Log in using your 9 digit ID number - that is your ID number preceded by as many zeros necessary for a total of 9 numbers. If your ID # is 1111 then you log on by entering 000001111. Once you log in the next screen that will appear is your screen. Click on "My Personal Information." Next click on any of the areas that you need to update and make your changes. Click "add" when you are done with each area. Remember the roster information that is posted on our website is taken directly from MENC's database. We do not enter or correct any data posted on the on-line roster. It is your responsibility to update your contact information.

Last but not least please check our website and our various links to keep abreast of what is taking place such as "Handbook" changes, the minutes of our meetings, deadlines, etc. A lot of valuable information is posted to keep you informed. As always please feel

# Editor's Desk Keith Jordan



Our guest columnist for this issue is Norvil Howell, legendary Clovis Band Director. To this day there has only been one band from New Mexico, go to Midwest in Chicago, Clovis HS, 1969, Norvil Howell Conducting. If you don't know Norvil you should, he's a treasure of knowledge, practical jokes, and musicianship.

### John Philip Sousa comes to Clovis:

On Wednesday, November 14, 1928, John Philip Sousa and his Band arrived at the Clovis, New Mexico, railroad station. After unloading their instruments, they marched North on Main Street to the Lyceum Theatre where they played а matinee performance and evening an performance. While the old theatre has gone through some renovations over the years, it has excellent acoustics and is still in use today with performances by the Clovis Community Band as well as other local music and theatre groups. The light board for house and stage lights and ropes to lower stage lights and curtains are exactly like they were when the theatre opened in 1921.

Featured soloists on the Clovis Sousa Concert included William Tong, Cornet, Marjorie Moody, Soprano, and Howard Goulden, Xylophone. Several Sousa original compositions were also performed including the "New Mexico March" which is considered to be rather "corny" by some, but it is probably the most descriptive of the state marches composed by Sousa. "The New Mexico March" includes the program following note: "Dedicated to Governor R.C. Dillon and the people of New Mexico. Founded on melodies left by the Spanish, made by the Indian, composed by the whites"-John Philip

Sousa." "The march New Mexico is an original composition by Commander Sousa. It utilizes strains from "O Fair New Mexico," our state song, written by the greatly beloved Elizabeth Garrett, as well as Spanish strains taken from Mary R. Van Stone's book, Spanish Folk Songs of New Mexico, Indian strains and compiled by Elizabeth DeHuff, for all of which grateful thanks are hereby given." A copy of the Lyceum program in Clovis is available for viewing along with a copy of the original score to "New Mexico March" at the ENMU Golden Library in Portales, New Mexico.

It is interesting to note that Elizabeth Garrett was the daughter of the famous sheriff Pat Garrett of Lincoln County, New Mexico. Sheriff Garrett is best remembered for having shot Henry McCarty (aliases William H. Bonny and Henry Antrim) but known best as the infamous "Billy the Kid" in Fort Sumner July 14, 1881.





# **Collegiate Section** *Neil Rutland, Vice President*



We are now looking to wrap up a spring that seems even more hectic and pressurized than last year's. Contests and festivals loom near (or have just happened) testing headaches, concerts, traditional community performances, commencement exercises, the musical.

The musical!

Added to all of that, no one seems to know anymore just when one academic year is supposed, to stop, and when the next one begins (began?). There is unending planning for travel and concerts, budgets, clinicians, equipment, multiple school schedules, fundraising, budgets, contest and show music, repair, recruiting, storage and, of course budgets.

Oh, yes. . . and teaching! Teaching is why we are here after all. Teaching is what we actually do. All of this administrative detail is, to support teaching. Concerts and festival appearances, fundraisers – well maybe not fundraisers, but everything else is of instructional benefit to the students. "The problem is", we tell ourselves, "there is so little time and so much to do", and "There is so very little time to think". We are all so busy "paddling the boat" that we can't look up and see where we are heading. If you are under the impression that someone else is steering while you paddle, I have bad news: when it comes to education, particularly in a field like music where the local teacher is also the curriculum designer and chief advocate for the cause, the same person that provides the work must also set the direction. One of the most critical areas where those working the hardest must also provide leadership is in the area of music teacher preparation.

