While our numbers were down in our vocal (-118), string (-44), and guitar (-33) registrations we still had a pretty respectable number of registrations. Thank you to all of you who encouraged your students to participate. Since my article was written October 1 the deadline for wind and percussion registrations has not yet occurred so those numbers are not available.

# All-State Information

In a few weeks we will hold our 69th All-State Music Festival and Music Educator In-Service Conference. If you haven't already done so please make arrangements to attend. There are at least 30 workshops and clinics to attend for general music, middle school, and high school teachers. This is also a special time to see your colleagues from all over New Mexico and to make new acquaintances. Tim Lautzenheizer will be delivering our Keynote Address and that will be

sure to brighten your day. There are a number of changes taking place at our 2013 All-State. The Honor Concerts will be held in the afternoon on both Thursday and Friday. There will be no evening events scheduled on either of those days so you can plan activities for your students. There will be no exhibits. Please read President Flores's column as well as your respective Vice President's Column for the latest information regarding your section as well as for All-State. Their fall columns also have important information for you to refer to.

The registration desk, exhibits, and the Business/Awards Luncheon will again be located in the ballroom area of the Student Union. We are working on whether we are going to have a Wednesday evening reception. Since we won't have the exhibits we are trying to find another location that will work. The All-State Music Educators Schedule will be posted in early December so you can plan the clinics you might attend. The student schedule will be posted on the "Student/Parent" Link also in early December.

The NMMEA Business/Awards Luncheon will take place on Friday, January 11, 2013 starting at 11:45 AM in Ballroom B in the Student Union. The cost per meal remains at \$18. The menu will include green salad and dressings, grilled chicken breast, mashed potatoes, vegetable, desert, rolls and butter, and coffee or tea. Our conference hotel for the 2013
All-State is the Sheraton Albuquer-

que Uptown Hotel located at the corner of Menaul and Louisiana NE. Albuquerque, NM 87110. Reservations can be made by contacting the Sheraton at 505-830-5786 or by accessed their website at https:// www.starwoodmeeting.com/Book/ NMMUSICED. By accessing their website you can also see what is offered at their hotel. The rate will be \$77 per room plus tax for up to four students per room. Although their rate is a little higher than we had in the past their facilities are very attractive, as the hotel has had a total renovation recently. I know you will find the quality of the rooms and the facility of high quality and a real bargain at \$77. There is ample parking (buses included) at the hotel. A full complimentary breakfast is included and will be served in one of their ballrooms. The Coronado Mall is located across the street and ABQ Uptown is relatively close. # Editor's Desk Keith Jordan



I was given the Gift of Music by a special teacher and I certainly didn't deserve it.

I have been very lucky in my career and I've had an enormous amount of fun, great kids and wonderful schools to learn in and teach at. I'm one of those rare Native New Mexicans, being born and raised in Alamogordo, NM.

My Dad was a mailman and my Mom was a stay at home Mom with part-time jobs at times during our growing up years. I was fortunate to have begun piano lessons with a wonderful teacher and mentor named Gladys Kelso Storrs. I mention Mrs. Storrs because we called her Momma Storrs and she taught a lot of kids from Alamogordo how to play the piano. Here's the "lucky" or interesting part. None of us knew that in her former life she was Gladys Kelso, former head of the North Texas State University keyboard department and advisor for graduate studies at NTSU. None of us knew that she was one of Van Cliburn's teachers and coaches and none of us knew that she studied at Julliard on keyboard and organ. We just knew that if we showed up to piano lessons in the morning and we looked hungry, Momma Storrs was in the kitchen listening to us play through our pieces and cooking us some breakfast, as she called out corrections and note

mistakes without ever sticking her head in the door. You know, come to think of it, I never could figure out how she knew when I was playing the wrong rhythm or note in Bartok's Bear Dance when I was a sixth grader or how she knew my fingering was wrong just from listening to me play one of the Haydn Sonatas.

The only reason that I know any of the North Texas stuff is that she would take me back in the spare bedroom to pick out pieces from the stacks of music on the floor and up on the wall I would see these diplomas with her name on them and recognition awards from NTSU, etc... and being curious I would always read them and wonder what that was all about. I still talk to adults from Alamogordo today that had lessons with Mrs. Storrs and remember her as a remarkable teacher, patient, kind, and a slave driver but had no idea that she was a world class pianist/organist

We were a part of the Piano Guild of America and we played for a judge Mrs. Storrs brought in from out of state every year, it was a big deal. I still have my pins and my judging forms. We would see in the paper from time to time that Mrs. Storrs was off to somewhere to judge someone else's piano students and they would list that she was a part of the Piano Guild's Mystic Hall of Fame for 50 year judges. My piano lessons cost me \$2.00 a week and sometimes we had a hard time paying for them but Mrs. Storrs would let us pay her at the end of the month, As I got older and we began going on the "road" we would get 2-3 lessons a week, groups playing duets and quartets. She had a fairly large living room in an older home with two baby grands and an organ in the corner, I bet it was noisy in there but we didn't know it. I didn't know that those pianos were incredible works of art and kept in immaculate shape and tune .It never occurred to me that the actions were fast and brilliant. It was

just where we went to get lessons.

