Small School Band – Michael Mapp



Dr. Michael W. Mapp is the Director of Bands and coordinator of the Graduate Instrumental Conducting program at New Mexico State University. Dr. Mapp joined the music faculty at NMSU in 2017. Prior to working at NMSU, Dr. Mapp taught at Washburn University in Topeka, Kansas as Director of Bands and served as associate conductor of the Kansas City Civic Orchestra. He also enjoyed a successful tenure as a public-school teacher. At NMSU, Dr. Mapp's responsibilities include serving as the conductor of the Wind Symphony, administering the graduate program in wind conducting, teaching courses in conducting and literature, and overseeing all facets of the university band program.

Dr. Mapp enjoys an active schedule as a guest conductor, clinician, adjudicator, and producer throughout the United States. Bands under his direction have performed at numerous state, regional, and national conferences, including the Kansas Music Educators Association state convention and the College Band Directors National Association convention. He has been an invited presenter at multiple state conventions and for CBDNA at the regional and national conventions. He has served as the College Faculty Representative for the Kansas Bandmasters Association and the Kansas State Chair for the National Band Association. He is currently on the Board for the New Mexico Music Educators Association and is the New Mexico representative for the Southwest Region of CBDNA. Most recently, the NMSU Wind Symphony was invited to perform in Prague, Czech Republic as part of the World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles Festival in 2022.

As an advocate of new music, Dr. Mapp annually commissions and premiers new works for wind ensemble. Recent commissions and consortiums include works by Kevin Walczyk, Daniel McIntosh, Joni Greene, Chin Ting Chan, Kevin McKee, Bob Leathermon, Lester Pack, Viet Cuong, Aaron Perrine, Joel Puckett, and Peter Meechan.

Michael holds degrees from New Mexico State University, Wichita State University, and The University of Kansas. He is a member of the New Mexico Music Educators Association, Texas Music Educators Association, the National Association for Music Education, College Band Directors National Association, World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, and Phi Beta Mu International Band Masters Fraternity. He enjoys life in Las Cruces, New Mexico with his wife Dr. Hyerim Mapp and their dachshund, Karma.

Concert Band – Timothy J. Holtan

Col. Timothy J. Holtan retired in 2017 as the senior military musician in the Department of Defense. Col. Holtan's final command was as the 10th Leader and Commander of The United States Army Band "Pershing's Own." He holds the distinction of being the only officer to command all three of the Army's premier bands, which include the U.S. Army Field Band and the U.S. Military Academy Band at West Point. Col. Holtan received numerous military awards and honors during his 28½-year career, including the Army Distinguished Service Medal.

Col. Holtan is a graduate of Bismarck (ND) High School and is a former school music educator in Montana. A clinician for Conn-Selmer, Inc. and Artistic Director of the professional wind band The Maryland Winds, he is a strong advocate for music education, and is in demand as a guest conductor, clinician and adjudicator. Col. Holtan has presented concerts and clinics in all 50 states, Canada, Japan, the U.S. Virgin Islands and across Europe.



In 2000, Col. Holtan was selected for the Army's "Training with Industry" program. He served as the Director of Operations and Associate Conductor of the Dallas Winds, while concurrently pursuing doctoral studies at the University of North Texas. Col. Holtan holds music education degrees from Montana State University and the

University of Montana, and has pursued additional conducting studies with Elizabeth Green, H. Robert Reynolds, John Paynter, Larry Rachleff, Jerry Junkin and Eugene Corporon.

Col. Holtan's ensembles have been seen on many nationally televised broadcasts and diverse stages such as the Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center, DAR Constitution Hall, Mormon Tabernacle, Myerson Symphony Center, and Meyerhoff Symphony Hall, as well as for the 2017 Presidential Inaugural Concert at the Lincoln Memorial. Under his leadership and after a 44-year absence, the West Point Band reestablished a partnership with the New York Philharmonic, which resulted in five Lincoln Center joint concert performances. Col. Holtan also led the West Point Band in the Emmy-nominated "Marina at West Point" PBS television production that has reached over 180 million viewers.

Col. Holtan has been honored as Alumnus of the Year by Bismarck State College and was inducted into the Bismarck High School Hall of Fame. Col. Holtan served for twelve years on the National Band Association Board of Directors and has received multiple Citations of Excellence. In 2011, he was the University of Montana's School of Visual and Performing Arts "Odyssey of the Stars" honoree and was inducted into their Hall of Honor. In 2019, Col. Holtan was selected to receive the Montana State University Alumni Achievement Award. Col. Holtan holds memberships in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association, National Band Association, Association of Concert Bands, and serves on the Advisory Committee to the President, Midwest Clinic.