As collegiate chair I urge you to make some time to consider you're the students studying to become music educators. They, in just a few short years, will be the ones standing with you to accomplish the goals of your program. If you are a choir director, or band director, think carefully about what you would like to see in the general music teacher at the elementary schools that feed into your middle school/junior high programs. If you are a general music teacher think carefully about those that will be teaching alongside you, and also teaching at the high school. Even if we put aside the altruism that brought you into this profession (you can't) self interest alone should be enough to convince you that the preparation of music educators - all levels and all specialties - is your concern. The current cadre of teachers is one of the most important stakeholders in the education of future teachers. Without capable, dedicated, new colleagues, we will never deliver on the promise of music education.

Take time to consider what that future fellow teacher should be able to do: How should they think? What are essential skills, and what skills desirable but non-essential? What are the attitudes that will make for the most success for the program as well as the individual? We often avoid these discussions because we know there are as many answers for these questions as there are teachers, but by avoiding the topic we rob ourselves of the opportunity in influence our future for the better.

I know you are busy, but I nevertheless challenge you to engage with your future colleagues. Show an interest in their education. Challenge them to be the teacher you want in your school system.

I find the low numbers of student MENC members in this state disturbing. If, indeed, these students are thinking of themselves as professional educators, why are they not involved with the most significant organization promoting and supporting music education? One answer I have heard on that topic is that MENC seems less relevant than other, more specialized organizations. Another is value. Given an internet brimming with valuable information for free, why invest in a magazine subscription?

I hope to make some progress on this issue during the time entrusted to me as Collegiate V.P. We have had a very successful few years with our Intercollegiate Band, and a wonderful start last year with the Intercollegiate Choir. It is vital that our state organization support these groups as a means toward involving these students with NMMENC, and the professionals it represents.



# In Memoriam...

### WIN CHRISTIAN -

Win and I got into the band directing business at about the same time around 1958. We began working together while he was at Albuquerque High School and I at Rio Grande in 1964. We had all the enthusiasm and dedication of young men of the word that music should inspire youth and we were the messengers. Jazz as part of school music was in its infancy then and we strove to bring this great music to our kids by forming a big jazz band as part of our program. They were called "stage bands" then as they had originally been formed to back the annual high school stage productions which were common at the time. Once we got the bands established we thought it would be a great idea to get the student jazzers from our schools together for some fun. Dale Kennedy at Del Norte also had a group so we chose several charts, persuaded the great Arlen Asher to join us as soloist and came together at Albuquerque High with the kids from all three bands playing music together and getting to know one another in a jazz experience. That was the first school jazz festival in New Mexico and Win followed it up with the WEST MESA JAZZ FESTIVAL which eventually evolved into the current ALBUQUERQUE JAZZ FESTIVAL.

We had fun learning the trade together and attended workshops, conferences and conventions picking up ideas and inspiration. Sometime in the late '70s he and I went to New Orleans for a convention of the American School Band Directors Association. I 'm sure we learned a lot and heard some great bands but what we remembered most was playing hooky from the meetings one afternoon and wandering around New Orleans taking in the sights like Jackson Square and the French Quarter. The weather was very hot and very humid and soon storm clouds persuaded us to take refuge in the patio at Pat O'Briens bar. We were sippin' the famous Hurricane when the deluge came and flooded the patio at our feet with several inches of water. But water wasn't our concern. We sat on our bar stools dangling our feet above the flood, enjoying the atmosphere, the booze and forgetting school bands for awhile.


There was a time when marching band was fun and entertaining for the students and the football game crowds. Win saw that and always worked with the school to provide memorable shows. For every Homecoming halftime he would take the special song that the Homecoming Committee had chosen, lift it from the recording, arrange it for band and orchestra,

perform it at the assembly and halftime. Quite a chore but he loved doing it. Once the Homecoming game celebration for Eldorado and Cibola coincided. What to do? We got together and plotted a halftime show that used both marching bands on field at the same time. Cibola entered from one end zone, Eldorado from the other, we met in the middle played some music together, welcomed both Homecoming Courts with appropriate pomp and circumstance. We weren't rivals; we brought music to our students collectively.

Win continued this spirit when he joined the State Department of Education as Music Coordinator. He tirelessly traveled the state helping new teachers, providing them with resources for success. One project was to do video tapes of successful music teachers in rehearsal to demonstrate to others techniques and practices that might work for them. It was a huge project in the days before tiny hand held video cameras but he carried it out.

His legacy of working with and for others in music education will resonate forever.

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# **NMMEA Awards Nominations due July 1**

The New Mexico Music Educators Association, recognizing the invaluable service given by members of the profession in bringing the best in music education to the young people of New Mexico, hereby honor that service with the establishment of a comprehensive awards program.