My brother, Joe, our friend, Tommy, and I would get to go to Las Vegas, NM, Roswell, Las Cruces, Clovis, Hobbs, etc...to play in piano recitals and programs with other students from around the state. We got to play in libraries in El Paso and for the various clubs that Mrs. Storrs was a member of in Alamogordo. I can remember complaining and whining about having to go play another rotary luncheon, or women's club meeting. She got me jobs playing the piano and organ for churches. I got to play for the Catholic Church, Episcopal Church, Baptist churches, Methodist Churches, Lutheran Churches, and even the Alamogordo Church of Christ Scientist. I was a sub organist/pianist and whenever we got the call we just went and did it because Mrs. Storrs asked us to do it.

Mrs. Storrs insisted on sight-reading, theory, scales, and all sorts of technical wizardry for the keyboard that I still practice today when I sit down at a piano. All the while she's pushing me to play Beethoven, Mozart, Haydn, Bach (lots of Bach), Mendelsohn, Brahms, Bartok, Scriabin, etc...you get the picture. We never had less than 10 pieces going in the air at any one point. Somehow it didn't seem like work, it kind of seemed like fun and I would practice a couple of hours a day.

My "point" you ask? Who in the world would have ever thought or dreamed that in little bitty Alamogordo, NM in the middle of the desert, my friends and I would be the recipients' of WORLD CLASS piano lessons from a teacher that we could neither afford or even dream of taking lessons from, in the real world. Mrs. Storrs always wanted me to go to NTSU and live with her sister and attend school there, but we could barely afford for me to go to NMSU and the only way I could afford to pay for NMSU was that I had

a job playing organ (b3) and electric piano with a rock band out of Las Cruces every weekend that I didn't have a game. The ONLY reason I got the job was because when I sat down at the B3 and the boss just sort of asked me to play something hard on the organ, so I launched into my high school show off piece of Toccata and Fugue in D Minor (Bach of course) and the rock guys liked it.

I went home on that weekend and told Mrs. Storrs how I got the job and she just smiled and said, "I hope you didn't try to play the Fugue too fast." I would come home on occasion and dutifully troop down to Mrs. Storr's house, where she invariably had some kid playing the piano and two or three others waiting to play the piano after him, but everything stopped when I came in the door! Imagine that, she would introduce me and I would have to play for the little kids, etc... or sometimes with them. Mr. Storrs owned a laundry down on 10th street and they lived a very happy small town life, full of music and work.

Many years later I was subbing in the Roswell Symphony on Tuba and got to room with and eat breakfast with a wonderful man who was married to the UNM French Horn Professor; he had retired from Michigan State University and moved with his wife to Albuquerque. We were enjoying Roswell's breakfast fare and talking about how we got into music and he shared with me that he was from Wichita Falls, Texas and went to NTSU to study horn. I mentioned that my old piano teacher Mrs. Storrs was apparently from there but her name was I think, Gladys Kelso at the time. His head snapped up and his mouth opened in surprise and he told me that she was his freshmen theory teacher at NTSU and she basically disappeared one day never to be seen or heard from again. Apparently, Mrs. Storrs (Kelso) was living with her sister at NTSU, both

taught there and both were unmarried until Mr. Storrs came to town and somehow the two of them decided to run off, get married and live happily ever after. My new acquaintance was astounded and told me he was going to call his classmates and tell them what had happened to their amazing teacher, Gladys Kelso. She ended up in Alamogordo, NM teaching dirty faced kids how to play Bach, Beethoven, and the other great masters, she took us all over the state so that we could listen. hear and appreciated the music of the ages. We had NO idea we were getting any of that and we probably were NOT grateful. But let me tell you music teacher, I AM NOW!

She created in me the will to play, the will to practice, the will to be good at something and excel. She helped me with marching band, she helped me with jazz band, and she helped me with music theory, with listening skills and most importantly with sight-reading. She taught me how to BE a musician, how to think piano and how to LEARN, she gave me confidence and performance opportunities that I can only marvel at now. She gave me lightning fast technique that has served me a million times over in a thousand different settings. I can only marvel at how we came to have one of the great piano teachers in the world at that time, teaching in a little desert town and she was HAPPY to be there with us!

Mrs. Storrs opened a thousand musical doors for each and every one of us that knew and loved her, the same way YOU are opening a thousand musical doors for the kids that love you. I have been lucky enough to teach class piano for over 25 years at LCHS and St. Pius X HS, I'm NOT the teacher Mrs. Storrs was but the kids will ask me to play them something on occasion. Play me something hard is the request and I'll play something for them

but there's that little inner smile in me, that little flash every time that I'm probably playing the Fugue too fast and I will remember how much I owe Momma Storrs and how much she gave ME! What a gift!

I've received NUMEROUS gifts of teaching over the years, Harold Van Winkle, Loren Rhodes, Bob Bouma, Norvil Howell, Jim Young, John Sanks, Steve Snowden, John Converse, Henry Estrada, Ron Sanders, Ken Holloway, Gregg Hanson, and many others, including you. THANK YOU to each and every one of you. I wouldn't be who I am without each of you.

Thank GOD my Mom took me to Mrs. Storrs for my introduction in to this musical world of ours. I wonder? Which of your students is a little "me" right now, which of them will owe you their musical introduction and life? Which of them will you PROFOUNDLY influence with your teaching? God bless and keep you and your families, I appreciate what you are doing for all those kids and their families.

As I write this article we are a couple weeks away from Zia and things are in full marching band swing (I had other more colorful ways to express this time of the year, but thought better of it)! Once again in the midst of a busy fall I'm reminded what band means to so many of our students. I would like to say they are all searching for a higher meaning of life through the aesthetics of music learned in our class, but that would be a lie! I'd like to believe they show up everyday wanting to learn more about pitch tendencies, intricacies of articulation, roll hand speed and all of the other concepts we pontificate about daily...but again, probably a lie! What isn't a lie is that many of them show up

to belong, feel important and be held accountable for their actions.