Symphonic Band – Cynthia Johnston Turner



Odds were against Cynthia Johnston Turner becoming a musician let alone a professor of music in higher education. Born in a small rural town in Ontario, Canada, no one in her family played an instrument or sang, although there were rumors that her great paternal grandfather was a mean mandolinist. Cynthia asked for a piano for Christmas when she was 8 years old, and because it was all her parents could afford, she received a toy electric keyboard from which she was pretty much inseparable until she started the ukulele in grade school. When she picked up the clarinet and saxophone in middle school, a love affair and a career were born.

The first in her family to attend university, Cynthia Johnston Turner received her B.Mus and B.Ed from Queen's University, a M.Ed. at the University of Victoria and a D.M.A. (Conducting) from the Eastman School of Music. She has received numerous teaching, research, and leadership awards in Canada and the United States.

From 2014-2021, Cynthia was Director of Bands, Professor of Music, and Artistic Director of "CCE" at the Hodgson School of Music, University of Georgia where she conducted the Hodgson Wind Ensemble, led the MM and DMA programs in conducting, provided strategic leadership in diversity, equity, and belonging initiatives as well as innovative curriculum, and oversaw the entire band program including the 400+ member Redcoat Marching Band. The Hodgson Wind Ensemble performed at the CBDNA National Convention in 2017. She is a sponsored clinician with Conn-Selmer.

Cynthia has guest conducted bands, new music ensembles, and orchestras at several universities and conservatories as well as state honor bands in the United States and abroad. She continues to actively promote commissions by today's leading and emerging composers around the world with a focus on underrepresented voices. She has been invited to present her research with teaching and technology, innovative rehearsal techniques, and service-learning and music performance at numerous conferences nationally and internationally. She is published in such journals as Interdisciplinary Humanities, International Journal of the Humanities, Music Educators Journal, NAfME "Teaching Music," NewMusicUSA.org, Journal of the World Association of Bands and Ensembles, Fanfare Magazine, and Canadian Winds, and has recorded CDs with the Innova and Albany labels.

Cynthia has served as a board member with WASBE and is an active member of CBDNA (Vice-President Elect, SEC), Conductor's Guild, College Music Society, Humanities Education and Research Association, the National Association for Music Education, the National Band Association, and the American Bandmasters Association. She

currently serves on the board of the Western International Band Clinic (WIBC) and faculty at WIBC University. She is an honorary member of Kappa Kappa Psi and a National Arts Associate member of Sigma Alpha Iota.

Cynthia spearheaded a community partnership between Athens HipHop artists, UGA composers, and the Hodgson Wind Ensemble, and the reimagining of 'new music' at UGA that embraces decolonization, the dismantling of musical "genre," and anti-racism.

She was appointed Dean—Faculty of Music at Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario, just outside of Toronto, July 1, 2021.

Treble Choir – John Flanery




Dr. John Flanery serves as President of the Bishop Heelan Catholic Schools in Sioux City, Iowa. In this capacity John oversees four Pre-K through 8th grade centers and Bishop Heelan Catholic High School. The system includes 1,600 students, 120 faculty and another 60 staff members. John acts as a bridge to alumni and community members through constant engagement and communication. Prior to this position, John worked in the choir department at Bishop Heelan with concert choirs, show choirs, and all-state students along with producing an annual Madrigal Dinner.

John previously held positions as Director of Choral Activities at New Mexico State University in Las Cruces and Associate Choral Director at the University of Southern Mississippi in Hattiesburg. As a collegiate choral professor, John taught courses at the undergraduate and graduate level in choral conducting and choral literature. He has led mixed choirs, men's choirs and community choirs for over two decades. His choirs have

been selected to perform at state and regional conferences as well as touring extensively regionally, nationally and internationally. Most recently the NMSU choirs performed in Vienna and Salzburg. John conducted them in the European premiere of James Mulholland's "Missa Romantica" with Viennese orchestra with Professor Mulholland attending.

John conducts a new community chorus that he founded, the Missouri River Choral Society. This select chorus has hosted composer Richard Burchard for a concert of his music along with performances of the Christmas portion of Handel's *Messiah*, a cappella concerts and other works with orchestra.

John has a Doctor of Musical Arts and Masters degree both in Choral Conducting from the University of Kentucky. His Bachelor's of Music Education degree is from Briar Cliff University in Sioux City, Iowa. John and his wife, Juliane, have five children – Elias, Cecelia, Josephine, Lucinda and William.



Mixed Choir - Anthony J. Maglione



Anthony J. Maglione is the Director of Choral Studies and holds the Robert H. McKee Chair of Music at William Jewell College. Under his direction, the William Jewell College Concert Choir was twice awarded 2nd Place for the *American Prize in Choral Performance*, *College/University Division* and has appeared at SWACDA and ACDA National (2019). His professional choir, Cardinalis, was featured at AGO National in (2018). In addition to his responsibilities at William Jewell College, he serves as Director of Music and Choir Master at St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Kansas City, Conductor Emeritus of the Freelance Ensemble Artists of NJ Symphony Orchestra, Conducting Teacher for Artifact Institute, and has served on the summer faculty of Westminster Choir College since 2011. He is a graduate of Westminster Choir College of Rider University, East Carolina University, and the University of California, Los Angeles.