An important part of each district's spring meeting agenda is to provide the opportunity for members to submit nominations for any or all of the following awards:

### 1. Music Educator of the Year:

This award recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions to the field of music education in the schools of New Mexico.

- 2. **The John M. Batcheller Award**: This award recognizes individuals who have made significant contributions to the field of music education in teaching elementary school music.
- 3. **The Hall of Fame**: This award recognizes the invaluable service given by members of the profession by bringing the best in music education to the young people of New Mexico.
- 4. Administrator Award: This award recognizes an outstanding school administrator who has demonstrated support for and commitment to high-quality music education programs in their school(s).
- 5. **The Emeritus Teacher Award**: This award recognizes the contributions of retired music educators who continue to contribute to the New Mexico music education community.

# 6. The New and Emerging Teacher Award:

Recognizes individuals who are new to the profession of music education, who have demonstrated significant success in their early years of teaching, and who are likely to make significant contributions to the field of Music Education in the Schools of New Mexico.

### 7. The Award of Distinction

Recognizes Districts or Individuals that have performed above and beyond the call of duty in the name of Music Education in our State.

Each award will consist of a plaque or certificate indicating the name of the award, the year, and the name of the recipient. Appropriate recognition will be published in THE NEW MEXICO MUSICIAN with presentation being made at the next All-State Music Festival Business/Awards Luncheon.

### **Procedure for Nominations:**

1. Members submit nominations in writing to their respective district presidents prior to the district spring meeting.

2. At the regular spring meeting, the district president will announce those nominations received and accept any further nominations from its membership.

3. The district president will appoint a three-member committee from that district to screen and select nominees to be forwarded for further consideration.

4. The district selection committee is responsible for obtaining a resume and any supporting material for each nominee. Six copies of these

documents and one photo will be forwarded to the immediate past president by July 1.

5. The NMMEA selection committee will consist of the five vicepresidents and the immediate past president, who will serve as chair of the committee. Copies of materials in support of each nominee will be forwarded to each vice-president prior to the summer board of directors meeting. The committee will select and identify recipients at the summer meeting.

Copies of the criteria for each award along with application form are available on the NMMEA website by clicking on the "Forms" link and then clicking on one of the awards listed.

It is important that sufficient information is provided in the package indicating why the nominee should be considered for an award. Do not assume that the NMMEA committee know members each person nominated. Also include a summary of the candidate's work and a list of outstanding achievements which are directly related to the criteria of the award. Include a picture, preferably a black and white. Packages that do not meet the guidelines will not be considered.

All nominations for NMMEA awards must have an updated resume on file. Candidates not selected will have their resume returned. To be considered for future awards, unsuccessful candidates must resubmit an updated resume.

This event will feature the best wind and percussion students from the Southwest. Dr. Timothy Rhea, Director of Bands at Texas A& M University will serve as the Symphonic Band clinician and Dr. Craig Hamilton, Director of Bands at Ouachita Baptist University will serve as the Concert Band clinician. Both Dr. Rhea and Dr. Hamilton are considered the best in their field and the wind & percussion faculty are looking forward to learning from them and having them inspire our student music educators.

During the Honor Band weekend, the NMSU Jazz Ensembles under the direction of Dr. Pancho Romero will present a concert on Friday and the NMSU Symphonic Wind Ensemble under the direction of Mr. Monty Hill will also present a concert at 7:30 p.m on Saturday. All concerts will be held in the NMSU Music Center, Atkinson Recital Hall and admission is free.

Other concerts featuring the wind and percussion areas include the Symphonic Band under the direction of Mr. Monty Hill on February 22 and March 15 beginning at 7:30 p.m. Also the Symphonic Winds will perform on Sunday, March 15 at 3:00 p.m. Symphonic Winds and Symphonic Band will present a joint concert on Sunday, April 17 at 3:00 p.m. Again, all concerts are held in the Atkinson Recital Hall and are free to the public. The La Catrina Quartet has begun its

second year at NMSU as String Ouartet in Residence. They have been pleased with the addition of their new cellist, Cesar Bourguet, into the University life as well as into the quartet's responsibilities. They've been busily teaching their 14 string majors, almost a 400% growth from last year! They've also been teaching courses in Ear Training, Music Theory, Music Technology, String Techniques, and Functional Piano. The quartet's violist, Jorge Martinez and his wife, Veronica, just welcomed a new baby boy, David, into their family on October 4th. They've all begun to settle into Las Cruces comfortably.