I had an incident this fall that reminded me of this. I have a young 9th grade student in my class that doesn't necessarily like to hurry anywhere! Well, to those of you who know me, that is a bit like poking a bear with a stick and true to my nature, she got an appropriate response! As she didn't have a spot in the show, wasn't a good player and obviously didn't like the physical aspect of the class, I figured it would be her last day. She proved me wrong...

Not only did she stay in the class, she is now at least jogging to rehearsal and has actually asked for help before and after school. Is it because she loves music and the concepts that we try to teach? I doubt it! I believe it is because band provides her structure and a place to belong. After getting to know the young lady a bit better, I realize that band may be one of the only areas of her life that she can call home and actually be held to a high standard. It is so easy to forget what music really teaches so many of our students.

Please check the NMMEA website in mid December for the All-State Conference schedule. All students are required to attend all rehearsals and meetings. All directors who have students participating in small school band are asked to help with the audition/ sectionals on Wednesday night. All students need to bring folding stand, music and pencil to each rehearsal. Symphonic and Concert band students will have a final chair placement (or sectional) on Wednesday evening. All students must be in attendance. Please stress to your students the need to show up to this audition prepared on the all-state music. The chair audition team will be identifying students who are unprepared at the time of the audition. Students who are ill prepared may jeopardize their participation in All-State. Please refer to the NMMEA Official Handbook for more guidelines and information. A meeting for all directors helping with chair placements will be held in B 117 at 6:30 on Wednesday, January 9th. This will be a short meeting, please be on time...PLEASE BE ON TIME!

Jill Trinka, Ph.D., is well known by children, parents, and music educators as "a dynamic, winsome, and energetic teacher and performer." Her performances bring new life to the musical and cultural treasures of American folk music as she accompanies herself on the dulcimer, autoharp, guitar, and banjo. She has recorded and written four volumes of folksongs, singing games, and play parties for kids of all ages: My Little Rooster (1987), Bought Me a Cat (1988), John, the Rabbit (1989), and The Little Black Bull (1996). These publications and her collaborative recordings with John Feierabend -

Had a Little Rooster (2005), Old Joe Clark (2006), and There's a Hole in the Bucket (2006) – are published by and available from GIA Music, Inc.

Dr. Trinka was a 1974-75 Ford Foundation Ringer Fellow at the Liszt Academy of Music in Budapest, Hungary, where she studied Kodály philosophy and practice in music education. She has taught in public and private schools in IL, NY, CT, and TX, and was on the music education faculties at the University of Central Arkansas, the University of North Texas, and the University of St. Thomas, where she also served as director of Graduate Programs in Music Education.

Dr. Trinka holds a B.S. in music education from the University of Illinois, and Ph.D. in music education with secondary studies in ethnomusicology from the University of Texas at Austin. She has taught in Kodály teacher education programs throughout the United States, and served as director of the Kodály Institute of Texas at the University of North Texas, the Kodály Certificate Program at Portland State University in Portland, OR, and the Kodály Institute at the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, MN. She is a Past President of the Organization of American Kodály Educators and received their Outstanding Educator Award in 2003. Jill was a contributing author to Pearson/Scott Foresman/Silver Burdett's Making Music, Grades 5-8.

Jill currently resides in Pawley's Island, SC where she sings in the Carolina Master Chorale and the Carolina Master Chorale Chamber Singers, teaches music education, world music, and elementary education courses at Coastal Carolina University, and conducts workshops for music educators throughout the United States. Her DVD Jill Trinka: The Bass Hall Children's Concerts(Ft. Worth, TX) was released by GIA Music in late 2011. She is currently working on Volume 5: Sing a Song of Sixpence, and a Christmas CD.

I hope that some of the resources the universities so generously extended to make the intercollegiate groups possible can now be re-allocated to help music education majors experience the 2013 New Mexico All-State Music Festival and In-Service Conference.

The collegiate membership will also have a new wrinkle to contend with. There will be a meeting of



the NMMEA collegiate chapter for the first time in many years. The schedule has yet to be finalized, but the tentative time is set for 11:00 on Thursday, January 10, 2013. This will, undoubtedly, be less than ideal for some of us, but I urge you to make every effort to attend. In my tenure as Collegiate Vice President, I have come to believe that we have much to offer our state organization and that we need to set about finding ways to realize that potential. Please don't hesitate to suggest any agenda items you feel might be appropriate for that meeting. NMMEA belongs to the music educators of New Mexico and has always proved responsive to the needs and aspirations of its membership. I have raised the issue of our relationships with the institutions to which we belong. Given the shift in emphasis for the collegiate membership of NMMEA, perhaps it is time to reexamine our reasons for belonging to the organization as individuals. If you ask one of us, you are likely to get answers that sound like a late-night comedy top ten list: So: Why are you in NMMEA?

- 1. It looks good in my tenure file.
- 2. The convention helps me fill in that awkward period of free time between semesters (said nobody EVER!).
- 3. Wednesday night cookies and pizza!
- 4. Credit card applications from NAfME.
- 5. My Chairman told me to.
- 6. A four-day, expenses-paid tour of the state every three years.