An active composer, Anthony's choral works are published on James Jordan's "Evoking Sound" choral series through GIA, Inc. In the last several years his music has appeared at state and national-level conventions, on TV, and has been recorded on Albany, Centaur, Gothic, and Spiritum Records. Anthony's cantata "The Wedding of Solomon" premiered at the 2018 American Guild of Organists National Convention. In 2019, his work "On Life" was premiered by the Miami University Men's Glee Club at the National ACDA Conference. In 2020, Verdigris Ensemble premiered his extended dramatic work "Dust Bowl" as part of the AT&T Performing Arts Center's Elevator Project in Dallas, TX.

As a producer, Anthony recently received national attention through his work with Sam Brukhman and Veridgris Ensemble on "Betty's Notebook" by Nicholas Reeves. This ground-breaking programmable art music is the first of its kind and also the first to be sold on the blockchain.

As a tenor, Anthony has appeared with Kansas City Baroque Consortium, Kantorei KC, Sunflower Baroque, and Spire Chamber Ensemble. He currently performs and records with Artefact Ensemble, Cappella Romana, The Same Stream Choir, The St. Tikhon Choir.

A sought after clinician, Anthony teaches workshops regularly and has conducted All-State and honor choirs in California, Kansas, Mississippi, Missouri, New Mexico, New Jersey, New York, and Pennsylvania.

Guitar – Martha Masters



Martha Masters first achieved international recognition in 2000 when she won first prize in the Guitar Foundation of America International Concert Artist Competition. That same year she also won the Andres Segovia International Competition in Linares, Spain, and was named a finalist in the Alexandre Tansman International Competition of Musical Personalities in Lodz, Poland.

Since then, Ms. Masters has been active as a solo recitalist, chamber musician and concerto soloist around the world. Recent seasons included appearances at festivals and on concert series through the United States, Europe, Russia, China and Australia.

Masters received both the Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from the Peabody Conservatory, where she studied with Manuel Barrueco, and completed the Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Southern California as a student of Scott Tennant.

Ms. Masters is currently on the guitar faculty of Loyola Marymount University and California State University Fullerton and is President of the Guitar Foundation of America. She has released seven recordings (Naxos, GSP and independent releases), and has published three books with Mel Bay Publications and Alfred Music. For more information, visit www.marthamasters.com.

Symphony Orchestra – Anna Edwards



Anna Edward's musical career progression as a violinist, educator, and symphony conductor has been inspired by her commitment to core values of high-quality musical performance, development of musicians and composers through music education, and community engagement. She is a passionate advocate for the music of underrepresented composers on the concert stage. Currently, Edwards balances her time between conducting in the Pacific Northwest, serving as a guest conductor/clinician across the country, and developing young musicians through instruction and collaboration with professionals in concert settings. The 2021-22 season marks the tenth season for Edwards as Music Director of the Seattle Collaborative Orchestra, eighth season as Music Director of the Saratoga Orchestra, and fifth season as Music Director of the Pacific Northwest Conducting Institute.

As a recognized leader for the promotion of musical diversity in symphonic orchestral music, Dave Beck, of *Seattle Classical KING FM* wrote, "The Seattle Collaborative Orchestra under Dr. Anna Edwards' excellent musicianship, inspired vision, and creative leadership, is doing everything a modern orchestra should be doing to insure the future of the art of symphonic music. The spirit of collaboration among these professional, gifted amateur and excellent student musicians fosters innovation, diversity, and new possibilities in the life of the 21st century symphony orchestra. SCO is showing the way forward like no other orchestra in our region." Edwards continues to follow her commitment to program innovative music, which balances traditional classical music with music by women, people of color, and Northwest artists. Additionally, she offers lectures concerning music, gender, and leadership to up-and-coming musicians and community leaders in public schools, community businesses, Colleges, and Universities.

Edwards' dedication to quality musical performance started with her early career as a professional violinist, performing with prestigious ensembles such as the Pacific Northwest Ballet, Northwest Sinfonietta, Auburn Symphony, and multiple Seattle area chamber ensembles. As she has turned her career towards conducting, Edwards has attended numerous festivals and workshops, with mentors such as Ludovic Morlot, Michael Jinbo, Diane Wittry, Neil Thomson, and Gustav Meier. She received a Doctor of Musical Arts Degree in Orchestral Conducting from the University of Washington, and holds a Bachelor of Music Education and Masters in Violin Performance from the University of New Mexico.

