMMEA and other state music organizations, answering the call of service to enrich the musical lives of New Mexican children. Community partnerships with the Connie Gotsch Arts Foundation have provided elementary students with interactive arts assemblies through their Young Audience Concerts, as well as providing funds for secondary music teachers to travel to their dream conference. FMS and our community of parents, friends, and audiences are proud of our comprehensive approach to music education and the whole child. We are excited to be recognized for our efforts by the New Mexico Music Educators Association.