There is a grain of actual truth in these flippant answers. That truth lies in the fellowship we seek with colleagues who work with the most important interface that music education has with the general population of our state, the public schools. While a conversation with the collegiate members of NMMEA will reveal very little of the "ivory tower" thinking that university faculty are so often accused of, we do require the grounding in the realities of the challenges and triumphs of public school teaching that only regular contact with public school teachers can bring. NMMEA membership is one important part of that network. Service seems to be one of the most powerful reasons we have to belong to NMMEA. We regularly serve as judges, hosts, and clinicians at the regional and state level. It is too simple and too cynical to merely offer recruitment as the reason for this service unless we broaden the definition of the word to include "recruitment" for students to remain passionate about music making beyond their high school years and for some to envision a future as music professionals. Our future is closely bound to that of school music programs at all levels. Our success is mutually beneficial. In our work with NMMEA we can affirm our alliance with all of our music educator colleagues and our willingness to serve the cause of music education. I hope to see all of you at the convention and at our meeting.

# 2013 All-State Small School Band Conductor Dave Kendrick

Dave Kendrick has 39 years of public school teaching experience. He has taught band, choir and music theory in all grade levels. During his long and noted career he taught in the Emmons Public School in Emmons Minnesota, at Garner-Hayfield High School in Garner Iowa and at Silver High School in Silver City High School. Mr. Kendrick is currently the co-director and founder of the Grant County Community Band.

# 2013 All-State Concert Band Conductor Kenneth Singleton

Professor of Music, Director of Bands, University of Northern Colorado

Dr. Kenneth Singleton directs the UNC Wind Ensemble and Concert Band and is Chair of the Wind Conducting Program. He has also served as Director of Concert Bands at New Mexico State University, and has directed ensembles at the Hartt School of Music, Albertus Magnus College, and Yale University. Singleton holds a bachelor's degree from the University of South Florida, and two master's degrees from the Yale University School of Music. His doctorate in tuba performance was the first awarded by Yale University in that area. An avid transcriber of brass music (over 1,000 titles) and a music editor for the Charles Ives Society, Singleton has nearly fifty publications to his credit, mainly works for band and wind ensemble. His Ives editions have been recorded by the Chicago Symphony, the St. Louis Symphony, the Concertgebow Orchestra, the

Cleveland Orchestra, and numerous other ensembles.

He is presently conductor of the Denver Brass, the region's premiere brass ensemble. Singleton is in constant demand around the nation as a guest clinician and conductor, and has conducted All-State Bands in New York, New Mexico, Tennessee, North Dakota and Colorado. He has been named the College of Performing and Visual Arts Scholar of the Year, and has received the Kappa Kappa Psi Distinguished Service to Music Award. Dr. Singleton is an elected member of the American Bandmasters Association, as well as a member of the Colorado Bandmasters Association Hall of Fame.

# Paula A. Crider

Following a distinguished 33 year teaching career, Professor Paula A. Crider continues to share her passion for making music through an active schedule as guest conductor, lecturer, clinician and adjudicator.

Professor Crider has taught in the public schools at all levels, and holds the unique distinction of having been the first female in the state of Texas to serve as director of bands at a class 5-A high school. Her Crockett High School Bands in Austin, Texas earned twelve consecutive University Interscholastic League "Sweepstakes Awards" for musical excellence, received national recognition on the concert stage, and were twice named Texas 5A State Marching Champions.

During her tenure at The University of Texas, Professor Crider conducted the Symphony Band, the Longhorn Marching and Concert Bands, and served as instructor for undergraduate conducting, Brass Methods, Graduate Wind Literature, supervised student teachers and served as administrator for the Longhorn Music Camps.

Prof. Crider has written numerous articles for The Instrumentalist, The Band Director's Guide, and the National Band Association Journal. She has published manuals for Brass Techniques, Marching Band Methods and Instrumental Conducting, and is co-author for the Hal Leonard "Masterwork Studies" series, a text for high school bands. She has recently completed The Composer's Legacy, Conductors on Conducting for Wind Band published by GIA.

Prof. Crider is a Past President of the National Band Association, and the American Bandmaster's Association. She considers her greatest honor, however, to be the privilege of working with all who share a passion for excellence in making music



# 2013 All-State Mixed Choir Guest Conductor Dr. David Childs

Artistic Ex-Conductor, and ecutive Director Vox Humana David N. Childs, b. 1969 at Nelson, New Zealand, has a Bachelor's degree in composition and musicology from Canterbury University, Christchurch, New Zealand; a Master of Music degree in conducting from the Florida State University, Tallahassee; and a Doctorate of Musical Arts degree from Louisiana State University. Dr. Childs is Director of Choirs at Highland Park United Methodist Church, Dallas, TX, beginning his appointment in August, 2010. He also served as tenured Associate Professor of Choral Studies at the Blair School of Music, Vanderbilt University, 2001-2011.

Dr. Childs is an active clinician and adjudicator in the United States, working at the grade school, college, and community levels. He has conducted numerous All-State and honor choirs in Tennessee, Maryland, Virginia, Louisiana, Oregon, Texas, Kansas, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, New Zealand, and Japan.

His compositions frequently appear at state festivals and workshops, and at ACDA state, regional, and national conventions.

In August of 2010 he accepted the Director of Choirs position at Highland Park United Methodist Church in Dallas. He is Composer-In-Residence for Manhattan Concert Productions, and was the recipient of the TN Composerof-the-Year Award in 2010-2011.