Concert Orchestra - Michael Alexander

Dr. Michael Alexander serves as Professor of String Music Education at Baylor University and Associate Dean for Academic Affairs for the Baylor School of Music. He joined the faculty in 2006 after 22 years of teaching orchestra at Stratford HS in Houston, Texas. He holds degrees from Southwestern University (BME), Sam Houston State University (MM), and the University of Houston (DMA). His duties at Baylor include overseeing the undergraduate academic curriculum, supervising string student teachers, instruction in classroom string pedagogy, and directing the Baylor String Project.

Dr. Alexander has served as President of the Texas Orchestra Directors Association, Vice-President of the Texas Music Educators Association, and President of the Texas Chapter of the American String Teachers Association (ASTA). He currently serves as Immediate Past-Chair of the ASTA National Orchestra Festival. His work has been recognized with



the Houston Symphony Award for Excellence in Teaching, ASTA Elizabeth A.H. Green Award, University of Houston Outstanding Music Alumnus, TODA Orchestra Director of the Year, and Baylor Outstanding Professor Award.

Dr. Alexander has presented his research on string sight-reading, tuning, and improvisation at state, national, and international symposia. He has co-authored Orchestra Expressions (Books 1 and 2), Expressive Techniques for Orchestra, and Expressive Sight-Reading for Orchestra (Books 1 and 2). His research is published in the Journal of Research in Music Education, UPDATE: Applications of Research in Music Education, the String Research Journal, Texas Music Education Research, the American String Teacher, the International Society of Assessment in Music

Education, and the Southwestern Musician. Alexander has served as clinician/conductor for All-State and Honor groups across the United States, with several engagements in Europe.

Jazz 1 - Rob Parton

Rob Parton is a busy and versatile trumpet player and is highly regarded as a studio, theatre and jazz musician, performer, educator and bandleader. He is chair of Jazz Studies at UNT.

A versatile and in-demand trumpet player, Parton has been called on to perform or record the music of diverse composers from Karel Husa to Leonard Bernstein to Duke Ellington. He has performed with many of America's major orchestras including the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Cleveland Orchestra, New York Philharmonic, and Detroit Symphony Orchestra, to name a few. He has also performed as lead trumpet on numerous Broadway shows in the Midwest and with Grammy, Tony, and Academy Award-winning artists from Faith Hill to Natalie Cole to Tony Bennett. As a recording artist, he has performed on hundreds of recordings for national commercials and with various artists on Concord, Verity, Mark Records, Sea Breeze and Sony record labels.



While comfortable in various musical settings, be it jazz trio or brass quintet or as a soloist with larger ensembles, leading a professional big band is the area in which he has enjoyed the most acclaim. Founded in 1984, the Rob Parton Big Band has released eleven recordings, performed at the Midwest Clinic three times, at the International Trumpet Guild Conference, and at numerous jazz festivals featuring guest artists such as Lew Soloff, Conte Candoli, and Joe Williams. Dozens of the band's recordings and live videos can be found on YouTube.

You will often find him directing an All-State jazz band or acting as a guest artist with many high school and college jazz programs throughout the country. He has presented concerts or clinics at the Midwest Clinic in Chicago, International Association of Jazz Educators Convention, MENC and many other music educators conventions. Parton has earned national and international accolades for his nine critically acclaimed compact discs on the Sea Breeze Jazz and ROPA labels.

Prior to his appointment at the University of North Texas, he was Professor of Trumpet and Jazz Studies at Capital University in Columbus, OH. Rob holds degrees from the University of Kentucky and Northern Illinois University.

Jazz 2 - Delbert Anderson



Delbert discovered his passion for jazz and improvisation in his early years of education. Anderson went on to attend Eastern New Mexico University studying music education and trumpet performance. Anderson credits his educators: Janet Isham, John Kennedy, Christopher Beaty and Dustin Seifert - for his success in the music field. Anderson now resides in Farmington, NM where he's active as a performer, composer and educator.

Anderson regularly performs with the new collaborative group D'DAT, which is the Delbert Anderson Trio featuring lyricist James Pakootas, an ensemble inspired by Diné spinning songs fused with jazz, funk and hip hop. Anderson has created and contributed to many projects in arts such as: D'DAT & DAT Performances, DDAT Wellness Program & Music Education/Workshops, D'DAT Suite Orchestra Collaborations, Multi Arts Project Spirit Coalescent, Naat'áani Musical (Native American Musical), Jazz Jams Project - Community

Development Project, Blue Desert Virtual Tour - Regional Arts Alliance, Farmington Jazz Festival, South African Exploration Project, Bureau of Land Management Tour, and partnered with the Indigenous Big Band Project (Led by Julia Keefe) and Welcome to Indian Country Production (Led by Andre Bouchard). Anderson performed with today's artists such as T.S Monk, Bobby Watson, Brad Goode, the American Pops Orchestra and many more. In addition to his active performing schedule, Anderson directs Jazz at San Juan College in Farmington, NM. Anderson was is also founder of the youth mentor program NAMP - Native American Music Program, D'DAT Management, Inc. (co-founder) and the San Juan Jazz Society - community arts organization.