Recently, the quartet taught an allday clinic with local High School string students from El Paso in preparation for their All-Region effort Competition. This was graciously coordinated by NMSU Alumna, Andy Moran, the music director for El Paso Youth Symphony Orchestras. The La Catrina Quartet also traveled to Charleston, West

Virginia for a performance in September. They're in the process of learning a whole new season of works. The quartet has recently been awarded a new commission from the Puerto Rican composer, Roberto Sierra. Symphony Space, in New York City, has commissioned this new work which will be premiered there on May 12th and 14th. This is the 2nd commission the quartet has received since it formed in 2004. The La Catrina Ouartet is scheduled to perform in the Atkinson Recital Hall on November 19th at 7:30. Upcoming tours include concerts in Ohio, Kentucky, Los Angeles, Utica, NY and New York City.

After the success of last season's Verdi Requiem, Dr. Alt has chosen another major work certain to please choral music lovers. We offer Mozart's Mass in C Minor, sometimes called the Grand Mass on April 29th & 30th. It is widely regarded as Mozart's most ambitious and elaborate choral masterpiece. It anticipates the symphonic masses of Haydn in its choral-solo setting, while also showing the influence of Bach and Handel, whom Mozart was studying at the time. The mass calls for two sopranos, tenor and bass soloists, a large orchestra, and chorus. One of Mozart's biographers, Alfred Einstein noted: "It has been rightly said that [the Grand Mass] is the only work that stands between the B Minor Mass of Bach and the D Major Mass (Missa Solemnis) of Beethoven."

Doña Ana Lyric Opera (DALO) is NMSU's opera program. Under the direction of Professors Dr. Andrew Zimmerman (stage director) and David Klement (conductor), the company draws on student, community and professional talent. DALO's 2010 full production of Donizetti's *L'Elisir d'amore* (Elixir of Love) was greatly enjoyed by audience and participants alike, and received generous praise for both the musical preparation and production elements. The singer

casting was particularly strong; almost all of the principal roles could be triple cast with students, the majority of which have come to the NMSU Music Department from New Mexico high schools.

On March 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup>, 2011, DALO will be presenting a full production of Mozart's *L'Nozze di Figaro* (The Marriage of Figaro) at the Atkinson Recital Hall. The depth of singer talent at NMSU has again allowed the double and triple casting of most of the roles. The community can expect more entertaining evenings of comedy, passion, and musical elegance.

Horn Professor, Nancy Joy performed as a Contributing Artist at the Southwest Horn Symposium in San Diego, CA in May and at the International Women's Brass Conference in Toronto, Canada. She also performed various solos and chamber music at the 42<sup>nd</sup> International Horn Society Symposium in Brisbane, In addition Australia. to her performances, Ms. Joy arrived two weeks before the symposium to serve as International Workshop Coordinator and as the Co-Chair of the IHS Scholarship Competitions.

# The University of New Mexico

The 2010-2011 academic year marks the centennial of choral activities at the University of New Mexico. UNM now boasts six choirs with nearly four hundred singers, and during the year, various events have marked the anniversary, including the Concert Choir's tour to Italy and the University Chorus's performance in Carnegie Hall. Upcoming is the world premiere of a work commissioned for the occasion-Requiem for chorus and orchestra, written by conductor and composer René Clausen. This will be performed in Popejoy Hall on April 26, 2011, with Dr. Clausen conducting the University Chorus, Concert Choir and Symphony Orchestra. All UNM alumni who have sung in the choral program in the last one hundred years are invited back for this celebration, with a reception to follow.

UNM's women's chorus, Las Cantantes, received a very positive review of its recording *My Dancing Day* (Raven label, OAR 980) in the November/December 2010 issue of the *American Record Guide*. Philip Greenfield writes, "A tribute not just to the spirit of Christmas but to the spirited brand of music-making going on at the University of New Mexico." Las Cantantes is directed by Dr. Maxine Thévenot, and among the

works on the CD is Prof. Bradley Ellingboe's *Magnificat* for voices, marimba and oboe.