In addition, he directs Vox Humana a Dallas-based professional choir of twenty-four voices, initially formed in Nashville. He currently serves as Executive and Artistic Director of Vox Humana.



# 2013 All-State Treble Choir Guest Conductor Dr. Elizabeth Schauer



Dr. Elizabeth Schauer accepted an appointment as Associate Director of Choral Activities and Associate Professor of Music at the University of Arizona in the fall of 2004. An award-winning educator, Dr. Schauer directs the Symphonic Choir, the University Community Chorus and vocal jazz ensembles; and teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in choral conducting and methods.

She currently serves as Chancel Choir director at St. Mark's United Methodist Church in Tucson, and has been on the summer faculty at Westminster Choir College in Princeton, New Jersey. Before coming to Tucson, Dr. Schauer was Director of Choral Activities at Adams State College in Colorado, and also taught at Centenary College in New Jersey.

Dr. Schauer has conducted college, community, church, honor and public school choirs including singers from ages 5 to 95, and has served as music director of community and university theatrical productions as well. She is in demand as an adjudicator, clinician, guest conductor and presenter throughout the United States. She has presented sessions at the national conventions of American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) and College Music Soci-

ety (CMS) and most recently served as headliner clinician for the Colorado ACDA summer workshop. Her choirs have been featured at local, state and regional events of Music Educators National Conference (MENC), ACDA and CMS.

As a chorister, Dr. Schauer has had the privilege to sing under the direction of Riccardo Muti, Leonard Bernstein, Zubin Mehta, Sir David Willcocks, James Conlon and Hugh Wolff, and in opera choruses under the direction of Robert Altman, Gian Carlo Menotti, and Gunter Kramer.

Dr. Schauer has held state and regional leadership positions with ACDA, CMS and MENC.

# 2013 All-State Concert Orchestra Conductor Andres Moran



Texas native Andres Moran is currently the assistant conductor of the El Paso Symphony Orchestra. Since being appointed to this position in 2009, he has overseen all Pops, Family, and Educational Outreach programs. Moran is also the music director and general manager of the El Paso Symphony Youth Or-

chestras. Under his leadership, the EPSYOs has grown into an organization that serves over 300 students and has four performing ensembles. Prior to this appointment, Moran served as associate instructor in the Instrumental Conducting departmentfor Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music. In this role, Moran collaborated with the IU Opera and Ballet Theater on their production of Perspectives 1900's, conducting fully staged versions of Debussy's L'Après-midi d'un faune and Chopin's Les Sylphides. As assistant conductor for the National Repertory Orchestra in 2008, Moran shared the podium with Maestro Carl Topilow on several occasions in both classical and pops concerts while also conducting full orchestral and educational programs throughout the season. A strong proponent of music education, Moran spent several years

working closely with students in the public school music programs of the West Texas/New Mexico area. He was a founding member of a mentoring initiative which partnered college music majors with local middle and high school music students in under-privileged communities. Moran is currently in the process of completing his doctorate degree in Instrumental Conducting from Indiana University. He received a graduate degree in Orchestral Conducting from Southern Methodist University while simultaneously pursuing a degree in Horn Performance. Moran's principal conducting teachers are David Effron, Arthur Fagen, and Paul C. Phillips. He has participated in masterclasses with Leonard Slatkin, Herbert Blomstedt, Marin Alsop, and Michael Morgan.

# 2013 All-State Symphonic Orchestra Conductor Jung Ho Pak

Described by the New York Times as a conductor who "radiates enthusiasm" and the Los Angeles Times as "a real grabber", Jung-Ho Pak is known for his unique vision of the role of classical music. Orchestra Nova San Diego appointed Mr. Pak as Artistic Director and Conductor in 2006, and in 2007 he was named Artistic Director and Conductor of the Cape Cod Symphony Orchestra (second largest in Masschussetts to the Boston Symphony Orchestra). Since 2003, he has been Director of Orchestras and Music Director of the World Youth Symphony Orchestra and at the Interlochen Center for the Arts. Mr. Pak is also Music Director Emeritus of the New Haven Symphony Orchestra. As Music Director of the San Diego Symphony Orchestra (1997-2002), Mr. Pak led the orchestra from bankruptey to an unprecedented financial success. As a nationally recognized

educator, he served as Music Director with the University of Southern California (USC) Symphony and the San Francisco Conservatory of Music Orchestra. He has also served as Principal Conductor of the Emmynominated Disney Young Musicians Symphony Orchestra and as Music Director of the Debut Orchestra, International Chamber Orchestra, NEXT Chamber Orchestra, Colburn Chamber Orchestra, and Diablo Ballet. Guest conducting has taken him to Europe, the Soviet Union, South America and Asia. Mr. Pak is also a frequent speaker on television and radio, as well as a clinician and conductor at national music festivals.



# 2013 All-State Guitar Ensemble Conductor Martha Masters

The Illinois Times wrote that guitarist Martha Masters "...is on a swift and certain trajectory to star territory." Masters' playing has been described as "seductive" (Ft. Worth Star Telegram), "intelligent and natural" (Guitar Review), and "refined and elegant" (American Record Guide). She has received critical acclaim as a solo recitalist, as a chamber musician with Duo Erato, and as a soloist with orchestras. Recent concert seasons have included performances on concert series and at festivals in China, England, Denmark, Spain, Poland, Germany, Paraguay, Peru, Puerto Rico, Canada, Mexico, and throughout the United States.