Delbert Anderson has received the 2021 & 2022 Chamber Music America Jazz Presenters Grant, selected for Western States Arts Federation 2021 Emerging/Leaders of Color Program, 2021 South Arts Jazz Road Creative Residency Grant, 2021 Caldera Residency Program, 2021 Some Serious Business Residency, 2021 Willow Tail Arts Residency, 2021 New York Trust Award, 2019 APAP Doris Duke Access Award and the 2019 Western Arts Alliance Native Launchpad Award. Anderson has been featured on JazzTimes, Grammy.com, PBS, NPR, FNX, Tedx, Sirius XM, Smithsonian Magazine and Yahoo to mention a few.

Jazz 3 - Paul Blakey

Winston "Paul" Blakey, a New Mexico native and product of the Albuquerque Public School Music Program, graduated from Eldorado High School, received his bachelor's in music education from the University of New Mexico in 1996 and a Master's degree in music education from UNM in 2007. He has been a high school band director for 26 years, local jazz musician and currently serves as music instrumental resource teacher for the Albuquerque Public schools.

Paul began his teaching career in Albuquerque at Highland High School where he taught marching band, concert band and jazz band for 16 years. While at Highland the jazz band was named honor band at the 2000 University of New Mexico Jazz Festival as well as being named honor band at the 2005 New Mexico State jazz festival. The biggest honor for the jazz band was receiving a national jazz award being named as one of



"America's Best" in 2001. In 2008, The Highland Marching Band was the Zia New Mexico state champion. In 2012, Paul became the director of bands at Volcano Vista High School until 2020. From 2012-2019 The Volcano Vista jazz program received continuous superior ratings at festivals while the marching band was a many time Class AAAA winner at The NM Pageant of bands, as well as a finalist band consistently at the Zia State Competition. The Volcano Vista Symphonic band has placed 2nd and 3rd in recent years at the NMAA State Band Contest. Mr. Blakey has had a professional performance background in the Albuquerque community playing saxophone several times with the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra and as a member of the Albuquerque Jazz Orchestra for 30 years.

In his career Paul, has played with world renowned jazz and pop artists in the state of New Mexico. A versatile musician, Mr. Blakey played in the popular local ska/reggae band known as "Giant Steps" for six years. Paul is frequently utilized as a clinician at local and statewide music events in jazz band, marching band and concert band.







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

Deanna Amend, Hall of Fame



Deanna Amend was born in Albuquerque, New Mexico. She is grateful to God to be part of a musical family with grandparents and parents who supported her pursuit of music and music education. Deanna has been happily married to Marshall Amend for thirty-six years and they have two great sons; Paul, who is married to Alice (Las Cruces) and Craig (Albuquerque.) Deanna Amend was inspired to pursue choral music education by her eighth-grade choir director and lifelong mentor, Nina Hobbs (NMMEA Hall of Fame inductee.) She was also influenced and encouraged by Louise and Lynn Loomis, A.V. Wall, and John Clark. In 1985, Deanna earned a Bachelor of Music Education and an endorsement in Secondary Language Arts from the University of New Mexico. Mrs. Amend taught choir, piano, exploratory music, drama, and language arts in the Albuquerque Public Schools for twenty-one years serving Grant

Middle School, Sandia High School, Eisenhower Middle School, and La Cueva High School. Mrs. Amend loved the thousands of students whom she was blessed to get to know in her classroom. Under her direction, choirs earned several NMAA State Choir Championships as well as many awards at national show choir contests and music festivals. Many of her students were selected for NMMEA All-State Choirs and several have gone on to become choral music educators. Deanna Amend served as NMMEA Choral Vice-President from 2015-2017, District 7 Choral Co-Vice President, an NMAA Choral Advisory Board member, a presenter at four NMMEA All-State Music Conferences, an adjudicator and clinician around New Mexico, and an assistant with NMMEA All-State Choirs and vocal auditions in many capacities. In the fall of 2018, Deanna Amend became the Choir Resource Teacher for the Albuquerque Public Schools and also taught Choral Methods and Choral Lab at the University of New Mexico. In her new role with the Albuquerque Public Schools, she supported and mentored choir teachers with the goal of fostering culturally responsive choral music education, developing music literacy, and increasing choir participation from elementary school to middle school through high school in APS. At UNM, Deanna invested in the future of secondary choral music education by preparing pre-service music educators for culturally responsive teaching and student-centered music engagement strategies. In May of 2022, Deanna retired and hopes to travel, compose, enjoy family, and continue to support choral music education in New Mexico.