Students in the violin and viola studios have had the opportunity this year to perform in several excellent masterclasses offered bv internationally renowned artists this fall. On August 28, violinist Borivoj Martinic-Jercic gave a masterclass in Kurt Frederick Rehearsal Hall. Mr. Martinic-Jercic is the concertmaster of the Santa Fe Opera Orchestra and also the music director of the Zagreb Soloists. On November 5, virtuoso soloist Phillipe Quint taught a violin masterclass in Keller Hall. This class was made possible by the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra, with whom Mr. Quint was appearing as soloist in the Korngold concerto. Four UNM violin students had the opportunity to perform for Mr. Quint and were inspired by his artistry, enthusiasm and energy. On November 29, Matthew McBride-Daline, viola professor at Louisiana State University, offered a recital and masterclass for UNM students in Keller Hall. The recital included the Schumann Fairytales and a duo for two violas by Frank Bridge, performed with UNM viola professor Kim Fredenburgh. In April, Prof. Fredenburgh will be traveling to LSU to give a masterclass for Dr. Daline's students and will also serve as a judge for a national viola competition that is hosted by LSU.

The band area has announced that a fifth UNM Wind Symphony

recording is in the works. This project will feature J. D. Shaw, UNM's Professor of Horn. Recording will begin in the spring of 2011, with a projected release date of early 2012. The Wind Symphony and Symphonic Band will perform in Popejoy Hall on April 4, with Prof. Shaw as soloist. The concert will include Elsa's Procession to the Cathedral by Richard Wagner, To Walk with Wings by Julie Giroux and Poseidon by Hardy Mertens, plus other selections to be announced. The Wind Symphony and Symphonic Band will also team up for a concert entitled "Mass and Brass" on May 6 in Popejoy. The program will include Leonard Bernstein's Suite from Mass, featuring the Sandia Brass, UNM's graduate student brass quintet.



# Guitar Section John Truitt, Acting Vice President



The 2011 New Mexico All-State Guitar Ensemble is going to be a very tough act to follow! Our clinician Matthew Hinsley of the Austin Classical Guitar Society did an absolutely wonderful job in bringing the music out of our seventy-two member group this year. Monica Leaming, Orchestra Vice President summed it up when she grabbed me after the performance in Popejoy Hall and said "You are in trouble now! How are you ever going to top that?" Truly, the group exceeded all expectations with a performance that was simply luminescent in its beauty and musicianship. The bar has been set very high for future All-State **Guitar Ensembles!** 

The whole experience of All-State 2011 was a great one for the New Mexico Guitar Initiative. Our workshops were wonderful and very well attended, and the section meeting was very productive and collegial. Some great suggestions were made for the future growth of our enterprise, and one of those suggestions for how we seat our All-State Guitar Ensemble has now become reality. The method that we will now use to seat the group will be the "stacked quartet" system. In the recent meeting of the NMMEA Executive Board. this is the amendment that was made to the handbook concerning the seating of the ensemble: (Section H, #4)

Students accepted in the All-State Guitar Ensemble will be placed by the audition team in parts 1, 2 3. or 4. The first four ranking students will be the principal players for parts 1, 2, 3. and 4. Each successive ranking group of four students will be placed in parts 1, 2, 3, and 4 consistently throughout the group. Each part will be listed alphabetically. The clinician will have the right to move players from part to part at his or her discretion, for balance or any other reason.

The new seating will have the effect of putting experienced players throughout the group so that the lower parts will sound with as much confidence as the higher parts do. There are two possible negatives to this, both far outweighed by the musical necessity of making the change. The first is that there will be who are relatively students inexperienced who will be in the first and second part now, and second, students may not feel the same motivation to try to place high in the ensemble at auditions. Directors will need to be sure to talk to the students about the priority to have a balanced ensemble, and what that will mean when they receive their placements for next year's group.

The audition material for next year will be:

- 1. Study #11 in dm by Matteo Carcassi, quarter note = 72 (25 Melodious and Progressive Studies, Op. 60, FJH Publishers)
- 2. **Study # 6 by Leo Brouwer**, from Estudios Sencillos quarter note = 88 (2<sup>nd</sup> series, Max Eschig, Publishers)
- 3. The scales will be the **two octave c#minor** and the **three octave G major** from **Diatonic Major and Minor Scales**, Andres Segovia,(Theodore Presser, Publisher.) quarter note = 88
- 4. The sight reading example will be no longer than eight measures, in a key signature of up to three sharps or two flats, in simple time, all in

the open position except on the first string which can be up to the seventh fret, and double stops will be limited to cadential points.

Once again Jeremy Mayne and Jim Rivera will produce the youtube tutorials to help in the preparation of the etudes and scales. They will be up at the beginning of the school year. Directors should let me know if they would like me to supply them with practice sight-reading examples to use in preparation for the audition.