Masters' first CD, Serenade, is now in its second printing, and her Naxos recital disc sold over 10,000 copies worldwide in the first year of its release. Her recording of Italian music was released in 2006 on the GSP label, and a recording of early 20th Century Spanish music was released



on GSP in 2009. Masters' book, Reaching the Next Level, a method for experienced guitar students, was published in 2010 by Mel Bay, and has received early critical acclaim. In November of 2000, she also won the Andrés Segovia International Guitar Competition in Linares, Spain. In addition to being on the guitar faculties of Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles and Cal State Fullerton, Masters is also the President of the Guitar Foundation of America (GFA), dedicated to supporting instrument, its players and its music in the US and throughout the world.

Masters received both the Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from the Peabody Conservatory, where she studied with Manuel Barrueco, and completed the Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Southern California as a student of Scott Tennant.

# 2013 All-State Honor Band Eldorado Symphonic Winds John San



The Eldorado Band is very proud to have been selected as the 2013 NMMEA Honor Band. We believe this is one of the highest honors that a school band can achieve in our state. Every Spring, the Arts Academy produces a school-wide musical. When we do not perform children's operas, we perform original instrumental shows. Every bit of music is produced by students in grades 1-6 in these instrumental focused performances. The 2011-2012 school vear was our first year to have the combined grade-level ensemble, Rhythmic Joy. Rhythmic Joy is a group of musicians in grades 4-6 who have shown a strong insterest in regular weekly music classes. Although every student at the Arts Academy participates in an Orff ensemble, Rhythmic Joy has been able to rehearse more frequently allowing them to delve into music more deeply.

The Arts Academy @ Bella Vista focuses on Arts Integration.

At any time during the day, you can walk into a "regular" classroom and hear music or see dancing as our teachers use the Arts to teach the curriculum. tion with children rather than giving orders. Many times, the students have better ideas than I do! It gives me great joy to instill confidence in the kids. After a little push, they start to realize their own creativity. It is wonderful to see how proud children are when they know that their own thoughts and ideas are worthy.

Throughout this whole process, not only are the children learning a vast amount about music, but they are learning how to collaborate, to compromise, to contribute, and to do all of these things in creative ways. The experience that music brings to children is immeasurable and I am beyond blessed to have a role in helping shape the lives of our future!

# ARE OUR ADJUDICATORS QUALIFIED FOR PROFES-SIONAL EVALUATION OF MUSIC EDUCATORS?

Teacher evaluation is without doubt the most discussed topic in education today. This is true in New Mexico and throughout the nation. As music educators our concern is the evaluation standards for those who do not teach subjects evaluated through standardized testing or in only those grades being tested. We need to prepare, through NMMEA, standards by which our membership will be tested. Most Districts have already recognized this by renaming our "Festivals" as "Music Performance Assessment" events. Since we lost the 'fun' in festivals many years ago this was inevitable. Now we must expect that our performing groups will be judged on how effective our teaching has been. Bottom line..your groups get a I or II you are an effective teacher; get a III and you may need help; get a IV or V - your job is at risk and may be taken over by a professional education organization. Overstated? Maybe, maybe not. Nevertheless, we as the most united, non-union, teachers organization in New Mexico, must be prepared to not only defend the evaluation of our members but to be in the forefront.

Obviously, then, the question becomes: Who is doing the assessment and are they the best qualified? NMMEA should be prepared to offer the PED our services.

NMMEA could devise a system of



certifying qualified members to be official adjudicators. Such a system has been proposed before but rejected. We are now down to the urgent necessity of the need. We must act before some system is imposed upon us.

While teaching at William Penn University in Iowa I became a certified adjudicator. The process included, years teaching in Iowa, three letters of recommendation and required attendance at training sessions. The certification had to be renewed every three years through training sessions. Following each event the adjudicators were evaluated by participating teachers and that evaluation was followed up by the State office. I took some lumps but the process assured that the evaluation of students and teachers was defensible.

Our neighbors in Texas have the Texas Music Adjudicators Association with extensive requirements for membership.

In order to be considered for active membership in the Texas Music Adjudicators Association (TMAA) all candidates must satisfy the following components:

- 1. Successful teaching component
- 2. Employment in music education component
- 3. Workshop component
- 4. Superior performance component
- 5. Adjudicator/clinician component
- 6. Provisional membership

Each of these components has multiple requirements to assure that members or fully qualified to evaluate UIL events. For details got to their website http://www.txmaa.org/tmaameminfo.php

We, as leaders in art education in New Mexico, must be pro-active and prepared to be leaders in the teacher evaluation process.

Let's become involved now rather than await imposed, non-musical evaluation.

Schools that have music programs have significantly higher graduation rates than those without music programs (90.2 percent compared to 72.9 percent).

On average, students in music performance scored 57 points higher on the verbal and 41 points higher on the math section of the SAT than did students with no music participation.

Here are some simple, time-effective ways parents can assist their child's school music educators:

### Access the Status Quo:

- Study the ways that music education develops creativity, enhances cooperative learning, instills disciplined work habits, and statistically correlates with gains in standardized test scores.
- Speak with your local school board about your desire to have a strong music education for your child.

# **Communicate Effectively**

- Be in touch with local music teachers on a regular basis. Offer to help out.
- Ask yourself why your children need high quality music education. Be able to articulate the answers to teachers, administrators, and other parents.
- Take part in your school's music booster organization.