William Austell, Hall of Fame

William Austell graduated from Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana with a Bachelor of Music Education (BME) degree. He taught at the high school level for 21 years in Pennsylvania before moving to New Mexico in 2001 to become a member of the faculty at Valencia Middle School in Los Lunas where he was the Band Director until 2018.

During his tenure at Valencia Middle School (formerly Manzano Vista Middle School), the VMS bands were consistently recognized for their musical excellence. Most notably, the VMS Advanced Band earned a rating of Superior every year at the CNMMEA Music Performance Assessment and placed first in the middle school division of the 2004, 2006, 2009, and 2011 NMAA Concert Band Competitions.



In August of 2018, Mr. Austell was hired to create a music program for all students, grades PreK-6, at Tomé Elementary School in Los Lunas. This has been the first year-round school music education experience for any of the current Tomé students as well as an opportunity to be enriched by the joys and benefits of music for years to come.

As a bass trombonist, Bill is a member of the Albuquerque Jazz Orchestra (AJO). In addition to being a member of the AJO, he has performed with the New Mexico Philharmonic Orchestra, The Santa Fe Pro Musica, NDI New Mexico and Opera Southwest. As a member of the AJO, Bill has performed with Bobby Shew, Wayne Bergeron, Bob McChesney, Pete Christlieb, John Fedchock, Butch Miles, and Toshiko Akiyoshi. He has also appeared with The Manhattan Transfer, Aretha Franklin, Johnny Mathis, Natalie Cole, Bobby Vinton, and the Four Tops.

Mr. Austell also works as a guest clinician, adjudicator and marching band drill designer. Most recently, he served on

the adjudication panels for the 2022 SWNMMEA MPA, the 2022 NMMEA District 7 (Albuquerque) Middle School MPA and the 2020 ABQ/UNM Jazz Festival.

Bill was on the staff of the Albuquerque Youth Symphony as co-conductor of the AYS Junior Orchestra from 2013 until 2019. During the 2021-22 school year, he served weekly as a volunteer clinician with the AYSP Junior Orchestra.

Bill is a member of the New Mexico Music Educators Association (NMMEA) and the current President of the NMMEA Central District (CNMMEA).

While everything described above brings a high level of satisfaction and sense of accomplishment, none of it compares to the love and pride Bill has for his daughter, Kristina, and son, Alex. Both Kristina and Alex graduated from UNM with degrees in Music Education. Kristina (former Assistant Band Director at Desert Ridge and Eisenhower Middle Schools for three years) is now continuing her teaching career as a flight attendant trainer for American Airlines at the American Airlines Training Center in Dallas, Texas. Alex, after five years as the Band Director at Rio Rancho Middle School, is now in his second year as the Associate Band Director at Rio Rancho High School.

Neil Swapp, Hall of Fame



A native of New Mexico, Neil Swapp grew up in Luna and graduated from Reserve High School after which he received a Music Education Degree from New Mexico State University and a Master's Degree in Trumpet Performance from the St. Louis Conservatory of Music. While at New Mexico State University, he was winner of both the NMSU Symphonic Winds and Las Cruces Symphony Concerto Competitions. He also held the position of principle trumpet in the Las Cruces Symphony.

After the completion of his degree he returned to New Mexico to begin his teaching career. Neil spent 7 years as Director of Bands at Cibola High School in Albuquerque and 17 years as Director of Bands at Mayfield High School in Las Cruces followed by 4

years as the Chair of the Music Department at New Mexico School for the Arts.

Under his leadership, his ensembles have been recognized throughout the state and nation for their superior performance level by winning numerous competitions and festivals including an unprecedented 7 State Marching Championships. During his tenure, the Mayfield High School Band was a regular finalist at Bands of America Regionals. His Ensembles have also participation in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade and the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade as well as international performances in England and China. Additionally, ensembles under his directorship were chosen numerous times as featured honor ensembles by the New Mexico Music Educators Association.

Currently he serves as the Executive Director of the New Mexico Music Educators Association as well as being on the music faculty at Western New Mexico University. He is also a regular guest clinician and conductor throughout the state and region. Furthermore, he serves on numerous state councils and committees including the New Mexico Music Commission, New Mexico Advisory Council on Arts Education, New Mexico Activities Association Activities Council, and the New Mexico Music Educators Association's Music Education Task Force. Neil also judges music competitions throughout the Southwest.

Neil is also co-founder of the Southwest Music Academy, an organization located in Las Cruces that offers out of school supplemental music instruction to elementary, middle school and high school students. He continues to serve on the board as President.

Neil currently resides in Silver City, New Mexico.