# **Guitar Section John Truitt, Vice President**



When you read this, auditions will be over and membership in the 2013 New Mexico All-State Guitar Ensemble will be decided, but as I am writing this right now, the auditions are still two weeks away and the crescendo of excitement (and anxiety) is building in 18 different programs from around the state. We are delighted to report that there are more programs participating from the southern part of the state, and that our auditionees will come from as far south as Gadsden and as far North as Kirtland Central and Farmington! We will truly be an "all-state" group this year. That good news is tempered by the disappointment that the total numbers of applicants has fallen by almost 35 students. Some have cited the economy as a potential reason, but it is more likely that the change in directorship of several programs is to blame. The new directors will certainly bring us more applicants in the future.

My schedule has permitted me to visit many of the programs in Central New Mexico, and the report I have to offer about those programs is very good indeed. I have been able to hear almost 50 of the students in the Albuquerque area in clinics on the audition material, and the preparation has been very encouraging. Most uplifting to me was the attention that teachers are focusing on the sight reading component of the audition. For the first time I have been able to

see significant numbers of guitar students whose sight reading skills have risen considerably. Bravo, Directors! Recalling some of the challenges of last year's group, I want to underline the importance of being sure the students who are accepted get their music promptly and prepare it with the same intensity that they prepared their auditions. Directors, if there is difficulty in helping the students prepare the music, please notify me and I will be sure that there will be help in preparing the repertoire for All-State. This is absolutely essential to be sure that the All-State experience is a good one.

One the same subject, it was decided at last year's section meeting that our first rehearsal Wednesday night would be a sectional rehearsal to better prepare the group for a productive first general rehearsal. The sectional will also allow us to assess the progress of the students on the material, and help if there is need for it. Should a student arrive unprepared and fail to respond to remediation at that sectional, they may be asked to leave. Please be sure that your students know their music!

Our clinician this year brings a level of artistry that is unparalleled. She is the first of our All-State Guitar clinicians who, in addition to being a fine educator, is one of the world's most respected concert artists. She is also one of the few concert guitarists of her generation who actually began her study as a member of a school guitar ensemble. She literally knows the world of classical guitar from bottom to top! Martha Masters has performed in China, England, Denmark Spain, Poland, Germany, Paraguay, Peru, Puerto Rico, Canada, Mexico and all over the United States. Her CD realease "Serenade" has sold over 10,000 copies! She has won the Guitar Foundation of America's prestigious International competition, and she has also won the Andres Segovia International Competition in Linares, Spain. She is currently the Director of Guitar at Loyola Marymount College in California, and the director of a very successful yearly guitar ensemble festival there. There are no word to describe how honored we are to have her this year!

Please be sure to attend our workshops this year! This year, Dr. Lynn McGrath (in conjunction with Brian Moore and Aaron Geiskopf,) will present a workshop on the curriculum and methods of the guitar classes at the UNM Music Prep School. This will be of special interest to those who teach young students, as many of the guitar students at the school are elementary age and younger! As well, Mark Scholz will offer a workshop entitled "Authentic Assessment for High School and Middle School Guitar Classes." Mark knows the subject well, having taught for many years at Moriarty Middle and High Schools. Eduardo Trujillo of Cibola High School will preside over the very popular and not to be missed reading session of new guitar ensemble material. Bring a guitar! It has turned into a party in previous years! The workshop we are most anxious to see become a tradition is one that will be offered by Ben Silva of the UNM Music Department. He will be offering a master class that will feature three students from our allstate ensemble. Each will have a 20 minute session with Ben in front of guitar directors and other interested educators. Don't miss this one! It promises to be very memorable! Check your schedules for the time and places of these workshops, and be there!

In the January edition of the NAfME publication, Teaching Music, there will be an article about the efforts put forth in New Mexico and Florida to incorporate guitar in their respective All-State Music Festivals. The article is a kind of interview of myself and Ed Prasse ( who directs Forida's guitar all-state,) by Glen McCarthy, who is the chair of NAfME's guitar education committee. There will be photos of both states groups, so be sure to look for it when you get your

Next year, though I will still be involved, I will be on the sidelines as the Guitar Initiative will be guided by Jeremy Mayne of Albuquerque Academy. Jeremy assumes the leadership of the division for next year's efforts, and I am sure that he will do a fabulous job. Please be sure to in-

troduce yourself to him at this year's festival, and let him know about your program. He is a fabulous guitarist and educator, and a dear friend. Let me know how I can help you, I

will remain ready to support you and your teaching in any way I can! It has been an honor to serve with such inspiring people, (too many to men-

tion,) and I count these times as some of the very best in my life!

The UNM Opera Theatre, under the direction of Prof. Leslie Umphrey and Sam Shepperson, will present "European Vacation," an evening of delightful scenes from the comic opera geniuses of Gilbert and Sullivan, Lehar and Strauss, with selections from The Merry Widow, The Pirates of Penzance and Die Fledermaus. 

Mr. Newell earned his Bachelor of Music Education and Master of Arts in Education degrees from Baldwin-Wallace College and has taken post-graduate courses at Akron, Cleveland State, Kent State, and Northwestern Universities. Currently, he publishes with the Neil A. Kjos Music Company. Among his works are Bach and Before for Band, Classic Christmas Carols for Choir, Bach and Before for Strings, The Simple Rhythmatician, and Teaching Rhythm: New Strategies and Techniques for Success.

ident, president and past president for the New Mexico Music Educators Association, and is finishing his term as the past president of the MENC Southwestern Division. He served on the MENC National Executive Board from 2007 to 2010. Luis is an active presenter at local staff development sessions, and has also presented at NMAOSA chapter workshops, NMMEA All State Music Conferences, NAfME Leadership Assemblies, 2009 AOSA National Conference and most recently at the 2011 LEADS Conference. Jim Young is a graduate of Hot Springs High School, Eastern New Mexico University (BME-1967, MA 1969) and received his administration License From New Mexico State University. He taught band in Los Alamos for 9 years. Alamogordo for 18 years, Durango for 3 years, Western New Mexico University for 3 years and in Las Cruces Public Schools for 2 years.

Under his direction the Alamogordo High School band was named the outstanding New Mexico band six times at the Zia Marching Fiesta and was selected as the NMMEA Honor Band in 1981. His bands have received the outstanding 5A awards at the Dixie Classic Festival, Cavalcade of Music, Heritage Music Festival, Choice Music Events Festival and the Durango Music Festival. Bands under Mr. Young's leadership have received first division ratings every year he taught in the public schools.

Mr. Young continues to show a commitment and dedication to music education after retiring (the first time in 1993). He is in great demand as a clinician and adjudicator and has done clinics and/or adjudicated bands in New Mexico, Texas, Colo-

rado, Arizona, Nevada, Utah and Kentucky. He is also the only public school band director to twice conduct the NMMEA Small School All-State Band. Jim is currently semi-retired, teaching a seminar class and supervising student teachers at NMSU.

Mr. Young holds membership in the Music Educators National Conference, New Mexico Music Educators Association, Phi Beta Mu, College Band Directors National Association, American School Band Directors Association, Kappa Kappa Psi and the National Association of Rudimental Drummers.

He has served as the North Central NMMEA President (1974-76), Southwest NMMEA President 1978-81 and 1992-93). He was NMMEA Band Vice-President (1980-1983) and President (1983-1986). As President of NMMEA he initiated the Music Educator of the Year, the Hall of Fame and the John Batcheller Award for Excellence in Teaching Elementary Music awards. Jim has also served on the New Mexico Alliance for Arts Education Board and was the music specialist for the North Central Evaluation and Accreditation Team.

Mr. Young was inducted into the NMMEA Hall of Fame in 1998 and received the NMMEA Emeritus Award in 2008; the first recipient of this award.

Everyone agrees on the importance of chamber music in the band program. We also agree on how difficult it is to truly make it work for both the students and the director. This workshop will focus on ways to make chamber music successful throughout the entire year, not just the dreaded solo and ensemble season! Nancy Joy received a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Wittenberg University School of Music in Springfield, Ohio, studying with Dr. Richard Chenoweth and then completed a Master of Music in Horn Performance at New Mexico State University, studying with Dr. Warner Hutchison. Nancy is currently in her sixteenth year as Horn Professor at New Mexico State University. In her first year at NMSU, Nancy created a new horn choir, called the "NMSU Corno Crew" which is very active in premiering new works. The NMSU Horn Choir was invited to be a premiere performing ensemble at the following International Horn Society (IHS) Symposiums: 1999 in Athens, GA., the 2000 Symposium in Beijing, China; the 2005 Symposium in Tuscaloosa, AL; and the 2008 Symposium in Denver, CO.

Nancy is Principal Horn of the Las Cruces Symphony at NMSU, and Second Horn of the El Paso Symphony Orchestra and El Paso Opera Company. Recent solo performances include the NMSU University Singers and Masterworks Chorus, the 2007 New Mexico Music Educators Association All-State Music Festival, the Las Cruces High School Band, the Mayfield High School Band, the EL Paso Youth Symphony Orchestra, the NMSU Wind Ensemble and the Mesilla Valley Concert Band. She has recorded and written four volumes of folksongs, singing games, and play parties for kids of all ages: My Little Rooster (1987), Bought Me a Cat (1988), John, the Rabbit (1989), and The Little Black Bull (1996). These publications and her collaborative recordings with John Feierabend -Had a Little Rooster (2005), Old Joe Clark (2006), and There's a Hole in the Bucket (2006) – are published by and available from GIA Music, Inc.

Dr. Trinka was a 1974-75 Ford Foundation Ringer Fellow at the Liszt Academy of Music in Budapest, Hungary, where she studied Kodály philosophy and practice in music education. She has taught in public and private schools in IL, NY, CT, and TX, and was on the music education faculties at the University of Central Arkansas, the University of North Texas, and the University of St. Thomas, where she also served as director of Graduate Programs in Music Education.

Dr. Trinka holds a B.S. in music education from the University of Illinois, and Ph.D. in music education with secondary studies in ethnomusicology from the University of Texas at Austin. This year our clinics will include a Suzuki workshop by Susan Kempter & Maria Stepanova. Together they will teach us some of the technical aspects of the Suzuki method and then give us strategies to apply them in a classroom situation.

Back by popular demand, we will have a discussion of best practices, where you and your colleagues can offer your favorite tricks of our trade.

As in previous years, Joe Keith and Music Mart will be sponsoring a music reading session. I find the opportunity to play through pieces and look through the score a valuable resource when considering new repertoire for my ensembles.

In addition, there will be a workshop on student assessment and teacher accountability; this workshop is of particular interest with the proposed new assessments by the PED.

- Make statistical studies and research supporting the value of music education available to other administrators and school boards.
- Ask music advocates to speak at PTA and community meetings, or ask your music teacher to set up performances to keep the education community apprised of students' achievements.

- Share your students' successes with district colleagues. Include articles in school and district newsletters to communicate the value of music in a student's education.