Keith Jordan, Rollie Heltman Service Award



Keith Jordan is a native New Mexican. He was born and raised in Alamogordo, New Mexico where he started his musical career as a young lad taking piano lessons from the lady down the street. He is a life-long music educator and under his leadership, Mr. Jordan's instrumental programs have excelled. His groups are known for rating superiors, and were frequently chosen as NM Honor Groups and State Champions. Mr. Jordan has sent scores of students to solo and ensemble competitions, NM All State, and national competitions. Dozens of his students made music their career. Countless students have kept music as one of their life-long passions. For several years, appreciative students nominated "Mr. J" for the Student Academic Success Teacher at La Cueva High School and Who's Who in Teaching. His colleagues nominated him for, and he was awarded, the John Philip Sousa Foundation's Legion of Honor. Keith was awarded the NMMEA Hall of Fame award in 2015.

Mr. Jordan's teaching experience includes Teaching Assistant and Assistant Band Director at the University of Utah, the Band and Orchestra Director for the Murray, Utah high and junior

high schools. After moving to Albuquerque, NM, he founded the La Cueva HS instrumental programs and maintained leadership of the marching, concert, and, jazz bands. Additionally, he taught piano lab, music theory, and math. He retired from the public schools in 2011. Currently Mr. Jordan is with St. Pius X HS in Albuquerque, teaching Band, Orchestra, Piano, and AP Music Theory. He has founded and staffed instrumental programs in seven Catholic elementary and junior high programs in the Albuquerque area, where young students now are and will receive the benefits of instrumental education.

Mr. Jordan's degrees include a Bachelor of Music Education from New Mexico State University, Graduate music studies at the University of Utah, mathematics studies at CNM and the University of New Mexico, and a Masters in Conducting from New Mexico State University.

Keith Jordan has loyally served the New Mexico Music Educators Association since the early 1990's. He was the District VII (ABQ) President and Vice President of Bands for multiple terms. Keith was elected as the NMMEA Vice President of Bands, the President of NMMEA and served as Past President. He has been editor of The NM Musician magazine since 2006 and retired from the position in 2022. Keith was nominated for Southwest Division Vice President twice, and served as the Department Chairperson for Fine Arts at La Cueva HS. He was the Fine Arts Department Co-Chairperson at St. Pius HS for seven years.

Keith's personal achievements started in Alamogordo, NM, where he graduated in the top ten of his class, was a member of the National Honor Society, Who's Who, NM All-State 4 years, National Piano Guild Competitor at the International Level for 9 years, outstanding district tuba soloist once, and awarded the top music student in his graduating class. At NMSU, he was on the Dean's List eight consecutive semesters, graduated with highest honors, and won the Concerto Competition twice. He served as President of Kappa Kappa Psi and Vice President of the Aggie Band.

Keith Jordan's membership in musical organizations include New Mexico Music Educators Association, International Association of Jazz Educators, Phi Beta Mu, National Band Association, Albuquerque Teacher's Federation and American Band Director's Association.

Mr. Jordan's community service activities include serving as deacon at Hoffmantown Church, playing in and conducting the Hoffmantown Orchestra and worship teams, and founded and led the Hoffmantown Academy of Music. He has performed with NMSO, San Juan Sym., Roswell Sym., Las Cruces Sym., El Paso Sym., Utah Sym., the Albuquerque City Concert Band, and the Swing Shift Jazz Band. As an organist, Keith has performed numerous organ recitals and served as church organist and pianist at Hoffmantown and Calvary Chapel of Albuquerque. Keith is currently the associate director of music at Community of Joy Lutheran church in Rio Rancho. As a tubist, he toured with Robert Nagel and the King's Brass Quintet and is currently a member of the Brasso Profundo Quintet.

Kurt Schmidt, Administrator of the Year

Cathy Estrada, Emeritus Teacher of the Year



Catherine Estrada, veteran music educator of 34 years, served 28 of those years as the general music teacher at Valencia Elementary School in the Los Lunas Public School District, 1 year at the School of Dreams Academy Charter School in Los Lunas, and 5 years teaching preschool in Rio Rancho. A native of Alamogordo, New Mexico, Mrs. Estrada earned a Bachelor of Music Education with Distinction from the University of New Mexico in 1981, and her Master of Education in Curriculum & Instruction Technology from Grand Canyon University in 2006. She had excellent music education mentors who laid the foundation for her commitment to music education.

Mrs. Estrada began teaching in the Los Lunas Schools district as an Itinerant Elementary Music Teacher in 1987. In 1996, she piloted a Curriculum Waiver with the New Mexico State

Public Education Department to establish a full-time music program at Valencia Elementary School. During her tenure at Valencia Elementary, she focused her music lessons on developing the whole child through the integration of music with other content areas, allowing her to develop and apply innovative, hands-on, high-quality music experiences that met the needs of her students. Her lessons were always full of engaging, fun-filled activities sure to make students giggle and smile, while at the same time developing neural pathways and increasing learning capacity and retention in all subject areas. She studied with the amazing, world-renowned Frank Bowen while at the University of New Mexico, and models her teaching after him in many ways. She tailors flute lessons to the particular needs of her students, with the goal of balancing the student's depth of skill and technique with expression. Flute continues to be one of her passions, performing in the Albuquerque Concert Band and the Central Methodist Church Sinfonia Orchestra.

Mrs. Estrada was the Teacher of the Year for Valencia Elementary School for the 1999-2000 school year. She was also the recipient of the New Mexico Music Educators Association John Batcheller Award for Excellence in Teaching Elementary School Music in 2004.

Rio Rancho Public Schools, Award of Distinction

Rio Rancho Public Schools was founded in 1994, and has maintained a strong support for music education since its inception. The district is now 17,000 students strong, and maintains eleven elementary schools, four middle schools, two comprehensive high schools, two cyber schools, and an alternative high school. Music is taught every year at all elementary grade levels by certified music teachers, and the secondary schools offer instruction in band, choir, orchestra, guitar, piano, AP Music Theory, and general music.



Rio Rancho Public Schools has made a commitment to music education. The district has maintained the number of teachers and programs in every school, and

funding for all programs is stable or increasing. The district years ago increased funding to our music programs to eliminate the out-of-pocket contributions families must make. No student needs to pay a cent simply to be a member of any of any RRPS music program.

In recent years, RRPS even expanded our teaching and support positions. For example, the district added a percussion specialist position years ago to help support our band directors. In the midst of the COVID pandemic, RRPS reestablished the elementary band program coordinator position, and added another for a full-time assistant band director at one of our high schools. The district also funds two part-time music department secretaries at its high schools to aid teachers with secretarial tasks.

RRPS also supplies the Fine Arts Department with operational funds for instrument and equipment purchases. These funds have remained steady year after year.

Rio Rancho Public Schools provides stipends and professional development funds for teachers. All music programs are supported with district funds. RRPS partners with the Santa Fe Opera. Teacher-artists work with students at the elementary and middle schools to create student-produced operas. RRPS also partners with the Kennedy Center to offer teachers professional development in arts integration. The district has excellent facilities, each high school maintaining its own performing arts center. Marching bands at each high school have fields solely devoted to rehearsal space. Elementary music teachers have their own rooms and large inventories of instruments. RRPS partners with the Rockley Family Foundation, which supplies pianos to schools free of charge. Many of our music teachers serve as officers at the district or state level of NMMEA, and many teachers are past officers.

Rio Rancho Public Schools prides itself on being a leader in the state, whether it be in regular education or arts education. RRPS is the perfect size to provide the opportunity for expansive and meaningful music education to all students. RRPS is big enough to make a difference, yet small enough to care.

Rio Rancho Public Schools has for three years straight received the National Association of Music Merchants Foundation "Best Community for Music Education" designation, which reflects the valuing and appreciation for music in the schools, and that music teachers do not need to fight for their survival. It is understood here that music is a core discipline and that it will be done and done right.

Certificate of Recognition, Farmington Municipal Schools



Our instructors and students are hard-working and dedicated. Our facilities are often used for district music events and training. There is district administrative support as well as strong building support on our 19 campuses serving our 11,000 students from diverse backgrounds. The program supports music staff working together across the district to create a vertically aligned experience from Kindergarten through graduation.

Many of the 24 educators in FMS also contribute to NMMEA as leaders in

District 3. James Golden, Piedra Vista High School Choir, just completed a term as District 3 President. Ladera

Elementary educator Virginia Weaver serves as Vice President of District 3's budding Elementary arm, as well as vice president of the Four Corners Orff Chapter. Our music staff also seeks out the best professional development and in many instances, attendance is financed by district funds. This summer, FMS had 3 elementary teachers seek Orff Level I certification, bringing the number of teachers certified to 5 of our 10.

Our staff also develop ideas and opportunities for students to stay involved in music year round. Several elementary teachers offer summer music programs in ukulele, movement, and Orff through local community arts studios. Some also include a family and parent/adult learning opportunity. High school students are offered the opportunity to perform in the July 4th parade as part of a county-wide marching band. San Juan College invites our students to perform in their summer concert series. Singers are invited to participate in a Community Choir Sing-Along developed by retired music educator Virginia Nickels. Students also get the opportunity to perform side by side with FMS music educators and professionals in musical theatre through our Farmington Civic Center.

These many opportunities exist because our FMS students are involved in them. Our students are thriving in the supportive musical culture built between FMS and the community. Our students continue to participate in All-State and regional honor ensembles. They have lead roles and solos in our community opportunities, and are developing as the next arts leaders for our region.

Incoming FMS superintendent Cody Diehl expressed "FMS will continue to support music education in our schools at all levels. We are proud of the work and efforts that have been made to be an exemplary program in the state of New Mexico and throughout the southwest region." FMS has been recognized as a Best Community for Music Education by the NAMM Foundation for six consecutive years.
